COUNTY CONVENTION.

First Assembly of the Campaign.

The county Democratic convention assembled at noon today to appoint delegates to the State, Congressional and Judicial conventions.

The meeting was called to order by A. L. Blow, chairman of the county executive committee who called for a roll call of delegates by W. L. Brown, secretary of the executive committee. H. T. King and D. J. Whichard were requested to act as assistant temporary secretaries.

After the call of delegates, the temporary organization was made permanent. As soon as the chairman announced that the convention was ready to proceed to business, a little friction arose.

R. R. Cotten moved that the convention take a recess of 10 minutes to allow the townships to select their quota of delegates to the different conventions.

J. J. Laughinghouse opposed the motion, declaring it an effort to prevent the adoption of resolutions instructing the delegates to vote for certain candidates.

G. T. Tyson moved to lay the Cotton motion on the table. This was carried.

T. C. Williams offered a motion to reconsider the Tyson motion, and F. G. James moved to lay the Williams motion on the table. A vote by townships was demanded, and a large majority voted to lay the matter on the table.

F. G. James presented a resolution commending Solicitor L. I. Moore and instructing the delegates to the Judicial convention to cast the vote of the county for him, which was adopted.

J. L. Fleming offered a resolution to instruct the delegates to the State convention to cast the vote of the county for Judge Walter Clark for Chief Justice.

F. G. James offered a resolution instructing the delegates to the State convention to cast the vote of the county for Judge George H. Brown, Jr., for Associate Justice. At the instance of some of the delegates favorable to Judge H. G. Conner, the resolution was withdrawn and a motion was made to take a vote testing the strength of Brown and Conner in the convention.

J. J. Laughinghouse spoke in behalf of Brown and R. R. Cotten spoke for Conner. The roll of townships was called resulting as follows: Brown 113 11-20, Conner 23 9-20.

W. R. Williams presented resolution endorsing Hon. F. G. James for Congress and instructing delegates for him. The reading of the resolution met a burst of applause.

F. G. James arose and expressed his thanks for the sentiment of the resolution and the applause given it, but said he had a substitute to

offer. He then requested the resolution be withdrawn and offered a resolution endorsing the course of Hon. J. H. Small for Congress and instructing that the vote of the county be cast for him. This was adopted.

W. H. Ragsdale presented a resolution endorsing Prof. J. Y. Joyner for Superintendent of Public Instruction which was adopted.

The convention then took a recess of 10 minutes for the townships to select delegates to the different conventions.

THE REFLECTOR will later publish all the resolutions adopted and the list of delegates to the conventions.

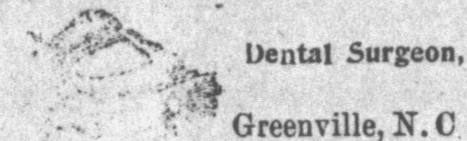

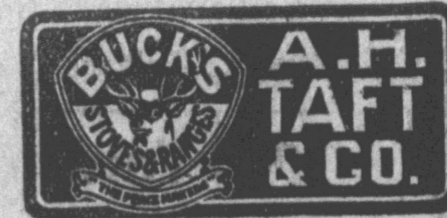
