### COLORED INSTITUTE.

Reported for The Reflector:

The Pitt County Institute for the colored teachers opened Monday, July 14. Some fifty names were enrolled during the morning session, several others came in the afternoon to be ready for work early Tuesday. The institute is under the management of Prof. W. H. Ragsdale County Superintendent of public schools.

He is assisted by Prof. N. C. Bruce, Shaw University, Raleigh N. C., and by J. E. Brown, teacher at Grifton. Great interest seems awakened in the colored people for competent teachers and in these teachers to better fit themselves. They hold an educational rally meeting for the colored people at the court house Wednesday night to which the public at large is invited.

Some strong speeches will be made by both white and colored speakers all along the line of the great educational awakening in this and other states. Let every body who can by word or deed encourage the colored people to do their best to make themselves worthy citizens of a great state.

Gen. W. P. Roberts has withdrawn as a candidate for nomination for Congress in this district. This leaves the field practically clear to Hon. John H. Small, and the convention which meets in Plymouth on the 30th will probably re-nominate him by acclamation, just as ought to be done.

We are reminded of the good old days when the National Democracy was in the ascendancy and victories were scored to her credit when we hear "Tariff Reform" used as the national battle cry, and see it mentioned in the press that Grover Cleveland has about decided to stump the state for the Democratic gubernatorial ticket in New York.

A most horrible and shocking affair was that of the mine explosion of the Rolling Mill mine, near Johnston, Pa., on Thursday, the 10th inst, in which 112 persons, and perhaps more, met death in so frightful a manner. The explosion was caused by an accumulation of gas in the mine, evidently overlooked by the fire bosses, as they are called, having this danger in charge, as three of them were killed in the disaster.

Saturday was a sad day in many homes in that town, the day being given up almost wholly to funerals over the dead bodies.

GEN. ROBERTS OUT OF THE RUNNING.

Some months ago General W. P. Roberts, of Gates, who is said to have been the youngest brigadier in the Confederate army, announced himself as a candidate for the Democratic nomination for Congress in the first district. His unique platform was opposition to an extension of the present support of colored schools with the money of white tax payers—in other words if negroes are to get more money than they get now it must be negro money; and another argument for his nomination was that there is not an ex-Confederate in either house of Congress now from North Carolina. The Democratic convention of his county was held last week and he succeeded in getting it to endorse his school idea, or, the following resolution was adopted as a substitute for one he offered:

Resolved, That we are opposed to any increase in taxation for public schools unless some constitutional method is devised whereby any such increase from the white race shall be applied to the white school fund.

But the report of the secretary of the convention, as published in The Elizabeth City Economist, continues:

Gen. W. P. Roberts, seeing that defeat was inevitable, addressed the convention in a lengthy speech, in which he stated that he would withdraw from the contest for Congress. His speech was pregnant with bitterness and animosity, denouncing the methods of conducting primaries and criticising the Democratic party of the county for not supporting his candidacy for Congress. This speech was replied to by Hon. L. L. Smith in an able, masterly and agreeable manner, which left the general without standing ground. The applause to Mr. Smith's speech was deafening.

This is a rather painful recital. General Roberts was for eight years State Auditor, and for the four years of President Cleveland's second term was United States consul to Victoria, B. C. His party has done very well by him and he ought not now quarrel with it for not sending him to Congress. It is too often so with men who have been honored, after they are dropped.—Charlotte Observer.
