### Workers Who Never Strike.

In these days of unparalleled prosperity and strikes it is a soothing reflection that the majority of American Workers never have gone on strike and probably never will.

A survey of the national workshop, so to speak, discloses the facts that, including men, women and minors, nearly 32,000,000 persons are daily at work in it—less the number of those temporarily on strike. Of this grand total 15,000,900 only, are employed in the industries that are subject to strikes and lockouts.

Here then is the gratifying fact that 17,000,000 workers in these United States always keep working. Included in this great standing army of industrious people who never quit their jobs are the farmers and their help, about 9,000,000 strong. The people at work on American farms, comprising nearly one-half of the adult labor of the country, have never gone on strike; the idea has never been mooted among them.

Besides our farmers there are over 1,000,000 Americans classified as professional workers—actors, authors, artists, clergymen, lawyers and doctors, none of whom ever strike. Then there are about 400,000 teachers in the country, two-thirds of the women, who work year in and out in strikeless continuity. Next come our domestic and personal public servants, about 5,000,000 of them, including our soldier and sailors; they also belong to the non-striking majority.

It is strictly to the workers in manufacturing and mechanical industries and in trade and transportation, aggregating a grand total of 15,000,000 persons, that strikes and lockouts are confined. But from this total many further deductions must be made, because it includes the 600,000 clerks and book-keepers, the 60,000 commercial travelers, the 200,000 real estate and commission agents, the 800,000 wholesale and retail merchants, the 15,000 stenographers and the 35,000 bankers and brokers, all of whom are outside the strike zone. Returns covering a long period of years show that the total number of persons who go on strike or are locked out averages \$14,000 annually. In short, nearly two-thirds of all the working people of the country are steady, continuous workers, who "saw wood and say nothing," and of the other one-third only a small fraction stops working at any one time.—New York World.

The servant, who had been carrying her meals to her, went in with her breakfast and in attempting to put the waiter in Miss Perkins' lap overturned a vessel of hot coffee which caused the accident. ### Battle With Escaped Convicts.

Florence, Ala., Aug. 16.—Sheriff T. S. White, of Waynesboro, Tenn., had a battle with five men, supposed to be the Tennessee penitentiary escaped convicts, 20 miles north of Florence yesterday. The men were armed with 44 Colt pistols and dressed in blue jumpers. Whitesaw the men pass near Waynesboro, coming south, and he followed them on horseback. Coming suddenly upon the men sitting on a lumber pile at a cabin, he opened fire with his pistol at closerange. All five men returned the fire and White jumped off his horse, using it as a protection. Two men, whom White recognized as Gus Hyatt and John Doe, stood their ground until their pistols were empty and then ran down the road and joined the other three, whom White says he recognized as Fred Seguin, Robert Bridge and James Simpson from photographs sent out by the prison authorities. White left this morning with Sheriff Hill and will make another effort to capture the criminals.

### Express Agent Robbed of \$28,000.

Louisville, Aug. 16.—A special to The Times from Owensboro, Ky., says: "The agent of the American Express Company, of Fordsville, was robbed of \$28,000 last night, under peculiar circumstances. J. W. Boatner, who shipped the money to Fordsville, is under arrest at Irvington, and J. C. Schlitzbaum, the agent of the company, is being held at Falls of Rough. Several days ago, a man giving his name as J. V. Boatner, of Memphis, Tenn., appeared at the office of the American Express Company, at Deaneville, five miles from Fordsville, and wanted to express \$30,000 to the latter point. Boatner took a receipt for it, and then the agent remembered that he was allowed to ship only \$5,000 at one time and made him take the cash back. Boatner kept the money until last night, when it was sent to Fordsville by express, where it arrived late last night. The express agent, it is said, informed a number of people that the money had arrived. It was not put in a bank, as Mr. Boatner sent word that he would be there this morning. This morning, Schlitzbaum turned up at Falls of Rough, ten miles away. He said he was held up, robbed and kidnapped during the night. He first decided to stay at the depot all night, he says, but finally got nervous and started to the hotel, which is only one square away. Between the two places he was set upon and robbed of the money by three men. The express people and the officers believe that the whole affair was a conspiracy to defraud the American Express Company out of \$28,000. Boatner is now under arrest at Irvington, Ky."

The School Law of the State makes it imperative on all public school teachers to attend Teacher's Institutes. Failure to do so forfeits the right to teacher for one year. One teacher in Wake county failed to attend the Institute held in Raleigh last week and appealed to Supt. Joyner and others of the educational Department to help him out, but he was told that it was a law and he would have to comply with it.—Elm City Elevator.

Near Lansing, Kan., they have found the bones and skull of what is believed to be a prehistoric man of the glacial period. The bones were found at a depth of thirty-five feet below the surface, and some of the scientific sharps say the man lived 35,000 years ago. The skull is very thick, which no doubt indicates that he was a practical joker and possibly met his death by locking the boat.—Exchange.

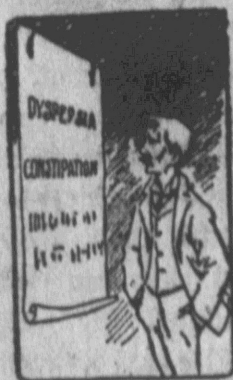

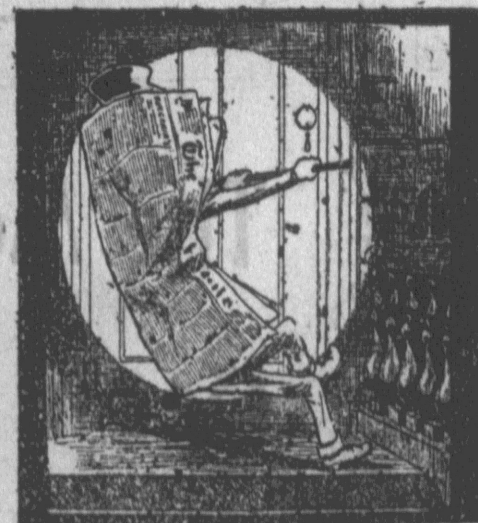
