ABOUT TAXATION.

If, in order to induce a man to invest his money among us, we are compelled to bribe him with unjustly low tax rates, we say let him stay away.

"A touchin' of and appertainin' to" the foregoing we quote the Durham Sun:

"The tax assessors are now on their rounds for the regular four year assessment, and property owners are becoming anxious as to the assessments that will be placed upon their property. We have heard the same thing expressed here as the Telegram records in Greensboro. A leading capitalist, in talking about the matter, said that the action of the assessors would largely influence him in certain investments which he has in mind. He is thinking of erecting several new houses, but he won't do it if his property is to be assessed out of reason. Taxes and insurance, he declared are things that have to be reckoned with in building for investment."

This capitalist's meaning is clear. He offers to build several new houses if the assessors will let him off lightly enough so that he can make more money than his neighbor who has to pay a full and just assessment. We are no advocate of high taxes, but it would not be a just and honorable course for the assessors to heed any such argument as the Durham man puts forth. The more privileges he gets the more he wants.

Dancing seems to have gone out of fashion in Charlotte. For several years past it has been growing less popular, and this year, when the place is full of young men and young women there have been fewer than half a dozen balls. There are no longer any dancing clubs in town, and it looks as if the diversion was on its last legs here. It is unusual in the South for society to so plainly neglect an amusement that is considered the chief reason for social gathering. The strongest argument in favor of dancing, from an individual viewpoint, is the fact that everybody grows tired of it sooner or later.—Idle Comment in Charlotte Observer.

It takes places like Greenville to keep the custom going, for here it is adjudged a dull week socially when a dance does not take place. About the time a thing gets out of date elsewhere it is all the rage here. And the dance does not reach its highest success without the punch bowl accompaniment.

Few Good Dinner Waiters.
A New York fashionable restaurant man who was asked why he specified a good "dinner" waiter in his advertisement said: "Because all good waiters are not necessarily good dinner waiters; quite the contrary. The tendency with most waiters, unless they know their customer, is to hurry a meal along. They want to make room at the tables for newcomers. Most men who take all their meals at restaurants will not object to this at breakfast; in fact, it is rather gratifying than otherwise to find a waiter willing to hurry. The same thing is true, more or less, with luncheon where the restaurant is exclusively for gentlemen. But very few men like to be hurried over their dinner. Any waiter who knows his business will coax his customers gently over this meal, course by course, always ready, but never around when he is not wanted. Such a man will get a liberal tip and send customers away with the opinion that he works in the best restaurant in town. But such waiters are few and far between.—New York Times.

Strength of Animal Scent.
The bird dog man is likely to think his favorite has a better nose than any animal on earth. He can tell you any amount of stories about birds being scented at very long distances. Now it is a covey of chickens winded at 300 yards, or, again, a bevy of quail drawn straight to at seventy-five. There are other animals, however, which have wonderfully keen noses. For instance, the sea otter hunters do not dare build a fire for days at a time on the little islands of the Pacific ocean frequented by those animals because the otter can smell the fumes from the smallest blaze a distance of five miles out at sea. It is said of this animal that he can trail a fish under the sea. Moose have been known to wind a man at two miles and make up their minds so positively about him as to never quit running under twenty-five.

A White Ant Diet.
A book on the Kongo Free State gives this picture of the fondness of the natives for white ants: "In the white ant month the natives have a very busy time. The river is deserted, and men and women, boys and girls, go out to gather the white ant for food. I cannot say I admire their taste, but the white ant is not bad as food, merely very rich. In this month he is about an inch long. The natives gather him in hundreds, pull off the wings and roast him. The native boys have a shorter way with him. Sometimes at mess white ants fopped on to the table, attracted by the light. The boys who were waiting ponced on them and without further ceremony popped them into their mouths."

Strength of Eggshells.
Most people are aware of the power of eggshells to resist external pressure on the ends, but not many would credit the results of tests recently made, which appear to be genuine. Eight ordinary hen's eggs that were submitted to pressure varied between 400 pounds and 675 pounds per square inch. With the stresses applied internally to twelve eggs these gave way at pressures varying between thirty-two pounds and sixty-five pounds per square inch. The pressure required to crush the eggs varied between forty pounds and seventy-five pounds. The average thickness of the shells was thirteen one-thousandths inch.

The Public School.
The public school is generally underestimated and is frequently looked upon with indifference. Its influence cannot be expressed in a few words, but its influence is the lifeblood of the home, the community and the nation. Any ordinary imagination can conjure up a state of affairs that would soon come to pass if the schoolhouse were closed. It is the great sieve into which all the nations of the world are thrown, to be shaken down to the common level of obedience and patriotism.—Schoolmaster.

CRAIG LAW DECLARED VOID

SUPREME COURT OF NORTH CAROLINA REVERSED.

SOUTHERN RAILWAY VICTORY.

Cannot be Compelled to Become a North Carolina Corporation.

Washington, May 18.—The Supreme court of the United States today declared the Craig act of 1899 void, at the same time reversing the Supreme court of North Carolina in the case of Southern Railway vs J. H. Allison, of McDowell county. The Craig act is virtually nullified by the highest court in the land, the decision being that a foreign corporation cannot be made a domestic corporation when already incorporated in another state. Accordingly the Southern Railway is declared to be a corporation of Virginia. The court declares that it cannot subscribe to the policy laid down by the Supreme court of North Carolina and takes occasion to say that the Supreme court of South Carolina has come to the same conclusion. The opinion of the court which was declined by Justice Peckham on behalf the court, was unanimous.

The Silk Hat Boom.

The silk hat boom is on, even in windy Kansas, but it took the most earnest solicitation of Governor Bailey's friends to get him to consent to wear one to the St. Louis fair dedication.

The writer, a tenderfoot, remembers an experience with a "tile" thirty years ago at a fourth of July celebration at Salina. It was the only one on the grounds except the big white bell crown worn by the impersonator of "Uncle Sam" at the head of the procession—we brought up the rear and was gayed out of countenance. Some of the cowboys even threatened to shoot. We then and there abandoned the "plug" forever.—Manhauatan, Kans., Republic.

CHAMPION FIREBUG.

VIRGINIA INCENDIARY MAKES AN AWFUL CONFESSION.

Has Destroyed Two Hundred Thousand Dollars Worth of Property.

Richmond, May 18.—Walter Evans, white, has confessed to Rev. J. E. McCartney, of West Point, that he was the man who three weeks ago set fire to the building which resulted in the destruction of 52 houses in that town and loss of property amounting to \$200,000. Evans is a painter and has been a hard drinker for years. News of the confession spread rapidly and soon a crowd of several hundred persons who had sustained heavy loss collected and expressed a willingness to deal with him without the formality of a trial. A town sergeant got the man in a buggy and drove out of town at breakneck speed. The sergeant placed Evans on an excursion train and brought him to this city where he was kept until today, when he was taken to West Point for a hearing this afternoon. The town is wild with excitement. There have been a number of incendiary fires in the town since the conflagration of three weeks ago.

RALEIGH LETTER.

Raleigh, N. C., May 18.—There is great interest manifested in the outcome of the Ernest Haywood case (charged with the killing of Ludlow Skinner three months ago) which will receive its first hearing in court the last of next week, before Justices Douglas and Walker of Supreme court, on a writ of habeas corpus to admit defendant Haywood, on bond, and release him from the county jail here, till the term of Wake Superior court.

The hearing will begin Thursday, May 28, and will probably consume several days, as counsel for the prosecution have been instructed to resist strongly the effort to bail Haywood. It will be public and the county court house will be used, but it will accommodate only a small proportion of the crowd that will probably seek admission—so great is the interest, and the curiosity here. It is almost as great throughout the state, and no criminal case tried in North Carolina in a generation has attracted so much attention.

Mr Haywood and his lawyers (who have hitherto complained of the disinclination of witnesses to tell what they know or saw) now claim to be able to prove a strong case of self defence.

The action of the Southern Cotton Spinner's Association at its seventh annual meeting at Charlotte last Friday and Saturday in recommending cessation of night work in cotton mills and curtailment of day work to four (4) days per week until the market gets better or raw cotton cheaper, is regarded as the proper step to pursue.

The calling of a state temperance convention, to meet in Raleigh July 7th is an important event of the past week. It is called by the executive committee of the Anti-Saloon League, and among the reasons given is this: "We are about to enter upon a great campaign." The sentiments against open saloons is unquestionably much stronger now than in many years in North Carolina, and the elimination of the negro vote materially strengthens the temperance and anti-saloon forces. The establishment of town and county liquor dispensaries seems to be now generally accepted as the most available "entering wedge" to drive out the saloons.

I am told that the plan of consolidating a large number of North Carolina cotton mills under the scheme generally known as the "Fries Merger" has about been abandoned, so far as this State is concerned. The adjourned meeting set for last week was not held. It is stated, however, that the recently incorporated (in New Jersey) "Southern Textile Co" will form a combine of a number of Georgia and Alabama mills. But the mill men interested are so "close-mouthed" on the subject it is hard to get at the exact facts.

The two new orphanages at Raleigh have just been formally dedicated—the Catholic yesterday and the Methodist several days ago, the corner-stone of the latter being laid by the Masons.

To Suppress the Confederate Flag by Law.

The discussion of recent incidents in which Miss Nellie Archer, a beautiful young Southern girl, was compelled by the G. A. R. veterans to take down a Confederate flag from her residence in this city, has resulted in a movement on the part of ex-soldiers to have a law passed by the Ohio legislature to provide a penalty for displaying a Confederate flag unless the same has been captured in battle. Ex-State Senator T. F. Davis, of this city, and J. L. Wiltsie, of Toledo, have proposed the enactment of such a law—Marietta, O., Dispatch, 16th.
