However, like the rest of the world, I still go on underrating men of gold and glorifying men of mica. Commonplace human nature cannot rise above that."

### A Sunday School Specialist.

Rev. B. W. Spillman, of Raleigh, a former Weldon boy, is a Sunday School specialist. He is Field Secretary of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, which position he has held since April 1st, 1896. He is an energetic, earnest, practical Sunday School worker, very efficient as a Bible teacher, eloquent in his address. It is due to his efforts that the Baptist Sunday School work of North Carolina occupies so high a place. He has arranged to go on the grand trans-continental Sunday school tour which will extend from "ocean to ocean." This tour begins at Richmond, Va., Sunday February 17th, and closes at Topeka Kansas, May 16th. The tour will be through all the Southern and Western States and Territories. This tour is made under the auspices of the International Sunday School Convention and is conducted jointly by the International Secretaries. They are fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Spillman for this tour.—Weldon News.

### Making Fertilizer At Home.

"I was talking yesterday with ex-State Senator Fabius A. Whitaker, of Wake county, about the price of fertilizers and their consumption. He said that the farmers in his section were buying less commercial fertilizers than heretofore and were saving from \$2 to \$4 per ton by making their own fertilizer.

"We can make better fertilizer than we can buy," said Mr. Whitaker. "I have never seen a better fertilizer than can be made by putting on 1,000 pounds of acid phosphate, 800 pounds of cotton seed meal and 200 pounds of meat salt. It is better than the guano you buy and cost from 2/3 to 3/4 less per ton. In my section we sell our cotton seed when the price reaches 15 cents and then buy acid phosphate, kainit or meat salt. If we cannot get 15 cents for our cotton seed we do not sell them."—News-Observer.

A boy fourteen years old in Texas, is said to have a pair of X-ray eyes. He can see water at any depth in the ground and has located a large number of wells, each having an unfailing supply of water, on ranches in that semi-arid section of the state. His services are in much demand by ranchmen.

### Tremendous Attack on the Cigarette.

Evil days are ahead for the cigarette. Agitation to its suppression, in whole or in part, has spread over the land. An investigation just completed shows that the legislatures in at least thirteen states are considering the adoption of more or less drastic measures, that eleven states already have laws on their statute books prohibiting the sale of the paper-wrapped weed, and that the W. C. T. U. and other organizations are urging the adoption of stringent legislation in half a dozen other commonwealths.

The states under the head are:

Illinois, California, Montana, Missouri, Kansas, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Indiana, West Virginia, Nebraska, Delaware, North Carolina.

Under the second head are:

Rhode Island, Iowa, New Hampshire, Mississippi, Arizona, Texas, Vermont, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Connecticut Georgia.

Among the states where the woman and school teachers are seeking to arouse their legislators to action are:

Tennessee, Maine, Utah, Oregon, Washington, Wisconsin.

So far as known, but two states in the entire forty-five are paying no particular attention to the subject—Wyoming and Louisiana.—Chicago Tribune.

### Out of the Race.

"Most people like their reading matter undiluted," says The New England Grocer. "If they fancy philosophy they know where to find it. When they turn to the advertising columns of their daily or weekly paper, it is to find where they can supply their wants at the most reasonable rates." This being true, it follows as a logical conclusion that the business man whose name does not appear in the advertising columns will not figure in the distribution of the prospective purchasers' money. By neglecting to keep himself he virtually admits that he is not competitor for the favor of the public.—Philadelphia Record.

The Senate passed an important bill, repealing section 1090, of the Code, and providing: "If any clerk of court, sheriff, justice of the peace, county commissioner, county surveyor, coroner, treasurer, constable or official of any State institution or any town or city shall wilfully fail, neglect or refuse to discharge any of the duties of his office for default of which it is not elsewhere provided that he shall be indicted, said officer so offending shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and if it shall be found that such officer, after his qualification, shall have wilfully and corruptly neglected or refused to discharge any of the duties of his said office, or shall have wilfully or corruptly violated his oath of office according to true intent and meaning thereof, such officer shall be guilty of a misdemeanor in office and shall be punished by removal therefrom under sentence of court as part of punishment from offense and shall also be fined or imprisoned in discretion of court."
