WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 31.
I am told, on excellent authority, that Senators Lodge and Cullom have assured the President that his views in regard to Cuban reciprocity will be carried into effect. It is the desire of the Senate that the House should formulate and pass a bill providing concessions on imports from Cuba and a strong fight for that end will be made by Representative Hopkins, of Illinois, in the Ways and Means Committee. Mr. Hopkins is an influential member of the committee and he will be ably seconded in the effort by Representative McCall while it is believed that General Grosvenor, who appreciates that the Senate will act if the House does not, desires such action if only to preserve the dignity of the House. If the House should fail to enact such a measure the State Department will negotiate a reciprocal treaty with Cuba and the Senate will ratify it, irrespective of the wishes of the lower chamber.

The action, or rather lack of action of the democrats in the House is causing considerable worry on the part of the republican leaders. The minority realizes that its views will be received with little consideration in instances where the majority is loth to accept the onus which may attach to any measure. They are, therefore, refusing to express their views on the Cuban reciprocity question with an object to compel the republicans to first commit themselves. They have, when questioned on the subject by the republican leaders, simply asked why the administration, either through its bureaus or through its friends in Congress, did not prepare a bill and then ask for it democratic support. This question is embarrassing to the republicans who, whatever their action, hope to place on democratic shoulders all blame which may attach to it. How long the majority will play its waiting game is not known but it is safe to assume that the minority will play one day longer.

Ground-Hog Day.

Sunday is "Ground-hog" day, when the traditional weather sign indicates (as some people believe) whether the winter is nearly gone. According to this old tradition, if the ground-hog comes out of its winter quarters on the second of February and sees its shadow it goes back, again, because the winter is only half gone. But if it does not see its shadow, that is if the sun does not shine on that day, then it does not go back because there will not be much more wintry weather.

Big Fire in Norfolk.

Norfolk had a disastrous fire Thursday night. The fire started a little after 2 o'clock in the Columbian building. This adjoined the Atlantic hotel which was also destroyed, together with several other large buildings. The entire block was swept before the fire could be checked. The loss is estimated at half a million dollars. It was the worst fire Norfolk has had.

To Abolish Jackson City.

The famous suburb which served as an outlet of the tough element of Washington is about to be abolished. It is just across the Long bridge in Virginia and out of the jurisdiction of the federal government. All efforts to suppress it have been in vain, and it has been the nightly scene of unrestrained lawlessness, disorder and crime. The Pennsylvania Railroad company has bought up the land on which the vicious resorts of Jackson City stand, and these places will be torn down to make room for the new bridge across the river. When the owners found that there was a demand for their property, they advanced the price, and for some of these resorts the Pennsylvania railroad paid enormous sums. The company intends to wipe out Jackson City.
