There has been so much said in regard to what is called slot machines, we publish below the act of the Legislature under which it is claimed these machines are operated:

Sec. 61. * * * On each slot machine where the return is certain to be of a value equal to the amount deposited, but may be of a greater value, ten dollars. The taxes in this section shall be paid to the Sheriff or tax collector of the county, but shall not be construed as giving license or relieving such persons or establishments from any penalties incurred by violation of the law. Each slot machine taxed under this section shall have the Sheriff's license conspicuously posted upon it. * * * It shall be unlawful for any firm, corporation or person to operate a slot machine when the return is uncertain and sometimes nothing; and any one violating this provision shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and punished in discretion of the Court: Provided further, that owners or operators of slot machines shall be repaid taxes already paid by them proportionate to the time for which they shall not operate such machines by virtue of this act.

Sec. 62. Any person, firm, or corporation, having on a street, alley or other place in any city or town, or on any public road in any county, or in shops, stores, hotels, boarding houses, depots, or public or private rooms, or any other place anywhere in the State of North Carolina, a slot machine of any description, into which are dropped pennies, nickels or coins of other denominations, to dispose of cigars, cigarettes, chewing gum, or other articles of merchandise, or musical, weighing, or other devices that operate on the nickel-in-the-slot principle used for gain, shall pay for every such slot machine, or musical, weighing or other devices, as the case may be, a license tax of two dollars and fifty cents per year, for the use and benefit of the State, to be collected and accounted for as all other taxes: Provided, that this section shall apply only to such slot machines where the return in all cases is fixed or certain.

After reading this law and speaking with the Solicitor and others, it seems clear that the leading fault in this matter comes from the fact that the Legislature should have enacted such a law as this, providing as it does for the operation of any machine that is of a doubtful benefit to a community, but we feel equally confident that the machines that have been referred to as operating in this and other towns do not come under the provisions of this act and are gambling machines pure and simple.

However, if any of the parties who have seen or who know of the operation of gambling machines under a slot machine license, or any other manner, it is their privilege to swear out a warrant

against the parties operating it, or who allow it to be operated in their place of business, and bring the offender to trial before any Justice of the Peace of the county, and with the proper evidence the case will then be brought regularly to court. If this is not done then no indictment of these machines can be had until the January court at which time we assume that the Grand Jury will take hold of the matter, and it will be prosecuted in the Superior Court.

We desire to inform the New Bern correspondent of the Raleigh Post, whose letter we copied a few days ago, that Mr. Pace is not a resident of Greenville, and to further state to him that the indictments pending in this court will be prosecuted with all the ability of our Solicitor when they can be reached for trial. It is not customary to take matters up at the same term at which they are presented and it is never done, and if the correspondent will take the trouble to investigate he will find that more than twenty cases of importance were compelled to be continued at New Bern court for the reason that court could not complete its work in the time allowed by law for the term.

The total number of licenses issued for the month of November was 39—whites 18, colored 21.

It is quite noticeable from the verdicts of juries in Iredell courts that public sentiment has changed much recently in regard to damage suits against corporations. Formerly it was only necessary to bring a suit against a corporation—especially a railroad—no matter whether the suit had any real foundation, in order to get damages. In numbers of instances, a few years ago, hundreds and thousands of dollars were awarded for the most trivial causes, and the corporations were really held up and robbed under the form of law. But it is not so now. Generally speaking, the man who brings suit for damages must have a good case if he wins before an Iredell jury. This is creditable to our citizenship. The people of Iredell are honest and fair and if they have a proper understanding of the situation they will do exact justice. They have begun to realize recently, as all intelligent and fair-minded men have realized, that many of the suits brought against corporations are simply schemes to obtain money—nothing more nor less. This is not saying, as any intelligent person knows, that there are not cases in which corporations should be made to pay damages. They at times disregard the rights of the public, are careless of the safety and rights of their patrons, and through criminal negligence inflict injury to person or property. In such cases they should be, as they generally are, made to pay for their negligence. But the public is fast learning to treat corporations as individuals and to do them strict justice without prejudice—which is right.—Statesville Landmark.
