Aims and Purposes of National Congress of Mothers.

To raise the standard of home-life. To develop wiser, better trained parenthood. To give young people, ignorant of the proper care and training of children, opportunities to learn this, that they may better perform the duties of parenthood.

To bring into closer relations the home and the school, that parent and teacher may cooperate intelligently in the education of the child.

To surround the childhood of the whole world with that loving, wise care in the impressionable years of life, that will develop good citizens, instead of lawbreakers and criminals.

To use systematic, earnest effort to this end, through the formation of Mothers' Clubs in every public school and elsewhere the establishing of kindergartens and laws which will adequately care for neglected and dependent children, in the firm belief that united concerted work for little children will pay better than any other philanthropic work that can be done.

To carry the motherlove and mother thought into all that concerns or touches childhood in home school, church, state or legislation.

To interest men and women to co-operate in the work for purer, truer homes, in the belief that to accomplish the best results men and women must work together.

To secure such legislation as will ensure that children of tender years may not be tried in ordinary courts, but that each town shall establish juvenile courts and special officers whose business it shall be to lookout for that care which will rescue, instead of confirm, the child in evil ways. To work for such probationary care in individual homes rather than institutions.

To rouse the whole community to a sense of its duty and responsibility to the blameless, dependent and neglected children, because there is no philanthropy which will so speedily reduce our taxes, reduce our prison expenses, reduce the expense of institutions for correction and reform.

The work of the Congress is civic work in its broadest and highest sense, and every man or woman, who is interested in the arms of the Congress, is cordially invited to become a member, and aid in the organized effort for a higher, nobler, national life which can only be attained through the individual homes.

Pitt Abroad.

In reports from the Southern educational meeting at Knoxville, Tenn., we see the names of Prof. C. E. Lineberry, Prof. H. P. Harding and Mr. W. F. Evans mentioned among the North Carolinians who are taking prominent part.

Von Moltke Snubbed Bismarck.

Field Marshal Blumenthal's "Diary," as now published by his son, throws light on several incidents of the wars of 1866 and 1870-71, and, among other things, it disposes of the calumny—which Bismarck himself never sought to destroy—that the crown prince, worked upon by his wife, was opposed to the bombardment of Paris.

The "Diary" also shows—what Dr. Busch only hints at in his pages—that the relations between Bismarck and Moltke in France were very strained, the chancellor having complained that he was always treated by his great military colleague with "distinct incivility and rudeness." This coolness characterized their relations to the end, so that one who knew them well once compared them to "a pair of Alpine peaks illumined by the rays of the sun (of glory), but separated by a deep and sunless valley of snow."

Front Door Mirrors.

Within the knocker on the front door, which in this instance was about on a level with the face of the visitor, was placed a small convex mirror.
