Perjury.

No honest lawyer would encourage false swearing; but when a lawyer is guilty of encouraging perjury in a witness he should be sent to the penitentiary along with the perjurer. Morally guilty of crime, also is that lawyer who abuses witnesses, attacks the dead, assails character, and makes base appeals to the ignorance, the passions, prejudices of jurors. There appears to be a looseness about the law or the courts and the practice that permits crimes and acts against justice and decency and truth and fairness to be committed with almost absolute impunity in the very temples of justice. Rarely is there a determined attempt to punish the perjurer, who is too often aided and abetted by those who profess to be honest and respectable. The courts, of which the lawyers are a part, are to blame for much of this. The solemnity of an oath should be emphasized. The violation of it should be speedily punished. False swearing is a villainous crime to which many are too easily tempted, and it deserves severe punishment. —Nashville American.
