Congressman Kitchin has secured an order for the establishment of rural free delivery routes in Greene county. Heretofore they have only been established at railroad points.

Secretary of the Navy Long has resigned as a member of President Roosevelt's cabinet, to take effect May 1st. Congressman W. H. Moody, of Massachusetts, has been chosen as his successor.

Prince Henry, of Prussia, has finished his visit to America, and is now on his way back home. He was given a most cordial reception by the Americans and expressed himself as highly pleased.

Congress did not classify the rural free delivery service and place the carriers under the contract system. On the contrary the salary to carriers was continued and the amount raised from \$500 to \$600.

The grand jury of Pasquotank county Superior court, on Tuesday found a true bill against James Wilcox for the murder of Miss Ella Cropsey. The case was set for trial Thursday and a venire of 250 ordered.

To a man a long ways off there are funny things about these war stories. England has several times declared that the war in South Africa has ended, yet no longer than last Friday the Boers gave the Britains the worst set back they have received through the entire conflict. General Lord Methuen was wounded and taken prisoner, 3 officers and 38 men killed, 5 officers and 72 men wounded and 200 missing. That is as bad as our Philippine war which has ended so many times.

Much is being said in the papers about the abandonment of the proposed trip of Miss Alice Roosevelt, daughter of the President, to Europe to attend the coronation of King Edward in June. The Philadelphia Record says Mark Hanna is responsible for breaking up the trip and disappointing the young lady, the reason brought to bear on the President being that for his daughter to go as his representative on such an occasion and receive all the courtesies that would

Commissioner S. L. Patterson and State Chemist B. W. Kilgore have been in Washington for the past two days, trying to interest Secretary Wilson, of the Department of Agriculture, in the cultivation of Sumatra and other fine tobaccos in North Carolina. The government has undertaken the experiment of the cultivation of Sumatra tobacco in Connecticut, Pennsylvania and other States. These experiments have been eminently successful. The soil surveys made in North Carolina last year show that in the western and eastern sections the soil is of the character of that on which experiments were successfully made in Connecticut. The department has four experts in that State showing the people how to cultivate Sumatra tobacco. Dr. Kilgore believes it can be grown equally as successfully in North Carolina and will begin experimenting on the test farm. Mr. Patterson is anxious to get an expert from the government to superintend the cultivation, but it is very doubtful if this can be done unless the bill giving the department an increased appropriation is passed by Congress.—Raleigh News and Observer.

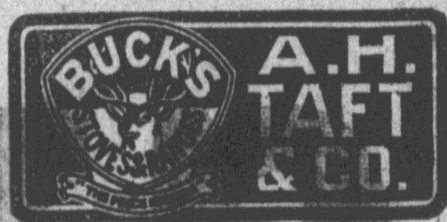
