WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent

WASHINGTON, D. C. July 19.

"No admission," is the greeting that meets the visitor in Washington who attempts to enter the White House grounds, and many have expressed serious disappointment at their inability to inspect the home of the President. But it should prove some compensation to loyal Americans to know that for the first time since 1881 the White House is receiving a thorough renovation. Those who have visited the building in recent years can testify to the necessity for such an overhauling. As the wealth and greatness of the country have increased the demands on the executive mansion have grown and for some years its accommodations have not been sufficient to secure to the President and his family that comfort and privacy to which they are entitled. The office force has grown constantly and new rooms had to be converted into offices until but a small portion of the second floor of the building was available for residence purposes and ordinarily more than half of the first floor was open to the public during certain hours of the day. When the present renovation is completed and the new office building, which is being erected just West of the White House, is finished the entire second floor will be restored to its original purpose, a residence for the President and his family.

The answer of the United States Steel Corporation, otherwise known as the Steel Trust, filed in the New Jersey Courts and sworn to by Mr. Chas Schwab and other officers of the company, has set the gentlemen at democratic headquarters to work making some interesting deductions. Mr. Schwab says that the assets of the company amount to \$1,400,291,000 and that the net profits of the concern are \$140,000,000 per annum. He further states that these profits could be reduced seventy-five per cent and still leave ample to pay interest on the company's bonds and provide its sinking funds, these fixed charges amounting to but \$31,737,850. This is the corporation, it will be remembered, which is charging American manufacturers and ship builders from thirty to thirty five per cent more for the steel they are compelled to use than it is charging British and other manufacturers for the same material. When Representative Richardson, of Tennessee, offered a bill in the House which provided for the removal of the duty on goods made by trusts, the republicans charged him with desiring to wreck American industries. The duty on steel will average forty five per cent so that how far this charge was from the truth may be easily seen.

Senators Carmack and Dubois are both in Washington and are

rendering every assistance possible at Democratic headquarters. Senator Dubois recently called your correspondent's attention to the fact that he offered in the Senate an amendment to the Permanent Census bill which provided for the very publicity for the trusts which was recommended by the President in his message and that the amendment was defeated by a strict party vote. Representative Suizer offered a similar amendment in the House and Representative Bell, of Colorado, offered a bill for controlling the trusts based on his observations as a member of the Industrial Commission, but all of these were defeated by republican votes or influence. In view of these facts, Senator Dubois regards it as little short of ludicrous that the President should attempt to mislead the people as to the real relations of the republican party to the trusts, after Congress has adjourned and just before an election.

It is believed in Washington that Senator Spooner has been invited to go to Paris in connection with the Panama Canal title and that General Wood is to be made chief of the canal construction commission. Evidently Mr. Roosevelt is included to follow the example of Mr. Hanna, in standing by his friends, even if he is not equally judicious in their selection.

Serious Accident.

Mr. S. F. McCotter, of Vandemere was painfully though not seriously burned by the explosion of a kerosene lamp last Tuesday morning. Mr. McCotter on getting up early in the morning went to put out the lamp which had been burning all night. Taking the lamp up in his hands, he blew in the chimney to put it out and it exploded instantaneously in his hands, burning both his hands and his clothing, the burning oil ran over his carpets setting fire to them and but for assistance which was present he would in all probability lost his dwelling and all that was in it. Mr. McCotter seems to be unfortunate with his hands, he has had them both badly cut in a cotton gin heretofore.—Bayboro Sentinel.

It is noticed, among other things, that the Democrats of this State are nominating some good material for the Superior Court bench this year. They do well to have a care about this matter, for judgeship is a highly important position and only the most capable lawyers should be chosen for it. The prestige of the North Carolina bench has been lowered of late years; it is a pleasure to see evidences of a restoration.—Charlotte Observer.

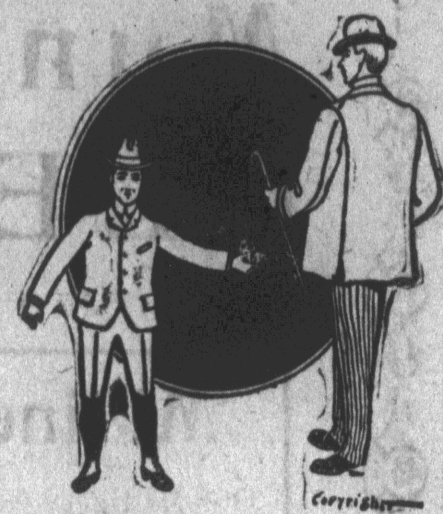

As the years went on he became what is termed land poor, and in a time when lands had depreciated greatly in value, he was considerably involved in debt and most that he had was sold under execution. His debts were largely for security, as in this particular he was lenient to a fault, it being known that he would stand security for almost anyone. While he had sufficient left to live on, he never accumulated much after his failure and does not leave much of an estate.

He was buried at the home place this afternoon at 5 o'clock, funeral service being conducted by Rev. J. N. Booth.
