### OUR RALEIGH LETTER

Special Correspondent of Reflector.

RALEIGH, N. C., July 1.

A report has gone out from here during the past week to the effect that the auditorium plan has fallen through and that Raleigh will not have improved and enlarged facilities for accommodating State conventions and the like in the near future. It's all a mistake, and we will have a big combined theatre-auditorium long before the time for holding another political State convention arrives.

As to hotel accommodations, there are three commodious hotels here, two of which with about 150 rooms, are now closed. These will be thrown open to accommodate 300 to 500 guests and with the other hotel and boarding houses could well take care of 1,000 delegates or other visitors. Still, we need a new and more modern and up-to-date hotel, and expect to build that, too, in ample time. Raleigh can and will do its part, and the conventions will continue to be held here.

### NEW PROFESSOR.

There are said to be more than twenty applicants for the professorship of Agriculture at the A. & M. College here, the salary of which has been fixed at \$2,500. The very best man for the place that can be secured will be selected. President Winston, Chairman Primrose of the Board of Visitors, and the Board of Agriculture are actively interesting themselves to this end, and to secure a like person of scholarly attainments and experience as State Veterinarian and Professor of Animal Industry.

### OXFORD ORPHAN ASYLUM MANAGEMENT.

The directors of the Oxford Orphanage have elected the following officers for the ensuing year: Superintendent, W. J. Hicks; Secretary and Treasurer, G. Rosenthal; Supervisor of Female Department, Mrs. N. N. Bemis; Hospital Matron, Miss Beile Austin; Superintendent Printing Department, E. W. Jones; Clerk, J. C. Turner; Managers of Laundry and Kitchen Department, Miss Fannie Fenister and Miss Cora Hogan; Editor Masonic Department "Orphan's Friend," Hon. John Nichols, Past Grand Master; Superintendent Sewing Department, Miss Maggie Myers. Eight female teachers were also elected. The resignation of Mr. B. N. Duke, of Durham, who has been such a good friend of the institution, was accepted with regret, and Mr. C. W. Toms elected to fill the vacancy. There are 226 little orphans at present in the asylum, which is managed by the Grand Lodge of

Masons, and it is a noble work in which they are engaged.

### VARIOUS MATTERS OF INTEREST.

The drowning (by the capsizing of a row-boat last Friday evening) of ex-Postmaster and Collector of Customs at Newbern, Wm. E. Clarke, his two little daughters, Mary and Frances, and young George Bryan, aged 15 years, was a shocking and deplorable accident. Mr. Clarke was a prominent Republican and well known throughout the State.

The N. C. dentists closed their annual meeting Friday night at Morehead, after electing the following officers for the ensuing year: President, J. S. Spurgeon; vice-presidents, J. D. Biggs and J. H. Benton; treasurer, D. L. James; secretary, J. M. Fleming; examining board, V. E. Turner, S. P. Hilliard, R. H. Jones, T. M. Hunter, J. E. Matthews, C. A. Bland; executive committee, D. E. Eyeritt, N. G. Carroll, E. J. Tucker. Executive committee will select next place of meeting.

The annual meeting of the N. C. Bar Association in session at Wrightsville last week adjourned Friday after the most successful meeting yet held, President Chas. M. Steadman declared. The new officers are: President, C. M. Busbee; vice-presidents, one from each judicial district; secretary and treasurer, J. Crawford Biggs.

The government reports, received here, show that only about one-third of the blind children of N. C. receive any benefits from the institution for the blind here. The address of each blind child is given and extra efforts should be made to reach and draw them in. That's what the asylum for the blind is for.

Col. W. T. Old, of Elizabeth City, has been appointed commander of the North Carolina Naval Brigade to succeed Capt. H. H. McIlhenny resigned.

Adjutant-General Royster has ordered \$18,000 worth of military supplies for the North Carolina militia, including uniforms, rifles, bayonets, etc., and instruments for three regimental bands, which will be located at Wilmington, Reidsville and Asheville. The encampment promises to be a most successful one this year.

Today being the beginning of a new fiscal year in the municipal government, there was a change in administration. The old Board met at 10 o'clock to receive the report of Treasurer J. N. Hart and to turn over to their successors.

This was approved by the finance committee.

The financial exhibit of the town the fiscal year was ordered published in THE DAILY REFLECTOR.

On motion of Alderman W. R. Parker, a vote of thanks of the Board was extended to Mayor J. G. Moye for the faithfulness and excellence of his administration as Mayor the last two years. Mayor Moye responded to the vote of thanks and expressed his appreciation of the courtesy the Board had always shown. Greenville has never had a better Mayor than Mr. Moye made. A committee was appointed to notify the new Board that the old Board was ready to turn over the government of the town to them. The members of the new Board—E. M. McGowan, J. B. White, R. J. Cobb, E. B. Ficklen, J. L. Little, H. L. Coward, C. T. Munford and J. S. Tunstall—came forward and were sworn in by Mayor Moye, who then vacated the chair. The new Board elected J. B. White chairman and Mayor protem.

J. L. Little and C. T. Munford immediately presented their resignations as Aldermen which after some discussion were accepted. The remaining six Aldermen proceeded to the election of officers, with the following result:

Lamp Lighter—Henry Duff.

On the vote for Assistant Police there was a tie for two ballots between A. A. Forbes, Jr., and E. B. Dudley, when the filling of this office was deferred until there be a full Board of Aldermen.

C. D. Rountree, tax collector, presented his official bond in the sum of \$5,000 with R. J. Cobb, G. E. Harris and G. F. Evans as sureties which was accepted.

The tax for retail liquor license was placed at \$150 per year, (payable semi-annually). Malt license \$30 per year, pool, bagatelle and billiard tables \$10 per year each.

Retail liquor license were granted to M. L. Starkey, B. F. Jolley, W. E. Jolley, J. A. Brady, W. C. Dudley, E. M. Cheek, agent, R. A. Nichols, Z. V. Hooker & Co., L. Hooker & Co., and John Howard, Jr.

Malt license to E. H. Shelburn. Pool table license to E. M. Cheek, agent, and John H. Howard, Jr.

H. C. Hooker was elected Alderman to succeed J. L. Little, resigned, and W. B. Wilson to succeed C. T. Munford, resigned. Mr. Hooker accepted and qualified.

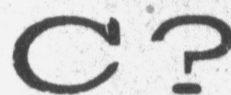
