Official Announcement of Teachers' Assembly.

The Teachers' Assembly will meet at Wrightsville Beach near Wilmington this year on June 11th, to 16th, inclusive.

The headquarters of the assembly will be at the Sea Shore Hotel. This hotel and the Ocean View Hotel are very near the tossing waves of "Grand Old Ocean." In fact the waves come within a few feet of both of these hotels at high tide.

Rates on the beach for board to members of the assembly will be \$1.50 per day. Persons wishing to stop in the city of Wilmington can go to and from the beach for 25 cents round trip ticket.

Board at the Orton House in Wilmington at \$2.00 per day. At other hotels in the city at \$1.00 per day.

Members of the Assembly will be given special rates on steam boats down the river. On this trip down the river many places of historic interest will be seen.

All persons who purchase the Assembly coupon tickets from railroad agents will be entitled to all the special rates and special privileges that are given to bona fide teachers. In short all persons purchasing the coupon tickets become members of the Assembly.

The railroad coupon will be good to and from the beach one time; all other trips to and from the city will cost 25 cents.

Saturday will be reception day. A trip down the Cape Fear river has been arranged for this day.

A most interesting and attractive programme has been arranged. Among the persons on the programme are such men as Governor Aycock and Justice Walter Clark.

Haywood Telfair and Noah Hardy, riotous and disorderly conduct and affray, fined \$1 and half costs each, total \$4.75.

Jos. Reeves, drunk and disorderly, fined \$1 and costs, \$3.20.

Stealing Cotton.

Two weeks or more ago W. T. Knight went down to his Piney Grove farm to weigh up his cotton. He had been given the weights and number by his overseer. When he began weighing he soon discovered that the number was short, and when he had finished fourteen bales were missing.

Sheriff Knight then began an investigation. He soon learned that a negro named John Staton had carried a bale of cotton, early one morning, to Conetoe and sold it. Later he ascertained that another negro, Sam Randall, had carried several bales to Greenville and there disposed of them. Another bale was also carried to that place by Randall, a negro named Bill McKnee, and his overseer, Walter Brown, white.

When Randall found that an investigation was under way he ran away, and has not been heard of since.

Warrants were sworn out against Brown and the two negroes, Staton and McKnee, who were arrested and given a preliminary hearing yesterday at Conetoe. In default of bail they were committed to jail in Greenville.

Brown declares that the negroes are lying about him; that he is perfectly innocent, but all the circumstances seem to completely negative his assertions.

Staton says that he was paid by Brown and McKnee to carry the cotton to Conetoe, and McKnee vows that he did not steal, but only hauled the cotton off for Brown.

Sheriff Knight is not sure that he now has all connected with the stealing, but these are all he can find evidence against.—Tarboro Southerner.

A great deal of fuss is made about the eloquence of the speeches made in Raleigh in the impeachment trial, but we honestly believe we can find half a hundred preachers in North Carolina who can surpass any of the efforts made on either side any Sunday they choose to try.—Charity and Children.
