#### MINNIE COX'S PAY WILL STOP AND SHE WILL STOP.

#### Postal Laws Balk Postoffice Department's Plans for Vengeance.

Washington, May 20.—At the end of the present fiscal year, June 30th, Minnie V. Cox, the colored postmistress at Indianola, Miss., will be dropped from the pay roll of the postoffice department. Officials who desired to punish the citizens of Indianola by suspending the postoffice but continuing Minnie Cox in office and paying her salary, are much chagrined over this inevitable and unexpected termination of the case, which the postal laws make it impossible to avoid. The salary of postmasters of presidential offices, in which class the Indianola office belongs, depends upon the annual receipts of the office. When the latter is less than \$1,200 per year, it is dropped to fourth class and postmaster's pay is derived only from cancellations. When there are no cancellations the office is abolished.

#### FEW DIE AND NONE RESIGN.

#### Payne Will Stick to His Job 'Till the Clouds Roll By.

Washington, May 20.—When Postmaster-General Payne returned to the Arlington at bed time tonight he found a dozen newspaper men waiting to interview him as to the truth of the report published today that he was about to resign. Mr. Payne would not treat the rumor seriously, merely saying he will not do so until the president returns to Washington, and that then he will tell the news papers about it. It is not likely he will resign until the president sees the report of Fourth Assistant Postmaster General Bristow.

#### Ex Lieutenant Governor of Louisiana Killed.

Thibodeaux, La., May 19.—A shooting affray which resulted in the killing of ex-Lieutenant Governor Clay Knoblock occurred early this morning on Main street and created a great deal of excitement. The shooting was done by James Garault, a well known barber.

The two men were seen talking together when suddenly ex-Lieutenant Governor Knoblock drew his revolver. It appeared that he experienced some trouble with the weapon and it failed to explode. Meantime, Garault whipped out his revolver and opened fire on his adversary. That his aim was true is established by the autopsy held by the coroner, who found five wounds in the dead man's body. Either of the several wounds would have proved fatal. Ex Lieut. Governor Knoblock, it is understood, did not get a chance to use his revolver after Garault got his out.

#### BIRTHDAY OF CUBAN REPUBLIC.

Havana, Cuba, May 20.—The celebration of the first anniversary of the Cuban republic here today was very quiet. Business was completely suspended and the streets were thronged with people. President Tomas Estrada Palma, accompanied by his cabinet, city and provincial officials, drove to the Punta and reviewed the parade.

### JUDGE WALTER CLARK MUCH TALKED ABOUT

#### INTERVIEW WITH BRYAN AT LINCOLN, NEBRASKA.

#### His Choice for the Presidency Discussed by Northern Newspapers.

Washington, May 20.—Judge Walter Clark is getting a good bit of advertising since it became known that he is the choice of William J. Bryan for the democratic presidential nomination. The New York Herald and Sun and a half dozen other eastern papers continued the story this morning for the first time. The second edition of the Herald, which does not go South, contained the following special from Lincoln, Neb. "W. J. Bryan was asked tonight if he had told Senator Blackburn in Washington that Judge Walter Clark, of North Carolina, would be a good man for president, and if he would stand by the assertion."

"If Senator Blackburn said so it must be so," said Mr. Bryan, smilingly. Then he added. "In discussing Judge Clark with Senator Blackburn and others it has only been as one of many available candidates. The Commoner had previously suggested the name of Judge Clark among other possible candidates."

#### A HAIL OF A TIME.

#### Destructive Storm in Oklahoma Territory.

Guthrie, Okla., May 20.—A destructive wind and hail storm visited south western Oklahoma, doing great damage to growing crops. Chunks of ice an inch in diameter fell, ruining crops of all kinds and injuring property. A panic was caused among school children and loss of life narrowly averted.

#### The Two Boodlers.

Jefferson City, Mo., May 20.—The verdicts in the cases of Julius Lehmann and H. A. Faulkner, former members of the St. Louis house of delegates, convicted of perjury in connection with the suburban street railway franchise deal and sentenced each to two years imprisonment in the penitentiary, were reversed by the Supreme court today and the cases were remanded to the St. Louis circuit court for new trials. Judge Gantt delivered the opinion which was concurred in by all the judges.

The court holds that the indictments against Faulkner and Lehmann were valid, but that the trial court erred in instructing the jury that if it found that Faulkner and Lehmann swore that they had never heard of \$75,000 boodler fund when in fact the evidence showed that they knew of the money even from newspaper reports, they should be adjudged guilty of perjury.

The court says that the trial court had no power to supply by its instructions an avertment not in the indictment, and permit, as it did, a conviction on a charge not included in its indictment.

#### A Correction.

The report that the Jeffress warehouse fire was caused by an incendiary was incorrect. The oil found near the fire leaked from a marking pot, giving room for suspicion of incendiarism. It is not known how the fire originated.

#### The Kentucky Assassination.

Lexington, Ky., May 20.—Curtis Jett, charged with the murder of J. B. Marcum, was brought into the circuit court today at Winchester on a motion to dismiss the habeas corpus proceedings. The county attorney was not present, but Jailer Boone, against whom the relief measure was directed conducted, conducted his own case. The court decided to hold Jett and made a statement that to return him to Jackson, Ky., will be instantly to turn him loose. He will await the action of the Breathitt grand jury. It is said there was some trick in today's proceedings in the Jett case which Judge Benton defeated. The habeas corpus motion had been overruled and the case set for hearing June 4th to ascertain the facts of the killing and satisfy the court whether he should hold Jett at all. Jett's attorney came into court and made a motion to dismiss his own motion. Judge Benton believed this a preparatory step to demanding an examination trial as the law provides. In this case he could not get the Breathitt witnesses and Jett could ask for dismissal in their absence.

#### Cashier Wrecked the Bank.

Washington, May 20.—The treasury department today received a telegram from National Bank Examiner Perkins announcing the closing of the Southport National Bank of Southport, Conn.

This action, it is understood, was taken in consequence of the defalcation of the cashier, which is believed to have approximated \$100,000. The bank's capital stock plus undivided profits amount to \$180,871 and its deposits to \$122,164.

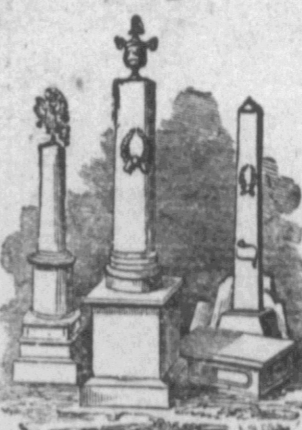

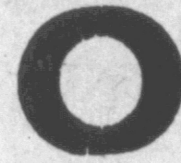
