Alabama Negro Suffrage.

Montgomery, Ala., June 13.—The first part of the new State Constitution was adopted yesterday by the Constitutional Convention.

The most sweeping suffrage scheme yet brought forward was that introduced today by Mr. Burns, of Burnesville.

Those who are illegitimate or loafers, or who may be affected with any infectious or loathsome disease.

Those who have been convicted of treason, bribery, forgery, larceny, robbery, bigamy, seduction, incest, murder, rape, or attempt to rape, arson or burglary.

Those who are descendants of parents who are of or descendants of two or more different races; who shall have married any woman having a living husband from whom she has not been legally divorced; those who have committed any assault and battery on wife or stepdaughter.

This law would destroy 90 per cent of the negro vote, and the ex-slaves who are not debarred will be less than 5 per cent.
