Newspapers in the State.

State Labor Commissioner Varner has completed a summary of North Carolina newspaper statistics. He says there are eight morning dailies, with a total circulation of 25,775; 22 evening dailies with a circulation of 22,735; 193 weeklies, circulation 253,601; 20 semi-weeklies, circulation 28,730; 51 monthlies, circulation 76,844; 10 semi-monthlies, circulation 15,600; four quarterlies, circulation 300; total 315; total circulation 605,035, including 5 almanacs with 177,500 circulation. He says that while ten years ago the average circulation of weeklies was only 606, it is now 1,365, and the improvement mechanical and otherwise has kept pace with this increase.

As to politics there are 145 Democratic, 11 independent Democratic, 20 Republican, 2 Populist, 33 independent papers. There are 13 Baptist, 5 Methodist, 3 Christian, 3 Protestant Episcopal, 5 Presbyterian, 14 educational, 2 holiness, 4 medical, 3 agricultural, 3 textile, 6 news, 2 industrial. Only one paper charges no subscription. It is published at Winston.

The Amos Owens Cherry Tree Company a Fraud.

An investigation of the Amos Owens Cherry Tree Company, of Henrietta, N. C., has been conducted by the commission controlling crop pests, which is charged with the annual inspection of all nurseries of the State.

Our investigation proves to our satisfaction the concern to be a fraud, and the findings are here published for the information of the public:

We find that the company has been under the management of the following persons, in the order named: Dr. Frank Bright, Henrietta, N. C.; Rev. T. Bright (father of Frank Bright), C. B. Wilkie, Rutherfordton; Chas. Watkins, Henrietta (T), and Geo. W. Rolins, Forest City, and C. M. (or M. C.) Paget, of Henrietta, or Forest City.

The principal facts found damaging to the company are:

- 1. The transfer of the certificate issued by the commission without knowledge or consent of the commission, and its use upon stock not intended to be covered by it.
2. The non-payment of agents who had apparently fulfilled their part of the contract.
3. The inferior quality and grading of the trees sold by the company.
4. Frequency with which the ownership of the concern has changed hands.
5. The direct fraudulent dealings of the company in purchasing trees from distant sources (Mitchell county), and having such trees shipped under the label, 'Amos Owen Cherry Trees.'

We believe the company to be an absolute fraud, and warn all persons accordingly.
