### COUNTY MATTERS.

#### Proceedings of the Commissioners.

The Board of County Commissioners met on the first Monday, all the members being present. The following payments were made from the treasury: Paupers \$176; County Home \$165.71; Superintendent Heath \$25; conveying prisoners and insane \$34.10; listing taxes \$471.40; bridges and ferries \$115.83; jury tickets \$10 50; witness tickets \$22.10; jail \$66; Register Deeds \$19.85; Commissioners \$33.20; committee \$25; miscellaneous \$23; stock law \$548.95.

The Treasurer and Superintendent Health filed their monthly reports.

License to retail liquor granted to thirty-three applicants.

The Board declined to establish a new township out of portions of Swift Creek, Contentnea and Chicod townships.

Jesse L. Cherry was refunded taxes on \$250 valuation erroneously charged.

J. L. Turnage was refunded taxes on \$2700 excessive valuation.

Upon petition of a majority of Farmville asking to be allowed to hold an election to ascertain the wishes of the people of the township to have a special school district and levy a tax of 15 cents on each \$100 valuation and 45 cents on each poll, the Board ordered that such an election be held, in accordance with the election laws of North Carolina, on the 4th day of September, 1902. A similar petition and order was made for Bethel township.

Lot Hilliard was released from poll tax for 1901.

L. M. Savage was refunded taxes on \$13.50 valuation erroneously charged.

Joseph Snahum was granted foot peddlers license.

W. C. Cannon, John and Oliver Boyd and Austin Hanrahan were added to pauper list.

Mary Bryant, colored, was admitted to County Home.

O. W. Harrington, sheriff, in his settlement of taxes, general fund, was allowed \$900 on insolvent list.

Some petitions for new roads were presented.

Progress of Cotton Manufacture at the South.

The Manufacturers' Record says that the starting of new cotton mills and the enlargement of established ones has been more marked at the south during the quarter ending with June than for any period of the same length of time in the history of this section.

One important circumstance connected with this progress in the milling industry, and one that shows cotton manufacture at the south is on a sound basis, is the fact that by far the greater portion of capital invested in these new mills and the enlargement of exist-

ing ones is being furnished by experienced manufacturers or companies already in the business. The Manufacturers' Record reports that while sixteen new mills were started during the last quarter which have a capital of \$2,570,000, there were enlargements of old mills to the amount of \$7,000,000 of capital.

Of the sixteen new mills South Carolina and Alabama are credited with three each, Mississippi four and North Carolina two. As to the number of spindles and looms South Carolina leads and this State comes second.—Wilmington Messenger.
