YES, SELL THEM.

The Philippine archipelago is an elephant on our hands, and has proven to be one of the most difficult questions to deal with that has ever come within our grasp, and we have hardly been able to grasp this one. But it remains for Mr. A. S. Burt, of Virginia, to suggest a very plausible and to us the only feasible plan for dealing in anything like satisfactory manner with these far away islands. It is, that we sell the islands, (Aguinaldo and the balance of the savages, of course, would go along with the sale) to the Japanese government, they being nearer, and probably more able to deal with the recalcitrant natives. The suggestion is a wise one, from an economic and humanitarian viewpoint, as the saving of life among our soldiers and the reduction of expenses as a result of their retention would be great cause for rejoicing. But the moral and legal right perhaps would be questioned, since it has been ably contended that Spain had no right to sell them to us, or we to buy them, which if true, would leave us with the same lack of right to make a sale even though we were benefited by such sale. The price set is \$150,000,000, certainly a magnificent sum, in comparison with the little bill we paid for them. But then the Japanese are to be given the benefit of the installment plan, a long credit with a high rate of interest.

By all means, let us get rid of the islands, and if we can conscientiously sell them to some other nation, let it be done.

Building operations in Greenville is only measured by the ability to get material. Houses go up as fast as material can be had. A brick manufacturing plant would give more impetus in this direction.

After the Congressional Convention in Plymouth on the 30th, interest will turn to the convention that will nominate the county officers. There are candidates a plenty with more yet waiting to enter the race.

Here it comes again. Another public official who could not stand a bit of criticism of his acts belittles his position by rushing into court and instituting a suit for libel against a newspaper. Recently a man who moved from North Carolina with his wife to Norfolk murdered her in that city. The publicity given his crime led to the knowledge that he had committed a similar crime in Oklahoma where he lived before coming East. Officers from Oklahoma came to investigate and identified him as the man wanted there for murder. The public demanded a trial for the crime committed in Norfolk, but the Commonwealth Attorney of that city agreed to surrender the criminal to the Oklahoma officials. The Norfolk Virginian-Pilot criticized this act of the attorney and he brought suit for libel against the paper in the sum of \$10,000.

It is no wonder that Greensboro just captured all the delegates in attendance upon the State convention there last week. In all their years of attending conventions elsewhere they had never been so handsomely entertained. The average man does not mind paying for personal comforts when he can get them, but when he has to put up with any kind of accommodation, and pay high prices for it, he has a right to kick. However, no such condition as that prevailed at Greensboro. Hotel accommodations were ample, and in addition to this the citizens were active in doing everything necessary to make the stay of the delegates pleasant and comfortable. The convention hall was cooled with electric fans, and lemonade and ice water were plentiful. The citizens furnished free 1,840 lemons 350 pounds sugar, one ton ice, ten barrels mineral water, 4,000 cigars and kept eight bootblacks serving the delegates.

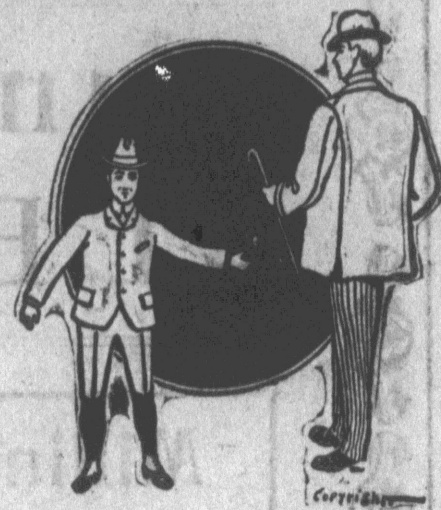

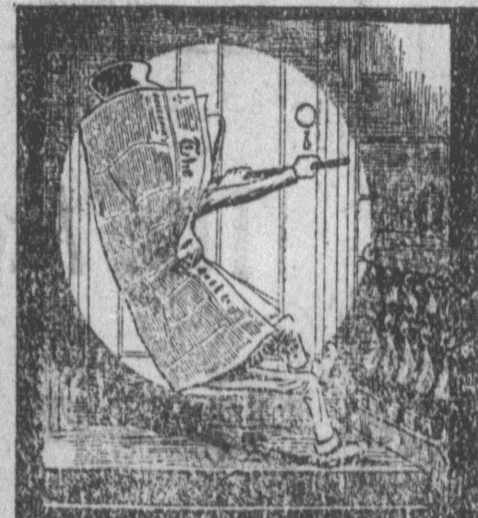
