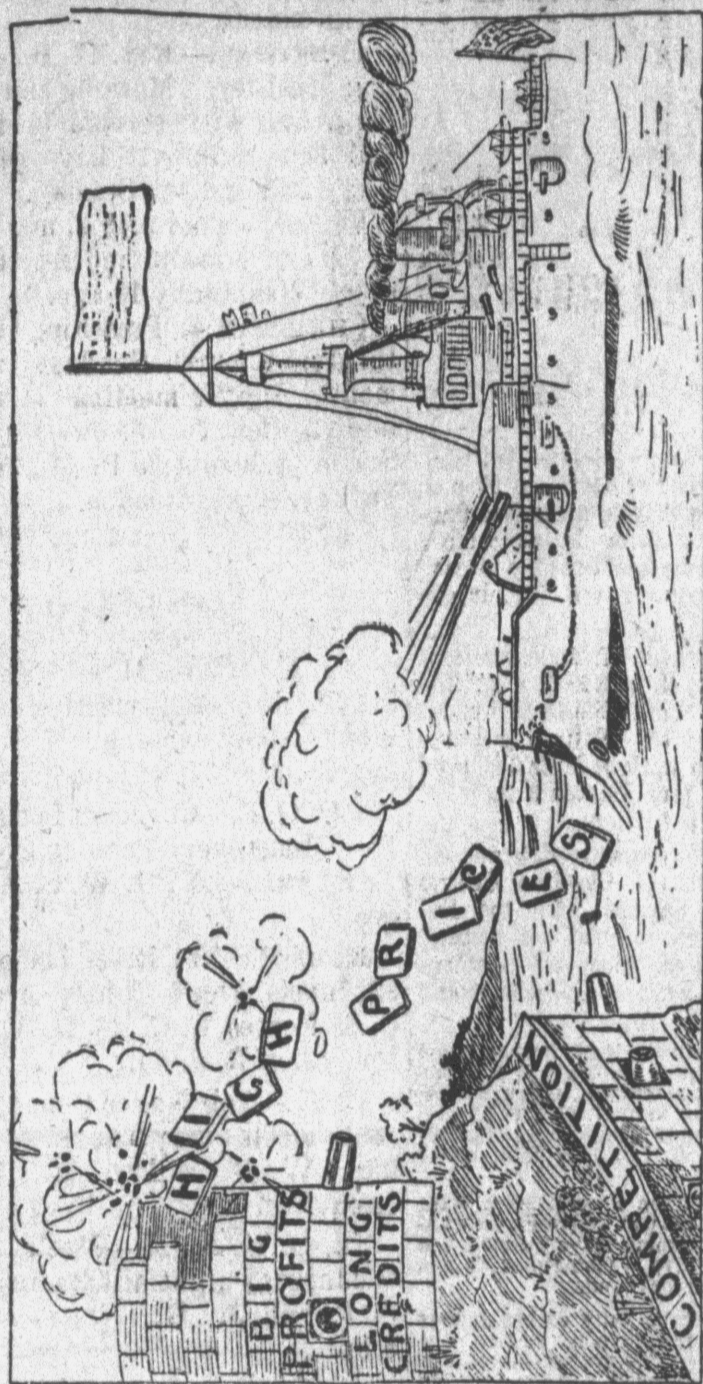

MASS MEETING CALLED.

At a special meeting of the Board of Aldermen held last night the following appropriate resolution were passed. We believe that our citizens ought to respond to the request in order that the memorial exercises may be as largely attended as possible.

We the Board of Aldermen of the town of Greenville, State of North Carolina, in special meeting assembled do resolve.

1. That in common with all law abiding American citizens we deplore the death of President McKinley and mourn his loss to the Country.
2. That we denounce his assassination and all teaching, no matter by whom given, which tend to lead to like results and we demand the passage of appropriate laws, both State and National, for the suppression of such teachings and the punishment of all persons who harbor or promulgate them.
3. That in order to give the citizens of Greenville an opportunity to give expression to their sorrow in this great calamity which has befallen the Country a public meeting is hereby appointed to take place in the Court House at noon September, 19th, 1901, in which appropriate memorial service will be conducted at the same time that the public funeral services take place in Canton, Ohio.
4. That the citizens are earnestly requested to suspend all business and close up their places of business during the hour of these memorial services, and that the Mayor is hereby requested to make all needful preparations for a proper observance of these services.
5. That these resolutions be spread upon the minutes and published in THE DAILY REFLECTOR and King's Weekly.

- Frank Forbes drunk and down on the street, fined one dollar and cost total \$3.20.
- Jim Norcott and Sam Joyner, riotous and disorderly conduct and affray, fined one dollar each and cost total \$6.65 each \$3.32 1/2.

Trouble Follows the Firing of a Big Gun in Portsmouth.

Norfolk, Va., Sept. 15.—In obedience to orders issued by Governor J. Hoge Tyler, all the batteries of the Virginia Volunteer Artillery were out this morning before sunrise for the purpose of firing every half hour until sunset in respect to the dead President. One of these batteries was Grimes' Battery, of Portsmouth, under the command of Captain Warren, whose piece was placed at the corner of Court and High streets, right in the centre of the city, and in front of the Madison Hotel. At the moment of sunrise the first report roared out and an instant later several windows in the hotel fell in, shattered by the concussion. Police hurried to the scene and placed Captain Warren under arrest, telling the members of the battery that if the gun was fired again the whole troop would be arrested. The men had their orders to fire every half-hour from the Governor and they determined to do their duty, so when the half-hour had expired again the cannon roared. Then the police arrested them all. At headquarters the matter was finally settled and the battery moved its cannon to the water front, where the regular half-hour guns were fired until sunset.

An Anarchist Tied Up and Whipped
Martinsville, Ind., Sept. 15.—Jos. Pelferer, an anarchist, who was knocked down a week ago when he said he was glad President McKinley was shot, was visited by a party of unknown men last midnight, taken to a grove near town, stripped, tied to a tree and severely whipped.

McKinley's life insurance is said not to exceed \$75,000.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 16.

After the hopeful bulletins of the first few days, the news of President McKinley's death was a shock almost as great as the report of his assassination.

He will be buried tomorrow at Gatesville, his native place, and where reside most of his relatives. Mr. Eure left surviving him of his immediate family, his father, Judge Eure, of Norfolk, and an only sister, Mrs. Dr. Bell, of Wilmington, N. C.

At a recent re-union of a family named Chick, in Maine, there were five sisters, the oldest of whom was eighty-eight years, the youngest seventy. Their combined ages were 470 years. These were no spring Chick-ens. — Wilmington Star.
