What Congress Spent.

How much did Congress in its recent session appropriate? Representative Livingstone, of Georgia, says the direct appropriations, including the Isthmian canal, aggregate \$800,193,887, and that there remains \$259,373,215 to be added for contracts provided for which sanction expenditure, bringing the liabilities created for the Treasury up to \$1,059,577,052. It was accordingly a "billion dollar session" after all. This is an enormous pull upon the tax payers pockets. It may be borne now while times are good, but this scale of expenditure will be irksome when a reaction comes and business is again stagnant.—Baltimore Sun.
