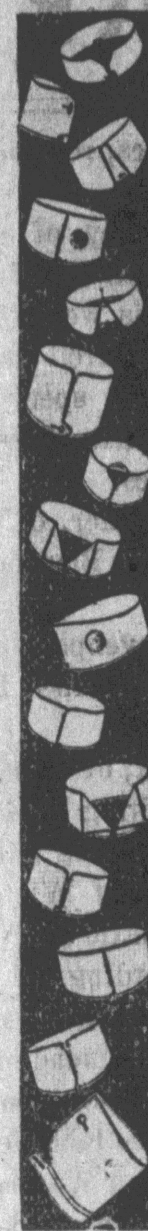

TOWN MATTERS.

Administration Changes Hands—New Officers—Retiring Mayor Caned.

The old Board of Aldermen held a special meeting Monday afternoon at 5 o'clock to consider what disposition should be made of the bond and school taxes collected. There were motions to divide the amount, something near \$4,500, between the two banks and leave it subject to the order of the Board; to have the Tax Collector draw a check for it to the Mayor who should deliver it to the incoming Board; and to turn it over to the Treasurer, each motion being defeated in succession.

This morning the old Board met again at 10 o'clock to wind up its affairs and turn over to the new Board. A motion was again made that the Tax Collector draw checks to the Mayor as chairman to the Board for the bond and school money deposited, the Mayor to turn same over to the new Board as soon as they organize. This was carried.

The Tax Collector then made his final report showing the following collections during the year. General tax \$8,709.61, bond tax \$3,728.81, school tax \$819.84; total \$13,258.26.

The Chief Police rendered an inventory of property on hand belonging to the town.

The Clerk was ordered to prepare and publish in THE DAILY REFLECTOR the financial statement of the town for the past year.

The old Board having completed its business Alderman Ficklen arose and in appropriate remarks on behalf of the Aldermen and officers of the town thanked the retiring Mayor W. H. Long for the courtesy and kindness shown during his administration, and presented him with a gold headed cane. Mayor Long responded with feeling in accepting the cane. Remarks thanking the Mayor were also made by Aldermen Cobb and King.

A committee was appointed to notify the new Aldermen to come in and take charge and the old Board adjourned sine die.

NEW BOARD.

The Aldermen elect for the next

year came forward and were sworn in by C. D. Rountree, J. P. as follows: E. B. Ficklen, D. S. Spain, Chas. Cobb, L. C. Arthur, B. F. Patrick, W. B. Parker, E. L. Carr and B. F. Tyson.

Alderman Ficklen was elected Mayor protem and Alderman Spain secretary of the meeting.

As soon as the Mayor was elected a committee was appointed to wait on him and request him to come forward. Mr. Whedbee made some appropriate remarks in accepting the office.

After all the officers had been elected the Board appointed committees to notify them and took a recess until they could present themselves to qualify.

Upon reassembling the officers were sworn in, the salaries of all officers were made the same as last year, and the special license taxes were levied the same as last year.
