### STATE NEWS.

#### Happenings in North Carolina.

The monthly pay-rolls of the manufacturing plants in Durham aggregate \$106,000.

James Jones, while driving to wards his home from Mt. Olive, Tuesday evening, was thrown from his buggy and killed.

A farmers' institute will be held at Tarboro Tuesday and Wednesday, 25th and 26th. Quite a program is prepared for it.

The Southerner says it is reported the Old Dominion Steamship Co. will stop running their boats to Tarboro, for lack of patronage.

Mr. Hector McLean died Saturday at his residence in Harnett county, aged 93 years, beginning to pass away with the setting in of the great snow storm. His twin-brother, Hugh McLean, died three years ago, and it is a singular fact that a great mantle of snow covered the earth in his last hours.

#### Betrayer Shot in the Street.

Norfolk, Feb. 18.—William Shipp and Walter Gray were probably mortally wounded here this afternoon by Levi D. Walker, who fired upon them as they stood with several other young fellows on the street corner, conversing about a trial in which all participated this morning. Walker, eye-witnesses say, came down the street toward the crowd with his hand in the pocket of a sack coat he wore, and when but a few yards distant fired five shots into the crowd in quick succession. Two shots struck Shipp and one struck Gray. The surgeon says Shipp's wounds are especially dangerous and Gray has a better chance to recover.

After the shooting Walker went to meet Policeman Dozier, who was coming to arrest him, and surrendered himself. At the jail he told the reporter that he shot Shipp because Shipp had ruined his sister, and said he did not mean to shoot Gray. He appeared quite cool and evidently considered that he had done a justifiable thing.

After it became known what actuated him many men expressed approval of his act. The boy, who is only twenty years of age, passed through a terrible ordeal an hour before the shooting. He and his old father stood in the police court where Levi's sister Bessie, a girl of seventeen, was the complainant against Shipp, whom she charged with betraying her under promise of marriage, and heard Shipp admit that he had ruined her, but deny that he had promised to marry her, and heard several of Shipp's associates (young fellows of about his age) swear that they knew her to be unchaste. Gray, who was afterward shot, was one of them. The girl was unable to prove that Shipp had promised to marry her, and the case was dismissed.

### Skeleton in the Closet.

Syracuse, N. Y., Feb. 18.—While tearing down the old Vandemark House, at South Troupsburg, carpenters found the skeleton of a man between the partitions in one of the rooms. The house has been vacant for many years and the discovery has created great excitement. It is said that a peddler was seen to enter the house twenty years ago and was never seen afterward. There was no opening in the partition, and how a person could get in there unless imprisoned and walled up is a great mystery.

### Gen. Toon Dead.

Raleigh, N. C. Feb. 19.—Gen. T. F. Toon, State Superintendent of education, died this morning.

He had been sick sometime, but recently had apparently been on the road to recovery. His death this morning was unexpected.

Gen. Toon was an old Confederate soldier and bore a high reputation for his soldierly qualities. He made a tour of the State in the last campaign, speaking for the ratification of the constitutional amendment and materially helped in the passage of the measure.

Says the Charlotte Observer: The name of Col. Claude Melnett Bernard, the sawed-off ex-district attorney for the eastern district of North Carolina, has, since his relief was withdrawn and transferred to his neighbor, Col. Harrison Skinner, been much associated with a possible new newspaper enterprise in Raleigh. He was in Washington Monday and our special from that city in yesterday's issue says he has not yet decided whether to go into business or not. Before he does decide he would be wise to ponder well in his heart the words of that beautiful poem:
