WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent

WASHINGTON, D. C. July 26.

Senator Cockrell of Missouri has spent some time in Washington during the past week and has been frequently at the Democratic headquarters. When asked by newspaper men for his views in regard to the situation in his party, he has invariably replied that the situation was most encouraging but that he did not deem it wise to talk much at the present time. In a word, the Senator says that if the Democrats will work quietly and energetically, each in his own district, this fall, and will leave national issues for the future, there is every reason to assume that public opinion will have so shaped itself before 1904 as to leave no question in the leaders as to what are the issues which will command support.

The reports of Major Glenn's defence in his trial by court martial, which have just reached the War Department, make strong evidence in support of Democratic contentions in regard to the real situation in the Philippines. Major Glenn said, among other things, "Every man, woman and child in the islands was an enemy and in my best judgment they are today and always will be."

Major James Parker of the Adjutant General's office has made public a statement of the officers and men killed and wounded in the Philippines between February 4th, 1899 and July 16th, 1902. The total number of men, including officers, sent to the islands during the period named was 127,938 of which number 7,052 lost their lives, 2,582 by disease and 4,470 from wounds or similar causes. The average strength of the forces in the islands was approximately 40,000 men. The number has been reduced to in the neighborhood of 20,000 but the greatest anxiety is expressed as to the ravages of cholera which it is feared may rapidly increase the death rate. The returns from the islands show examples of the greatest heroism on the part of soldiers doing hospital duty. Many have exposed themselves to cholera in order to nurse their fellow soldiers with apparently no thought as to their own safety.
