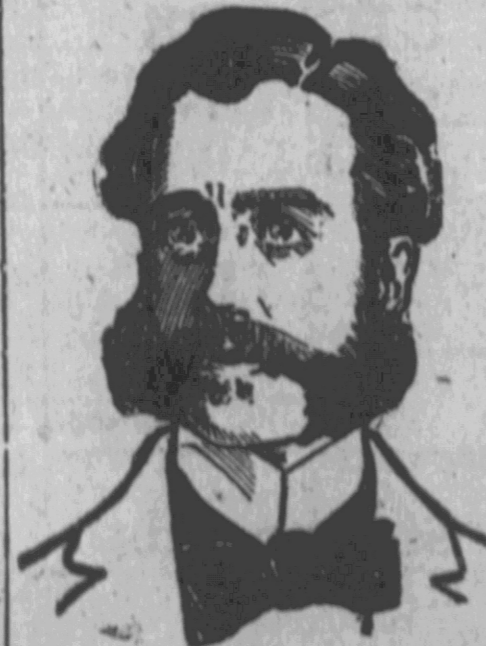

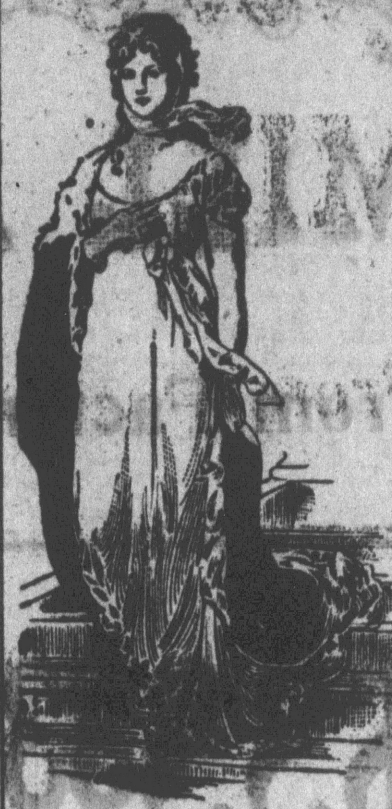
Tobacco Goes High as a Kite.

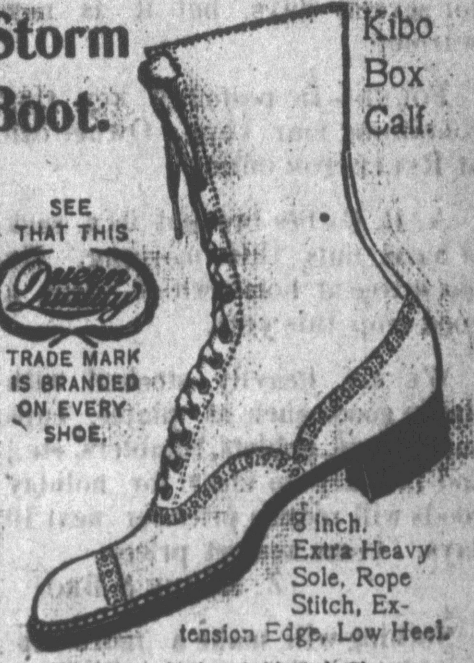
