SIMMONS AND GRIMES

Make Strong Speeches in Greenville.

To say that F. M. Simmons in his speech in the court house here Friday night, fully met the anticipations of those who know him, is to give to the Senator well deserved credit, and to any of his friends who were not present an idea of the impression that gentleman made upon a Greenville audience. Equipped with facts and logic, and a disposition to deal fairly with issues as with men, he urged the claims of Democracy and answered the arguments of its enemies in a manner entirely satisfactory to his sympathizers and sufficiently discomfiting to any different contingent.

With deliberation and composure, as one who has mastered his subject and knows his ground, the Senator proceeded to unveil the "lilly white" figure hatched out by the Republican party in North Carolina. In a few words he showed that in spite of pretensions to the contrary, the Republican party is no better today than before the negro was kicked out. The party is dominated by the same old crowd that disgraced the State under Russel. The leaders know this, and the party is not doing business in its own name. It now comes before the people in the guise of independentism and non-partisanship. Sham Republican conventions sometimes nominate sore-headed Democrats and disappointed office seekers, who see a machine in every Democratic convention, but never anything of the sort in the cut and dried Republican scheme that put them before the public. "If anybody in this world does love an office," said the speaker, "it's a white North Carolina Republican. If anybody can beat a North Carolina Republican in banking after an office it's a North Carolina Populist." Let the wires flash the news that Republicanism is reinstated in North Carolina and Marion Butler will drop his Wall street schemes in a hurry. Butler would come back. And don't you know under Republican power the devil would be to pay again.

Senator Simmons said that the position of the Republican party in this campaign was an anomalous one. He didn't know what it stood for. If we are to judge from what Senator Pritchard says, it stands for nothing that it has been standing for except high protective tariff. When Republicanism hung like a pall over the State Senator Pritchard made some speech. He declared himself in favor of silver in very emphatic terms. Said that if he was ever found advocating the gold standard he hoped his friends would put him in the insane asylum. He has since been converted to the idea that free silver is not a good thing, and ridiculous it.

The republican party put a thousand negroes in office. Senator Pritchard acquiesced in the appointment of twenty-seven negro postmasters in North Carolina. He now stands in a different attitude. Says it was all wrong, that he has repented, and favors white supremacy in the State.

When we wanted to pension the old soldiers of the State Pritchard led his party in solid phalanx against the bill. But he claims now to be in favor of it, and that his party always has been. But in 1890, when two Republican candidates who were elected to the legislature without a Democratic vote, were attacked for disfranchising twenty thousand Confederate soldiers in 1868, they said that these soldiers were fortunate to have escaped with their lives. And now to claim that the Republican party is in favor of pensioning the old soldiers of the State is to say what no decent man can be

expected to believe.

After thus showing some of the inconsistencies of Republican state ments, Senator Simmons referred to certain charges the Republicans are making against the present State administration. In answer to the charge of extravagance, he entered an emphatic denial. Not one cent of the people's money had been wasted. Let the Republicans show wherein we have been extravagant. Do they mean that we have been extravagant in our appropriations to educate the boys and girls of North Carolina? The State stands third in the list of illiteracy. It behooves us to see that our children are educated. Do they mean that we were extravagant in making an appropriation to take the insane of the State out of jails and the company of criminals? Do they mean we were extravagant when the last legislature added \$100,000 to the pensions of the men who followed Lee and Jackson? The people of North Carolina love the Confederate soldier, and neither profess an indifference to the necessities of his old age nor propose to see him want. The question at issue is not one of extravagance, but is simply whether or not the people approve the objects of the appropriations.

Another charge of the Republicans is that Governor Aycock paid \$17,000 to the lawyers last year. That is a very serious charge. We love Charlie Aycock, but when this charge was sprung we felt, if he had done that he certainly was becoming extravagant and needed looking after. So we went to the records. The Democratic party is always ready to stand by its record. Is the Republican party willing to stand by theirs? Yes, we found that Aycock did pay the lawyers \$17,000, and what for? Every bit of that amount except about \$580 was paid on contracts made by Russell when he was Governor of the State.

That about completes the list of our extravagances, except that the last legislature increased the number of judges and solicitors from fourteen to sixteen. We did that too. Certain sections of the State claimed that the extra sessions of the courts made necessary by the insufficiency in the number of judges entailed more expense than the salaries of the extra judges would amount to, which was true. But the Republicans don't want to say anything about their record along this line. They created about one thousand petty offices, and put in 159 negroes.

The speaker said that the great argument of the Republicans this year was prosperity. They claim that prosperity came in with Mc Kinley and the Dingley tariff. It is true that good laws and good government help toward prosperity; but to say that the prosperity we are enjoying is local and due to Republican policies is to leave out of consideration the fact that there is universal prosperity in every country. Germany, Great Britain, Mexico, China, Japan, and others, some with high tariff, some with low, some with the gold standard, some with silver, some with Kings, some with Czars, some with a popular form of government, are all enjoying a period of universal prosperity. If prosperity proves the case of high tariff in our country, prosperity in Great Britain proves the case of free trade. They say that the phenomenal prosperity of the United States is shown by the value of our exports and imports. By this test Great Britain is more prosperous than we. Her trade is greater by two times than ours. The per cent of increase in exports exceeds ours in six countries.

At the close of Senator Simmons' speech, State Senator James introduced Hon. J. Bryan Grimes, who spoke about an hour upon the tariff question, giving a brief outline of the history of the protective tariff and the rise and development of the two dominant political parties in the United States. His exposition of the injustice of the protective tariff and arraignment of the Republican party as being responsible therefor, was keen, lucid and impressively presented.

Tariff Robbery.

A tariff law like the Dingley Act, which permits "trusts in this country, entrenched behind protective laws, either tariffs or patents, to sell their goods abroad at lower figures than they sell them at to the very nation whose people give them the protection that is their life," is not justifiable. It is robbery. The man who said he was selling goods below cost, and so could only maintain himself by doing a very large business at it, is a by-word for idiocy. No successful concern sells its products at less than cost; and if goods be sold at a certain figure in London or South Africa, when made in America, then they can be sold for more profit right here where they are made, and the man who denies that seriously needs a conservator. The protection given to trusts that sell abroad cheaper than at home should be taken off at once. I will remind Mr. Hiss that the American manufactures of cotton mill machinery sell this same American made machinery to foreigners in their own land much cheaper than they do to Americans in the home market. As the Hartford Courant has said: "This is robbery."—J. S. Henderson at Lincolnton.
