WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 17th.

It has always been understood that Mr. McKinley was absolutely lacking the sense of humor. That understanding no longer holds good. Whether it was the wording of some of the congratulations showered upon him for his declaration that he would not be a third term candidate that aroused the sense of humor in him, doesn't matter. The fact remains that he now has it.

Boss Platt's new Commissioner of Patents has evidently taken "public office as a private snap" for his motto and thereby he is likely to get himself and the administration in hot water, unless some of his superiors in office are wise enough to make him withdraw his outrageous order, suspending hearings before himself and the assistant Commissioner of Patents, for the months of July and August thereby delaying for two months the business of every inventor whose case requires a hearing.

Senator Martin, of Virginia, who is in Washington, on official business, said of the work of the State Constitutional Convention, now sitting in Richmond: "The question of Suffrage is a difficult problem, but I feel that the Convention will be able to solve it to the satisfaction of the greater portion of conservative Virginians."

"Teddy" has made a bid for the support of the "nigger" delegates to the Republican National Convention, by appointing a "nigger" his messenger--this is the only appointment at the disposal of the Vice Presidents, although Senators told him that it was against precedent to have a "nigger" messenger around the Senate. Those who know the sort of arguments required to get the "nigger" votes in a Republican National Convention, regard "Teddy's" bid as a joke.

The tariff fight in the Republican party is already on. Senator Aldrich, Chairman of the Finance Committee and of the Republican Steering Committee, and who wields a greater influence with the Republican Senators than any other man in the Senate, led the fight which resulted in hanging up all the administration reciprocity treaties in the last Congress, and he is leading the new fight. He has served notice on Mr. McKinley that no treaty with the new government of Cuba, which is to be established as a result of the unconditional acceptance of the Platt amendment by the Cuban Constitutional Convention providing for tariff concessions on Cuban tobacco and sugar, will be ratified by the Senate; also that the fight against the ratification of the reciprocity treaties already negotiated would be continued. This is flying directly in the face of Mr. McKinley's constantly repeated declarations, in favor of reciprocity and means a hot fight in the Senate, which may later figure in the Congressional campaign of next year. Mr. Aldrich is not the sort of man to go off half cocked; hence the belief that he is assured of strong republican backing.

Henry Urquhart and Charlie Hutefins, where they were waited on by Misses Sallie Peebles, Elise Urquhart, Sue Urquhart and Mae Bailey. ### OUR RALEIGH LETTER

Special Correspondent of Reflector.

RALEIGH, N. C. June, 17

One of the most important events to note is the meeting of the Teachers' Assembly, which was in session all of last week at Wrightsville Beach, near Wilmington, and which was addressed by many able men, including Governor Aycock and a long list of our leading educators.

The new officers elected are: President, Edward Mimms, of Trinity College; Secretary, W. D. Carmichael, Principal of the Durham graded schools; Vice-Presidents, E. W. Sykes, Wake Forest College; Washington Catlett, Cape Fear Academy, Wilmington; Ernest Mangum, Wilson graded schools; R. L. L. Madison, Cullowhee High School, Jackson; J. A. Holmes, State University; P. P. Claxton, Greensboro Normal; Miss Haliburton, Asheville city schools; T. D. Bratton, St. Mary's, Raleigh.

A NORTH CAROLINA LAWYER'S LUCK.

There are few of us who would object to "happening" to a piece of unexpected good fortune like this—explained in an account from Concord on the 14th—the correctness of which being vouched for "Mr. M. H. H. Caldwell, attorney for Mr. Dillon Brown, of New York, who is now in North Carolina, living near the Narrows on the Yadkin River, and engaged in harnessing the water-power of that river, has had an experience something like Aladdin was wont to enjoy on rubbing his lamp. Last night there arrived at Mr. Caldwell's home in South Concord, sent by Mr. Brown as a present to his lawyer, a pair of matched bay horses, the harness to put on them a trap and buggy to hitch them to, \$60 worth of grass seed, a fine cooking range and six Jersey cattle. No fairy tale, this, but solid fact."

"NON-INDIGENT" INSANE IN ASYLUMS.

It will be remembered that during the last session of the legislature the matter of the support of insane persons in the State Hospitals who possessed means of their own or whose relatives charged with their care who able to support them, caused much discussions and finally legislative action.

During the last few days the Directors for the Asylum at Morganton have had the matter up, and among other things decided was:

"Whereas, The Attorney-General has declined to furnish the board the information requested of him concerning the ability of the present inmates of the Hospital to pay for their maintenance, etc., and the board is forced to act upon such information as they now possess and can obtain;

"Resolved, That the committee recommend that all non-indigent patients, male and female, who are able to work and whose labor is worth as much as the cost of the State of their care and maintenance, be kept free of charge.

"The committee recommend that the charge for the maintenance of the non-indigent insane be fixed at the per capita cost allowed by the State, and shall have the same fare and treatment as indigent patients, but if extras are demanded \$12.50 additional per month shall be paid.

"We also recommend that if the friends of indigent patients are willing to pay for these extras, they shall have them at the same rate, to wit, \$12.50 per month and no more.
