#### COUNTY MATTERS.

##### Proceedings of the Board Commissioners.

The Board of County Commissioners held their monthly meeting on Monday, 2nd inst., all the members being present.

The payments from the treasury were as follows: For paupers \$174.50; County Home \$178.42; Superintendent Health \$25; bridges and ferries \$291.85; jail \$65.04; printing, stationery &c., \$40.75; making list of poll tax payers \$20; damage to land \$60; witness tickets \$67.75; conveying prisoners \$6.15; Clerk Superior court \$38.75; Register of Deeds \$19.50; Commissioners \$20.40; miscellaneous \$9.46; stock law territory \$38.01.

O. W. Harrington was appointed keeper of the court house and grounds, his duty to keep the same in good repair.

J. B. Cherry, Treasurer and C. O'H. Laughinghouse, Superintendent of Health, made their monthly reports.

The following were added to the pauper list to receive the amount stated per month. Wm. Hyman \$1.50, Fannie Grimes \$1, Ashley Craft \$1, Sallie Ward \$2.

The Board agreed to furnish \$100 toward building a bridge at Grindle creek in Bethel township.

The following tax levy for county purposes was made for the year 1902: On each \$100 valuation of real and personal property 23 1/2 cents, on each poll 38 cents. Schedule "B" taxes same as State. One horse peddlers \$30, foot peddlers \$10. For stock law territory 20 cents on each \$100 valuation of real estate.

The Sheriff was ordered to lay out a public road in Bethel township previously petitioned for.

The Sheriff made report of laying out public road in Farmville and Chicod townships as instructed at last meeting.

#### North Carolina Crop Report.

The first of the monthly crop reports issued by the State Department of Agriculture has just made its appearance. It is as follows:

General condition and progress of farm work compared with the average, 98 per cent.

Land that has been, or will be, planted in cotton compared with last year, 89 per cent.

Planted in tobacco, 107 per cent.

Planted in corn, 106 per cent.

Planted in oats, 90 per cent.

Condition of oats, 80 per cent.

Condition of wheat, 68 per cent.

Number of horses compared with last year, 97 per cent.

Number of mules compared with last year, 98 per cent.

Number of cattle compared with last year, 89 per cent.

Number of hogs compared with last year, 84 per cent.

Condition of the trucking interests compared with last year, 65 per cent.

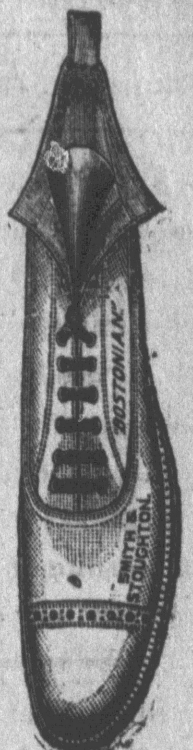

The educational edition of the Raleigh News and Observer, issued on the 4th inst., was another great stroke of enterprise for that splendid paper. The issue was 36 pages and showed the educational progress of the State for ten years. It was illustrated with pictures of many school buildings and colleges, portraits of prominent educators and most of the County Superintendents. The articles on education as well as the letters of Superintendents are interesting reading. It is one of most valuable editions to the State that the News and Observer has yet issued.

### In the Dull Seasons.

An increasing number of establishments have adopted the rule of making special efforts to stimulate trade in the duller seasons of the year. One advertiser said he could count on all the business he could do at the holiday time, but what he wanted was to induce people to buy at other times. He found it profitable to pay unusual attention to his newspaper advertising in the summer months.—Philadelphia Record.

### Be Kind to Sensitive Children.

There are children born into the world in these days of nervous and industrial strain and strife so highly strung, so intensely sensitive that they shrink from a sharp word as some natures would not recoil from the sting of a whip. A curt reprimand will bring the tears welling the eyes of such a child and a sob to its throat. A sensitive plant will die under rough treatment that may be given a hardier plant with perfect impunity. Children are very like flowers. Some of them require more light, more warmth, more care, more consideration, more direct manifestation of affection than others do. Denied these they never attain their fullest possible development, but are often hopelessly dwarfed.—Rochester Herald.

## Trades for the Blind.

At a recent conference on matters relating to the blind, held at London, a member announced that he had sent out papers to 100 institutions at home and abroad asking what trades and occupations they recommended for the blind. The following was the list he obtained, in order of merit: Basket, brush and broom making, piano tuning, mat weaving, chair caning, music (in all branches), mattress making, knitting, typewriting, legal and clerical work. As new employments he suggested telephone exchange work, linotype type-setting, reporting, gardening (for the partially blind), massage, lecturing, commercial agencies, organ blowing, bell ringing. In the discussion which followed much time was given to the question of massage, several doctors speaking in favor of it. In regard to typewriting, it was mentioned that such an office had been started in Birmingham. Four blind girls are now employed. They made £250 last year.

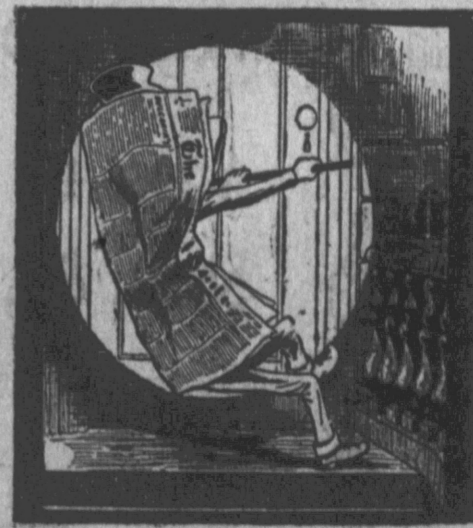
