### POPE IS PASSING.

**Aged Ruler of Roman Religion Crossing Over the Bar.**

Rome, July 9th (evening)—The Pope has again suddenly become worse. He is spitting blood and dysentery has set in. It is expected that he will die soon. His condition has never been so bad since his illness.

Rome, July 10 (1 a. m.)—Dr. Mazzoni returned to the vatican at 11 o'clock and remained an hour. He found His Holiness no worse. His death is not imminent. The doctor believes it will be necessary to repeat the operation of draining the pleura this morning if the Pope is strong enough.

### LIFE LOST IN FLAMES.

**Norfolk Seamstress Horribly Incinerated.**

Norfolk, Va., July 9.—Mrs. Willis, wife of Bud Willis, a stevedore, lost her life in a fire here today. She was a seamstress of grain bags on the third floor of Jesse Jones & Son's hay and grain warehouse on Roanoke Dock, which burned at 2 o'clock. There were two houses adjoining filled with hay. The fire caught and burned so quickly that the entire stock was in flames before the fire department arrived. Mrs. Willis appeared at the window and was ordered to jump into the arms of the men beneath. She hesitated, screamed and fell back into the hay before the firemen could hold up the ladder. The loss is estimated at \$50,000, well insured.

### Carolina Club.

About thirty members of Pythian lodge here obtained a charter for a club to be known as the Carolina Literary and social club and the following officers have been elected—

The constitution and by laws adopted prohibited the taking of liquor or any gambling in the club rooms.

The club will have reading, reception and game rooms and will afford a suitable place for young men to spend their evenings. The location has not yet been decided upon, but it is hoped to get in the central portion of the town.

While the club was chartered by Pythians the membership will not be restricted to that order.

### SHEPARD AND AYCOCK.

**Washington Times Discusses Democratic Outlook.**

Washington, D. C., July 9th—The Washington Times this afternoon discusses at length the possibility of Shepard and Aycock as the nominees of the democratic party next year. Among other things the Times says:

"A new democratic banner has been flung to the breeze. It bears the names of Shepard and Aycock. For president, Edward M. Shepard, prominent citizen of Brooklyn, N. Y., and former candidate for mayor. For vice president, Charles B. Aycock, governor of North Carolina.

"This suggestion for a renewal of the old alliance of the solid South and New York ought to cause democrats to stop and consider. Of the Hon. Edward M. Shepard the general public knows much.

"It knows of his opposition to the regular democratic ticket in 1896 because of the silver plank in the platform; of his return to the fold four years later and his support of Bryan on the issue of anti imperialism; his unsuccessful canvass for mayor two years ago on the Tammany ticket and of his recent efforts to harmonize the divided factions of democracy, and with it there is a suspicion that Mr. Shepard, who had never avowed himself one way or the other, is willing to be considered a candidate for president.

Of Governor Aycock probably not so much is known, although he is certainly entitled to careful consideration. He is regarded by those who know him and his record as one of the ablest men in public office in the South today. He is brilliant, an orator of ability and has given North Carolina a clean administration. The old objection of a candidate from a secession state should not hold against him, for he is so young as scarcely to remember in a vague sort of way any of the stirring events of the early sixties. He is greatly beloved by the people of the state, scholarly, conservative, earnest and conscientious and if a Southern man is to be chosen he is entitled to first consideration.

### An Interesting Trip.

Lieut Bruce Cotten, U. S. army, stationed at Fort Flager, state of Washington, has been put in command of a lot of recruits for the U. S. Army and ordered to take them to the various military posts in Alaska. Lieut. Cotten left Fort Flager with his command on the 15th of June, by what is known as "the inland route." It will take him a month or six weeks to make this trip and by the time he returns to his post will have traveled over three thousand miles through a wild country, full of interest, where we are told the scenery is sublime and at this season of the year no nights to interfere with work or travel—"Land of the midnight sun."

**AWAKE, YE FOLKS WHO WANT A RAILROAD.**

From an interview in the Raleigh papers with Captain J. M. Turner, one of the chief promoters of the Raleigh and Pamlico railroad, formerly called the Raleigh and Eastern, it appears that Greenville and Washington are in a fair way to get it where the farmyard bird got the axe.

When those interested in the new road were in Greenville and Washington a few weeks ago it was believed, with good reason, that these two towns would surely be entered, but now we read as follows:

"What about the line between Wilson and the sound?" asked the reporter.

"Well, we cannot tell just now where it will run. We are examining several routes, and the most available will be adopted. The people down there are thoroughly aroused, and we are receiving many letters from various sections making valuable suggestions. I think the company will be guided, as to route, largely by the recommendation of the engineers."

This is a portion of an interview with Mr. Claude M. Barbee in the News and Observer.

In the Morning Post President Turner said:

"While some preliminary lines have been run 25 or 30 miles east of Raleigh, no definite location has been made, particularly through that portion of the territory east of Wilson, especially since there is a strong effort being made to get the road to run through Greene county, thence to Pamlico Sound, New Bern or Kinston."

From which it appears that Greenville and Washington are due to get busy and see that no such thing as above proposed is done. Via Greenville and Washington is the logical route for the new road and our people certainly have been led to believe that it was practically settled that way. ## NOTICE OF SPECIAL SCHOOL ELECTION.

At a meeting of the board of commissioners of Pitt county held this day, a petition signed by one fourth of the free holders residing within the territory hereinafter set out, which petition was duly approved and endorsed by the board of education of Pitt county on the 6th day of July, 1903, it is ordered that an election be held in the territory hereinafter described, proposed as a special school district, on Friday, August 7th, 1903, to ascertain the will of the people of said district whether there shall be levied a special annual tax of thirty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property and ninety cents on the poll to supplement the public school fund which may be apportioned to said district by the county board of education in case such special tax is voted.

The boundaries of said proposed special district is as follows.

Beginning at Littlefield and running north by Asa Garris' house out to the public road at Mrs. Mary Garris' thence up said road to Back Swamp, thence down said swamp to Swift creek, thence down said creek to the public road leading from Grifton to Greenville, then up said road to Lafayette Cox's line on east side of public road, thence with Lafayette Cox's line to Martha L. Cox's line, thence with G. W. Cannon's line to Susan E. Cannon's line, then with his line back to the public road, then up said road to the fork near Hancock's church, thence west with Suow Hill road to T. C. Cannon's old homestead, thence with the road to rail road near G. McDixon's by R. E. Jackson's, thence south with railroad to south side of Swift creek, thence up said creek to Titus Jolley and Benj. Smith's line, thence with said Jolley and Smith line to the public road, thence down said road to Mrs. J. J. Smith and Frank McLawhorn's line, thence west with Biggs Harrington's heirs' line to the public road, including all the lands of the late Biggs Harrington, situated on north side of public road leading from Ayden to John Pearce, thence up said road toward Ayden to a branch near Joe McLawhorn's house, thence a straight to John Dennis and A. F. Cox corner, thence with John Dennis line to Jordan Cox's heirs line, thence with Dennis and the Jordan Cox heirs line East to W. F. Hart and John Dennis corner near the public road, thence down Celie Garris line to J. T. Hart's corner, thence with J. T. Hart's line south to Calvin McLawhorn corner, thence with Calvin McLawhorn line to Asa Garris' corner, thence with his (Garris) line to the beginning at Littlefield.

It was further ordered that said election shall be held and conducted in the manner prescribed by law, and that a new registration of the voters of said territory shall be had, and for the purpose of registering said voters and conducting said election the Board appointed G. W. Prescott as Registrar and Jesse Cannon and J. A. Harrington as Judges of Election. At said election those who are in favor of the levy and collection of said tax shall vote a ticket on which shall be printed or written the words, "For Special Tax," and those whose who are opposed shall vote a ticket on which shall be printed or written the words, "Against Special Tax." By order of the Board of Commissioners of Pitt County made this 6th day of July, 1903.

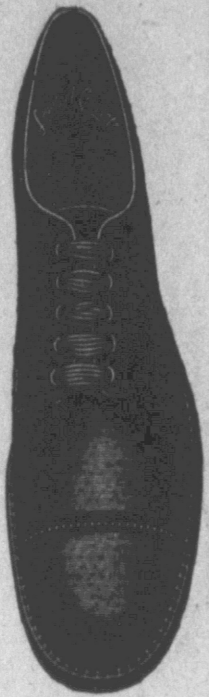

Upon petition elections were ordered held in a district embracing the town of Farmville and community, and in a district embracing the town of Ayden and community, on a question of levying special taxes for the establishment of graded schools.
