The pension list of North Carolina has been greatly increased in the past few days. This is due in part to the fact that a new roll was made out and all who thought they were entitled to pensions went before the boards, and in part to the disablement that age has brought to many of the veterans.

It has been pointed out that no man has ever been elected President of the United States while he was a member of the Federal Senate. The national traditions are in opposition to such a proceeding, we are told, and the numerous Presidential bees now buzzing in Senatorial ears will bring in the end only a message of disappointment.

The accused is said to have operated from Winona, Minn; Winston, N. C.; Great Barrington, Mass.; Easton, Pa.; Cleveland, St. Louis, Omaha and Boston.—Philadelphia Record.

##### K. of P. Investigation.

Chicago, July 9.—Behind closed and carefully guarded doors, the supreme lodge of the Knights of Pythias today met here in special session to consider alleged "injurious handling of funds of the endowment rank of the order." Members of the fraternal organizations both in the United States and Canada are said to be intensely interested in the outcome of the investigation, a report of which will be made during the present meeting by President C. It also is probable that proceedings on criminal charges will be instituted against three former members of the board of control.

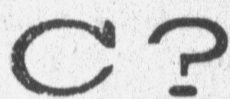
