Negro Band Removed.
During the last few days the "Ladies gallery" in the House has been open to negroes.

The gallery in question is the one to the left of the press gallery. It is reserved for women and their escorts, and when the gallery is not full men of respectable appearance who have no women with them are sometimes admitted. Negroes have never heretofore been admitted.

In some way it has apparently become known among the negroes of Washington that the ban has been taken off so far as the gallery is concerned, and they have patronized it very extensively. Many of them come without bringing women with them. Parties of three and four have entered the gallery. Today there were more of them in the "ladies gallery" than in the galleries usually occupied by them.

Night Operator at Hamlet Took His Life.

Wednesday morning as the Seaboard northbound train was coming in to Raleigh and was passing Hamlet, J. W. Dunway, the night telegraph operator at that place, deliberately stepped in front of the engine that was bearing down upon him and was mangled and crushed by the mammoth wheels. The train was at once stopped and the body of the man taken on board, but before the speeding train could reach this city he died from his wounds. Passengers on the train who saw the affair say that the act was an intentional one and with the intention of taking his own life.

Probably Dunway was just despondent or deranged and he cast himself under the iron wheels to get away from his troubles. The operator had a good record and was liked by a number of persons who cannot account for his deed of desperation.

NO STORAGE TANKS IN TOWN

Alderman Pass Prohibitory Ordinance—The Laundry Must Provide for Drainage.

The board of aldermen held a special meeting, Thursday night, called to consider two matters.

One was in reference to the drainage of water from the Greenville Steam Laundry into the open ditches of the town. The street committee was directed to take the matter in hand and have the trouble abated as speedily as possible.

The other was in reference to replacing the Standard Oil Co's. tanks that were recently burned. The board adopted an ordinance prohibiting the storage within the corporate limits of the town of any inflammable oil or gasoline in any tank or receptacle of more than 250 gallons capacity. This will prevent rebuilding the tanks on the former site.

The Police Club Fresh Students.

Lafayette, Ind., March 12.—The sophomore and freshman classes of Purdue University, engaged in a riot last night. When the sophomore banquet at Columbia hall was in progress 275 freshmen attacked the building with battering rams and railroad ties.

The attacking party was fought off by the police, who clubbed many of the students. The firemen were also called out and turned the hose on the freshmen. Many were injured but none seriously.

A Royal Decree.

St. Petersburg, Thursday, 12.—A decree was made public today issued by the czar providing for freedom of religion throughout his dominion, establishing to some degree local self government, and making other concessions to the village committees. The decree was issued in commemoration of the anniversary of the birthday of Alexander III, is considered the most significant act of state since the emancipation of serfs. The public hails it as a proclamation of a new era.

The government this year will send to North Carolina experts who will teach our people to grow Sumatra tobacco that is used for cigar stock and is very valuable. Other states made arrangements last year and received governmental aid in this work. This year Virginia and North Carolina have banded together to get what they are entitled to from the general government along this line.—Wilson Times.

82,630 Gallons of Water.

There is nearly eight miles of water pipe in the streets of Dunn. The amount laid is 5,652 of six inch pipe, 24,584 feet of four inch pipe, 2076 feet of eight inch pipe, a total of 32,312 feet.

We have made an estimate on the amount of water required to fill these pipes, which of course is not exact, but it is some where near. The pipes will hold 32,930 gallons of water, the tank will hold 50,000 gallons which will give the town ready use of 82,630 gallons of water when needed. If this is not correct of our mathematicians give the correct amount.—Dunn Guide.

Judge Murdered by White Cappers.

Memphis, March 12.—Judge Brown, of Memphis, was killed by white cappers Monday afternoon near Wynne, Ark.

He was working up a case against the white cappers and set a trap to capture them. Brown secreted himself in a negro cabin while his assailants were in an outhouse.

The first shot, fired through a window of the cabin, killed Brown and the white cappers fled. Eight arrests have been made and others are to follow.

Syracuse, N. Y., March 11.—After sitting in a window of a fashionable apartment house to-night shooting with a revolver at pedestrians in James street, Henry C. Friend held several policemen at bay for an hour, forced a janitor to roll cigarettes, played a piano with his left hand, while holding the revolver in his right; and when tired of his antics turned on the piano stool, placed the revolver to his breast and sent a bullet through his heart. He was 26 years old.

THE LATEST CONTRIBUTION TO THE GAITY OF NATIONS.

Positively the funniest thing that has been printed since the days of the late lamented Bill Nye is the report from the Washington correspondent to the Charlotte Observer to the effect that the Hearst presidential boom is to be nursed and tended in North Carolina by Mr. W. O. Saunders and his Edenton Transcript. It is rich, it is ludicrously amusing, it is to laugh. We are convulsed with merriment that overflows for miles around when we think of the possibilities of the situation. Please excuse us while we laugh.

Mr. Saunders is known to fame as the young man who did a short time in jail to appease the law of Elizabeth City prohibiting minors from smoking cigarettes within the city limits. He is a clever young reporter, who knows no more about politics than a cow knows about Sunday. He has never cast a vote in his life, and in case of Mr. Hearst's nomination will have to forego the pleasure of voting for him, on account of the extreme unripeness of his years. Imagine a youth of 18 summers telling people how to vote! Here's where we laugh again.

Nevertheless young Saunders is a bright chap with both eyes to the main chance and a bunch of nerve which, in the remote possibility of Editor Hearst's nomination, would make it dead easy for him to walk up to William Randolph, slap him on the back and say "Hello, Bill; I congratulate you." With such a splendid nerve the surprise is that Saunders is content to run Hearst, instead of brushing him aside and becoming the candidate himself.

Of course the story that Hearst is putting up the coin for Saunders' newspaper is too ridiculous to be true. Edenton is a newspaper graveyard and Hearst is no fool. A man who has sense enough to get elected to congress would not plant his good money in a small seaport town of a Southern state and expect it to come up and bear presidential delegates. And even Hearst, with all his millions, is not rich enough to hand out all the money that could be placed in North Carolina. We know a thing or two about that game down here.

We suppose the fact that the country refuses to take his presidential boom seriously jars on Mr. Hearst's nerves, but it will never touch Saunders. He is already a smooth proposition, and when he grows up he will get in somewhere. It is simply impossible to suppress him. He is the only living successor to the late P. T. Barnum, and if he doesn't spoil for the lack of salt he will be a great man some day.

In his newspaper venture we wish Mr. Saunders every success. He has done much clever reportorial work, and there is the making of a successful newspaper man in him.

What a touchingly unsophisticated lot of folks those people around the edges of Charlotte's skirts must be. A Washington, D. C., clothing firm advertised an offer of "18 cents for 1902 pennies" and straightway the thrifty Mecklenburgers began to save, buy, beg, borrow or swipe every lone copper cent from the mountains to the sea. Several people paid 10 cents each for as many of the "brownies" as they could gobble up, and went on their way to Washington rejoicing. But a cold, cruel hoax awaited them. So the crestfallen Mecklenburgers lugged their coppers back home. We suggest that the once prized but now despised pennies be cast into a life-size statue of P. T. Barnum, that great con game man, who gave immortality to the proverb: "American people like to be humbugged."

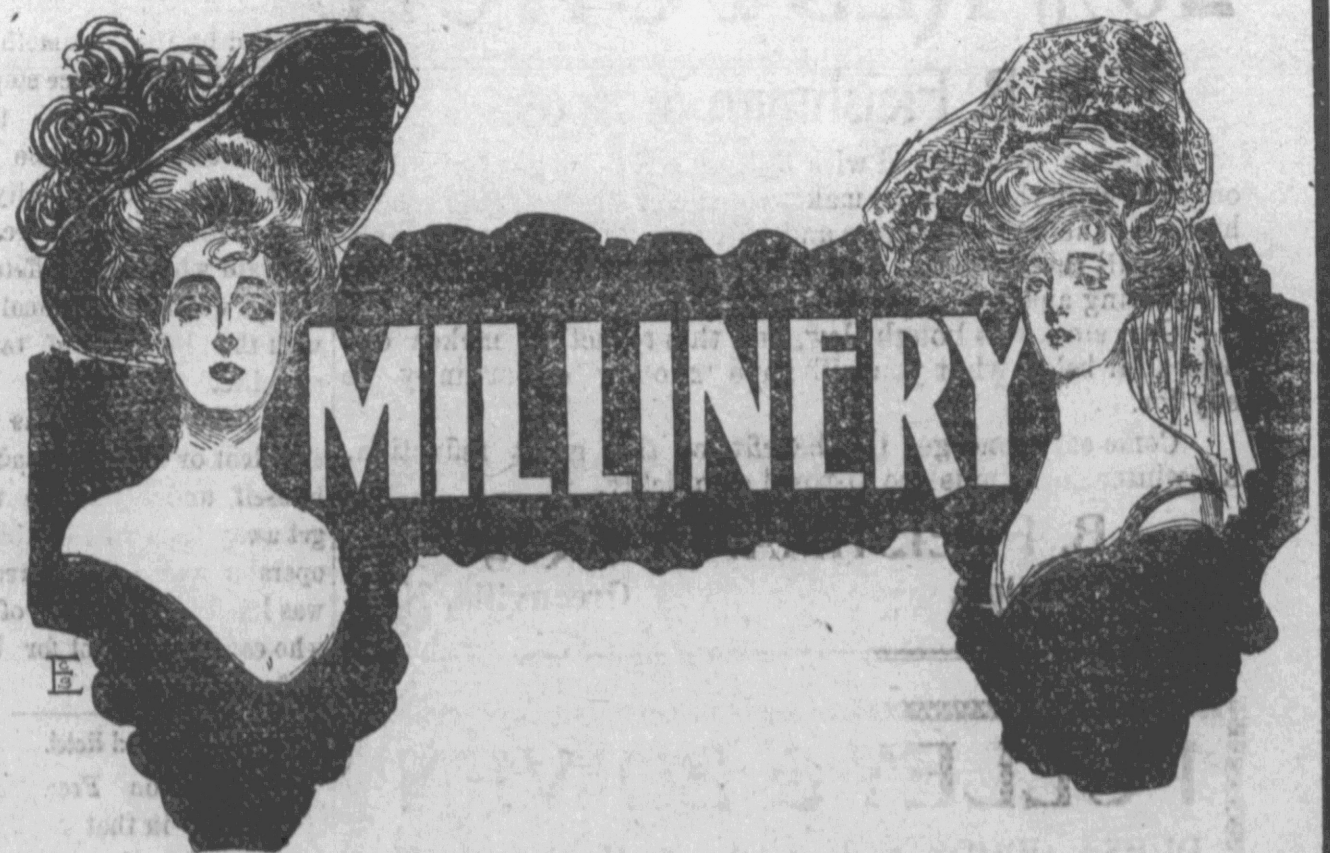

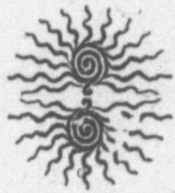
