Pneumonia chief Danger.

People are growing healthier and lives are becoming longer in this country, if medical statistics can be relied on. According to figures published in the last week life has been lengthened by an average of 4.1 years in the last decade.

In 1890 the average length of life in the United States was 31.1 years. In 1900 this mean average had risen to 35.2 years, chiefly by reason of the decrease in mortality among the very young.

The three diseases which have caused the most deaths in recent years are pneumonia, consumption and heart disease, in the order named. Death from the first cause have increased slightly and medical science has made comparatively little progress in finding a specific treatment for it.

Pneumonia is an infectious disease like tuberculosis. Although it is not so contagious as are many other diseases, the sanitation of houses, schools, shops, factories, places of business and amusement, in medical opinion, undoubtedly determines to a great extent the vulnerability of the system to it.

Neglect of the ordinary laws of health is responsible for many cases of pneumonia. Among personal measures suggested for its prevention are avoidance of undue exposure to inclement weather and of crowded and ill-ventilated gatherings; temperance in eating and drinking, daily bathing and regular exercise in the open air with special reference to complete respiration.

There is nothing better than systematic deep breathing while briskly walking out of doors.—New York Sun.

Vaccination Took After Two Years.

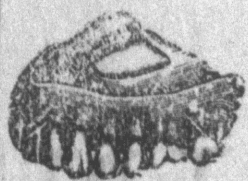
The remarkable case of a small girl whose vaccination took after two years' delay should be some consolation to those who have got over it quickly.

Inquiry revealed that the little girl had not been re-vaccinated, though all the symptoms might have indicated that she had.

When the child's recovery was certain they agreed that the one explanation feasible was that the vaccination had remained latent in the child's system for two years and that the fever had started it afresh.

STATE NEWS.

Happenings In North Carolina.

Thomas Moore, a farmer near Price, Rockingham county, has died from injuries received in a friendly wrestling boat.

A. N. Perkins, of Greensboro, has leased the Atlantic Hotel at Morehead City for this summer and will open it June 5th.

Asheville has prepared to entertain 4,000 delegates during the Southern Baptist Convention which meets there in a few days.

Strawberry shipments along the line of the Wilmington and Weldon railroad are so heavy that the price north has dropped to 16 cents per quart.

The executive committee of the North Carolina Teachers' Assembly has selected Morehead City as the place of meeting this year. The date is June 10-15.

W. J. Brothers, former postmaster at Institute, in Lenoir county, who was indicted for tampering with letters, was found guilty in the recent Federal court at New Bern. He was sentenced to three months' imprisonment and a fine of \$100.

Mr. Thomas Jones, of Greene county, while returning home from Kinston last night, was held up and robbed by three highwaymen. The robbery took place about a mile beyond Glenfield. Mr. Jones was driving along at a good pace when the three men suddenly rushed upon him, covering him with pistols. One of them held the horse while the others rifled his pockets, securing about \$5, all the money he had on his person. Not a word was spoken. Mr. Jones does not know whether the men were white or black. He says he was too frightened to offer resistance.—Kinston Free Press, 30th.

TOWN MATTERS.

Proceedings of Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen met Thursday night in regular monthly session, every member being present.

The finance committee reported about \$2,300 on hand in the general fund.

The street committee reported that nothing had yet been done relative to improving Dickinson avenue.

The other regular committees had no reports to make.

The special committee appointed at last meeting to confer with a committee from the County Board of Education and the attorneys on both sides to ascertain what amount of fines collected by the town is due to the schools made report that they had carefully gone over all records for two years back and found that the total amount of fines imposed and collected by the town for that time was \$554.10, and that there had already been paid over to the school fund \$357.56, leaving still due \$196.24. The report was adopted and an order passed that this amount be paid to the County Treasurer for the school fund.

The point of contention now on the part of the School Board is that the town was liable for the fines for three years, but the attorneys for the town held that they were only entitled to recover for two years, and the report of the committee was based on that opinion.

A committee was appointed to confer with the Board of County Commissioners relative to the town and county jointly purchasing a clock to be placed in the court house tower, the committee being given power to act if the Commissioners join in the matter and it is found that the clock can be obtained at a reasonable figure.

The Tax Collector, Chief and Assistant Police filed their reports of collections made during the past month.

It being stated that the poll holders of the Third ward and the registrar of the fifth ward, appointed at last meeting for the election in June, had signified that they could not serve, J. D. Garden and W. H. Smith were appointed poll holders in the Third ward, and W. P. Edwards registrar in the Fifth ward.

A committee was appointed to confer with ex-Mayor J. G. Moye and F. G. James, attorney, relative to the latter having been employed in the prosecution of W. A. Bright.

Dr. C. O'H. Laughinghouse appeared before the Board in behalf of the hospital contemplated for Greenville and explained the need of such an institution. The Board decided to make an appropriation of \$1,000, one-half to be paid when the hospital is assured, the balance to be paid one year later, and it was also recommended that the town give an endowment of \$50 per month for maintaining the hospital after it is established.

Dr. Laughinghouse was thanked for the interest he is taking in the hospital.

L. M. Savage called attention to an error he had made in listing his taxes for last year and asked that the amount overpaid in consequence of the error be refunded. A committee was appointed to investigate the matter with the Tax Collector.

C. D. Rountree was appointed to list the taxable property of the town for the year 1902 and make the necessary books of the same, the compensation to be \$75.

Accounts were allowed and paid amounting to \$865 12.

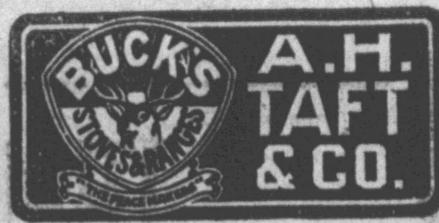

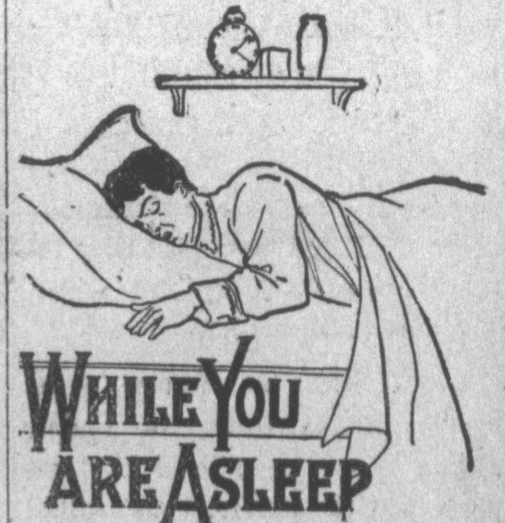
