Congress has gone into summer quarters and the members are getting home to look after their political fences.

The ministers of Shelby District Methodist Conference have adopted a series of resolutions condemning the use of tobacco in any form, pledging themselves to abstain from it and to preach against it from the pulpit, and agreeing not to recommend any applicant for license to preach who uses tobacco.

There has been another personal encounter between two United States Senators, though it did not occur until after the Senate adjourned. Senator Bailey, of Texas, was making a speech in which he sharply criticized the American Ambassador to Mexico. Senator Beveridge, of Indiana, took exception to the remarks and accused Senator Baily of making an unwarranted attack. The Texas Senator construed this remark as insulting and asked the Indiana Senator to withdraw it, which the latter declined to do unless Mr. Baily also withdrew the charges made in his speech. After the Senate adjourned Senator Baily went over to Senator Beveridge's seat and again asked him to withdraw the remark, and the request being again declined made an assault upon him. Others near by separated them before any harm was done.

Register Pads.

To keep dust from coming up the registers when the furnace is being shaken make a pad of cloth to which the dust will adhere. Canton flannel is good, but old underwear will do equally well.
