The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session on the 2nd inst, all the members being present.

The following amounts were drawn on the treasurer: For paupers, \$182; County Home \$137.59, superintendent of health \$25; pumps \$61.78; jail \$100.80; witness tickets \$45.65; insane \$20.65; bridges and ferry \$110.94; stationery and printing \$10.40; sheriff \$22.40; clerk of superior court \$10.75; register of deeds \$106.97; commissioners \$18.90; miscellaneous \$5.62; stock law territory \$112.20.

The treasurer and superintendent of health presented their monthly reports which were filed.

Lands of T. J. Carson were reduced in value from \$1,289 to \$1,000.

Henrietta Gardner was released from taxes on \$300 real estate erroneously charged.

J. T. Smith was released from taxes on \$200 real estate erroneously charged.

Mrs. Susan Eason was refunded \$6.67 out of taxes for 1902, the same being erroneously charged.

The pauper allowance of John Braxton was increased to \$2 per month.

R. Williams was ordered to purchase such shelving as is needed in the vault of the register's office.

PROVIDENCE SAVES TEDDY.

Republican Paper, Thorn in His Flesh, Burned Out.

Washington, March 3.—Isaac M. Meekins, postmaster at Elizabeth City, and president of the Elizabeth City Carolinian Publishing Company, breathed a sigh of relief this morning when he received a telegram giving the information that the plant of the republican weekly, which has been the center of much furmoil for several weeks, had been damaged by fire. With the administration threatening his official life because his organ refused to grind Roosevelt rag-time, and an editor on his hands who refused to be shaken, Mr. Meekins had come to the conclusion that newspaper proprietorship was a life brim-full of trouble and danger. These thoughts were revolving in Mr. Meekins' mind this morning as he sat in Senator Pritchard's office, doubtful of the future and knowing not what the day had in store for him in his capacity as federal office holder.

A messenger boy appeared with a brown envelope for Mr. Meekins. Hurriedly, and with some misgivings, the Elizabeth City postmaster tore open the missive.

"Bully!" shouted Meekins as he leaped out in the floor. "The Carolinian is up in smoke. I have lost Roscoe and I'll get \$1,000 insurance."

The joy of Meekins was unconfined. He broke the news right and left. There was no effect on his part to conceal the fact that the Carolinian was up in smoke. It was not long before he called at the postoffice department, and some people were so unkind as to suggest that he left the news there in such a way that it would reach Mr. Payne's ears.

Visible outward appearances tonight indicate that Meekins was in a very much relieved state of mind. He talked of establishing another weekly. Roscoe Mitchell wired that the plant was damaged to the extent of \$750. Meekins said it was worth \$1,500 and that it was insured for \$1,000. Having requested Roscoe Mitchell's resignation as editor of the paper in order to continue as a bread-eater under the Roosevelt vine, he said he would have gotten it, because Mr. Mitchell had failed to comply with

the terms of the contract under which the lease was made.—Morning Post.
