**WASHINGTON LETTER.**

From Our Regular Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 14th.

Mr. McKinley again demonstrated when he knocked the bottom out of the third term bucket by declaring that he would not again accept a nomination that he is one of the shrewdest politicians in his party. He knows there are breakers enough ahead of the republican party without the addition of a third term elephant, as frankly acknowledged when he said:

"There are now questions of the gravest importance before administration and the country, and their consideration should not be prejudiced in the public mind by even the suspicion of the thought of a third term." Mr. McKinley knows there are several public questions of importance which may wreck all chances of the republican party to elect the next President, and wishes to impress that fact upon the minds of some of the prominent members of his party who act as though they thought the administration owned the country and could do anything they pleased without jeopardizing the future success of the republican party. The immediate effect of Mr. McKinley's announcement was a sort of fluttering activity among those who are coaxing the growth of boomlets for the next republican nomination for a number of men, including Senators Fairbanks, of Ind.; Hanna and Foraker, of Ohio; Platt, of Conn.; Lodge, Mass.; Cullom, of Ill.; ex-Senator Spooner, of Wis.; Gov. Oddell, of New York, and Judge Taft, of Ohio, Chairman of the Philippine Commission. A notable thing about the situation is that there isn't the slightest evidence of a Roosevelt boom in Washington. Mr. McKinley has said that he didn't want another nomination himself, but he hasn't said that he didn't wish to name the man, and he won't say so. Shrewd observers will ascertain Mr. McKinley's favorite before betting on the name of the next republican candidate, Representative Richardson, of Tenn., the democratic leader in the House, who is in Washington, said of Mr. McKinley's anti third term announcement: "It is what anybody could expect. No man is good enough to be elected President three terms. It is a rule that has never been broken and never will be. I think Mr. McKinley is too good a politician to ever undertake to violate that rule or precedent."

Nothing more autocratic has occurred in official circles for a long time than the announcement that the Commissioner and Assistant Commissioner of Patents would grant no hearings during July and August. It is a fit sequel to Boss

Platt being allowed to put a political figurehead in the charge of the enormous interests of the Patent Office. That order, if not set aside by higher authority, will delay the business of every inventor whose case requires a hearing for more than two months and pile up a class of business already in arrears, which will be a future incentive to improper and unjust decisions. These men will continue to draw their salaries during July and August and the government will continue to make a profit on the Patent Office. The injustice of such conditions is apparent to all and the rumpus it will raise will be heard in Congress next winter. The only possible reason for the order is that the Commissioner of Patents and his assistant wish to take things easy for those two months, without regard to the interest of those who will be affected by the order. It is an outrage, which should cost the Commissioner his place.

After thinking the matter over the Cubans accepted the Platt amendment, just as it passed Congress, and their action has been officially communicated to the War Department.

Mr. T. J. McElroy, of Chicago, who belongs to a family of the third term boom which had been started for him, ought to be decidedly beneficial to the democratic party. He said on the subject: "Where can you find another man prominent among the leaders of the republican party whose political life is not entwined with the trusts which sell their products, made in America, at a lower price abroad than they get at home, and this because the high tariff of the U. S. over protects them. Mr. McKinley's declination to run for the Presidency again certainly makes the race among the leaders of his party to succeed him an open, one and it should encourage the democrats to come together and develop their real strength."

## McLAWHORN'S STATEMENT.

A Reply to C. M. Bernard's Statement in The Raleigh Post.

In reply to Mr. C. M. Bernard's statements of the 14th, in the Morning Post, in regard to the little trouble between him and myself I must say, as many other articles which he has written, is far from true. As to the little affray between Mr. Bernard and myself, at the depot in Greenville, I don't propose to go into the full details of the exact proceedings of that as he did, for fortunately to me, there were plenty of "eye witnesses" to tell the tale. But I will state this much, Mr. Bernard walked deliberately against me and as I didn't love him much anyway it put me all out of humor. And as to Mr. Bernard not knowing what he had run into until some one told him afterwards up town is absolutely untrue. He knows me as well by favor as I know my own children. And as to my swearing that I would whip him the first time that I saw him, I do not swear, for the Holy Bible forbids it. And I see that he says positively in his declaration that he did not know me. Still he furthermore says that this was the first time I had laid eyes on him since I served my unfortunate and unjust sentence out in jail. It looks strange to me that he did not know me, but still he knows this to be the first time that I have seen him. I travel some times as well as Mr. Bernard. And I do say, that I can't help feeling a little sore over the treatment which I have received at the hands of Mr. Bernard and squire W. B. Moore, Post Master at Ayden, N. C., for it has been such as to unstring the angel Gabriel. I said then and say again here, that the Post Master, W. B. Moore at Ayden, did break open sealed mail that I sent my wife, and took out part of the contents thereof, and no gentleman would bear the charge who is not guilty. All that I ask today, to prove it before the Federal court, is a fair, just and impartial trial, and Mr. Bernard knows it. He says he has investigated the matter and has found him (Moore) guilty and his only hope for him was to keep him away from trial. This is only one among many of Mr. Bernard's cases of shielding guilty men from justice. In Mr. Bernard's statement he said that he had reported the case to the post office department and had the inspector sent down here. But I will ask him here and now if he did not turn down a warrant for W. B. Moore, sent him by Mr. W. P. Ormond and sworn out by me, and would not give it any consideration at all. But treated it with utmost contempt and sent it back not approved, and kept the matter as quiet as he possibly could. I would further ask him if Hon. J. H. Small was not the man, by request, who reported the matter to the post office department, and asked that it be investigated. Mr. Bernard also stated that the inspector reported to him no evidence in the case. I say that if the inspector did as Mr. Bernard stated that he made out two reports, for he told me that the evidence was as plain as could be, and I should like to know if Mr. Bernard was not the man, who told the inspector that he (Bernard) was personally acquainted with all parties concerned. It was a made up affair, and the evidence was no good. It strikes me that this is about the way of it as Bernard is so frequently given to mistakes. As to Mr. Bernard's and my little collision at the depot at Greenville, for my part, and under the circumstances, I have no apologies to make, but I would say this much for Mr. Bernard's benefit, the next gentleman he runs into, to either side track, or at least ask to be excused, instead of trying to go directly through him. 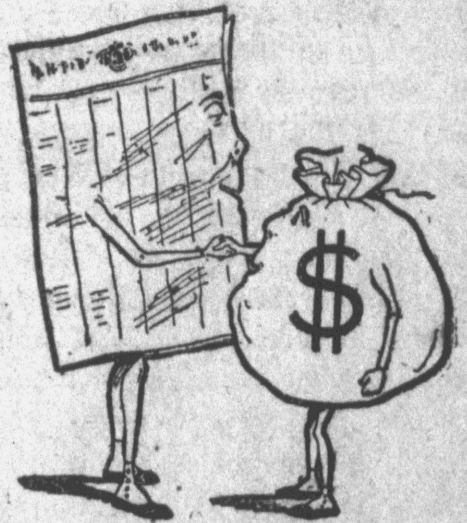
