WARD MEETINGS.

Good Men Nominated in All.

The Democrats of the several wards held primary meetings Friday night to nominate the candidates for Aldermen. In the second, third and fourth wards nominations are equivalent to election, so it can be seen that the Board will be composed of good men.

FIRST WARD.

There are so few white residents of the first ward that they held no meeting to bring out a candidate. The last two years the colored people, recognizing what is to their best interest, have been nominating and electing a white Alderman from that ward. They follow the same line this time. They held a meeting in the old Mayor's office with C. C. Forbes as chairman.

E. M. McGowan and H. Harding were placed in nomination the ballot resulting in 20 votes for McGowan and 30 for Harding.

H. Harding was declared the nominee for Alderman.

SECOND WARD.

Meeting held in Mayor's office. Called to order by L. I. Moore, executive committeeman. A. L. Blow was made chairman and L. C. Arthur secretary.

It was decided to select one candidate at the time.

R. J. Cobb and Chas. Cobb were placed in nomination. R. J. Cobb received 21 votes and Chas. Cobb 8.

J. B. White, J. L. Wooten, Josiah Dixon and Chas. Cobb were then placed in nomination. White 17, Wooten 8, Dixon 1, Cobb 3.

R. J. Cobb and J. B. White were declared the nominees for Aldermen.

H. W. Wheelbee was elected executive committeeman for the ward.

THIRD WARD.

Meeting held in Court House. Called to order by J. G. Moye,

chairman. G. J. Woodward elected Secretary.

E. B. Ficklen, J. L. Little, E. E. Griffin, D. E. House and G. E. Harris were placed in nomination, ballot resulting as follows: Ficklen 35, Little 30, Griffin 21, House 19, Harris 1.

E. B. Ficklen and J. L. Little were declared the nominees for Aldermen.

J. G. Moye was re-elected executive committeeman for the ward.

FOURTH WARD.

Met in Star Warehouse. Called to order by W. H. Ragsdale, chairman. H. T. King and D. J. Whichard elected secretaries.

D. W. Hardee, H. L. Coward, C. T. Munford, W. B. Wilson and W. R. Parker were placed in nomination, the vote resulting as follows: Hardee 14, Coward 59, Munford 62, Wilson 28, Parker 8. C. T. Munford and H. L. Coward were declared the nominees for Aldermen.

W. H. Ragsdale was re-elected executive committeeman for the ward.

FIFTH WARD.

Met at 5 o'clock in J. L. Sugg's office. Zeno Moore was elected chairman and W. H. Dail, Jr., secretary.

H. C. Ormond, J. S. Tunstall and S. T. Hooker were placed in nomination. First ballot: Ormond 4, Tunstall 5, Hooker 6. Second ballot: Tunstall 8, Hooker 6.

J. S. Tunstall was declared the nominee for Alderman.

C. D. Rountree was re-elected executive committeeman for the ward.

The constitution has stood some hard knocks in the past from partisan decisions of the U. S. Supreme Court, and it will stand the extraordinary and contradictory decisions handed down this week in the insular cases. Although for the time these decisions give the administration a free hand in carrying out its imperialistic colonial policy, they will doubtless make enough democratic votes among the serious-minded, who believe Congress to be the creature of the Constitution, instead of the Constitution being the football of Congress, as the principal one of these decisions practically holds it to be, to elect the next President. There is not the slightest doubt that a majority—a vast majority—of the people of this country regard the Constitution as the best protection of their liberties, and to doubt that they will resent its being juggled with in order to make it meet the exigencies of the McKinley administration is to doubt their intelligence. Democrats, of course, regret that this decision was made, but they find consolation in the belief that it will result in hastening the return to power of the democratic party, which has ever been the defender of the Constitution and believer in its strict construction.

Senator Bailey, of Texas, who has an established reputation as an able exponent of the Constitution, said of the insular decision of the U. S. Supreme Court: "The decision is certainly bad enough, but it is not so bad as the administration papers are claiming. The friends of the administration are congratulating themselves much too early if they think the decision relieves them from the embarrassment of constitutional restriction in dealing with our new possessions. They will find the question of taxation one of the least among the perplexities of a colonial policy; and they can only carry out their plans for governing these islands by setting aside other and greater constitutional provisions. The court is apt to find that the next case will not furnish it with a subterfuge like the words 'The United States' to which it can limit constitutional guarantees. It will be compelled sooner or later to meet the proposition as to whether Congress can enact laws for these insular possessions which are contrary to the express prohibitions of the Constitution. The decision, standing by itself, will become the source of endless mischief and confusion. But its harm will not end there. Following so closely upon the decision in the income tax case, it will inevitably convince the people that the Supreme Court of the U. S. holds the laws of Congress constitutional or unconstitutional, according as it deems them wise or unwise. With the wisdom of the law, the court properly has no concern, and its only injury ought to be whether the law is or is not constitutional. For many years this rule was followed by the court and then its decisions were respected by all men; but I regret to say that at this time the conviction is almost universal in the public mind that the most important decisions are political rather than judicial."

Much interest is felt in Washington in the Tillman-McLaurin fight in South Carolina, which all will demonstrate how much truth there is in the claim that republicanism under the disguise of McLaurinism is making headway in that State. The point has been raised, and many believe it valid, that the paper is signed by Senators Tillman and McLaurin and

500 HOUSES CARRIED AWAY.

\$1,000,000 Damage in Mitchell.

"There is a tide in the affairs of men, taken at the flood leads on to" destruction. Our quiet little town nestling 'neath the lofty mountains, hitherto undisturbed by dire disasters, was on the 21st of May, visited by the most disastrous flood ever known to our people.

On the night of the 20th inst., a gale from the east began to blow with unusual velocity, and continued with unabated force, with lowering clouds of frightful darkness, and great waves of drenching rain, until Tuesday morning when it became apparent that we were to have a great deluge.

By 10 o'clock the people living on what is called "Water street," observing the rapid rising of the stream and being terror-stricken, began to flee to the hills for safety. Scarcely had they gotten out of their houses until the whole valley within which our town is situated presented a scene alarming, appalling, and absolutely indescribable.

With mighty rush and roar, bearing upon its furious bosom the debris of demolished barns, dwelling houses, grist and saw mills, store-houses, with entire contents, live stock and growing crops, the flood came like a mighty avalanche, and in its mad rush drove to ruin the entire part of the town on Water street.

Mingled with this maddening rush of turbid waters and crushing houses were to be heard the piteous cries of those astride floating buildings, rushing on to watery graves, begging and screaming and praying for help, in sight of the multitude drenched by the mighty downpour of rain, anxious to save, but powerless to help. It is not known how many lives have been lost, nor is it known how many dwelling houses, mills and store houses were swept away. A conservative estimate would fix the number at about 500. Men whose judgement is regarded as safe, put the damage in the entire county at one million dollars.

The damage to this town alone will reach near one hundred thousand dollars. In the face of this dire calamity, and realizing the situation of our town, it being 35 miles to the nearest railroad point, with the roads all washed away, and knowing that great and wide suffering in our midst is imminent without outside help, a mass meeting was called by the mayor of the town.
