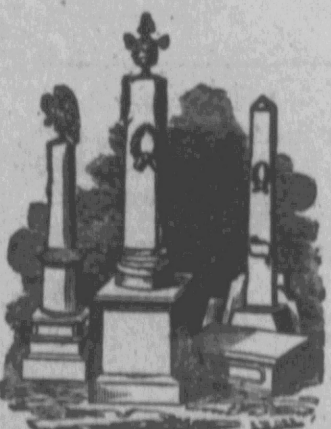

DIVERSITY OF CROPS.

In this communication we desire to speak especially of the need of diversified crops and the benefits derived there from. While we see around hundreds and thousands of acres of land upon which cotton and tobacco are cultivated, which are the money crops principally in this country, we are forced to admit that the farmers are making a very grave mistake in giving all their attention to the growth of the above mentioned products, to the entire neglect of other crops equally as necessary and profitable to cultivate. While large money is made on tobacco and cotton by the farmers, we notice thousands of dollars worth of Western flour, meat, hay and corn are sold to the farmers, when they should raise all they consume on the farm, except a few articles such as sugar, coffee, salt and a few aromatic to spice up the dainties and sweet meats the farmer's wife knows so well how to prepare.

Under these conditions the questions can be readily asked, "Does farming pay?" Before that inquiry is answered let us ask the farmer, why do you not raise all these necessaries at home? The farmer, or at least some of them say we cannot raise grass, hence cannot have hay. We do not raise wheat because we have no mills to grind our wheat into flour, we do not raise all of our pork because we can buy Western meat cheaper than we can make the home product.

In answering the first excuse, we will say have you ever tried to raise grass? The writer of this can take any field, (not sandy,) and by careful preparation of soil and fertilizing it, can raise either the red clover or orchard grass. You have the clay subsoil although the upper soil may be somewhat loamy. Wherever you can get a clay soil for the tap root of red clover to reach down and find strength of soil and the latent fertility which the clay soil gives, then you can raise clover at home.

Any upland which is not too sandy, if rich enough, will grow orchard grass profitably.

The second excuse can be answered by saying, begin the raising of wheat and roller mills will naturally follow.

The question of buying western meat cheaper than the home grown is a tentative one. If you can raise corn cheaper than you can buy it, then you have made meat cheaper. It all depends upon the expense attending the cultivation of a crop, whether it is cheaper to buy or produce.

The farmers with their fertile lands, mild climate, sufficiency of moisture in the air, and also underneath the surface, can certainly raise corn, wheat, grass and a surplus of pork, every year if they will but try. Diversity of crops, making a surplus of every thing you may raise, and selling at remunerative prices, is the great secret of success to the husbandman. The farmer may raise large crops of cotton and tobacco, he may receive large returns from the sale of same, and yet if he has to pay out his money for other supplies which he should make at home, that farmer is not making anything, but is perhaps, getting poorer every year. The time has come in the life of the farmer when he must not only work, but

New York High Grade Teachers.

"At a recent teachers' meeting," said a visitor who just "happened in," "one of the speakers made the statement that the male teachers of New York city public schools were all specialists of exceptional ability; that they were just such men as one finds outside of the city in the positions of superintendents and principals of high schools. 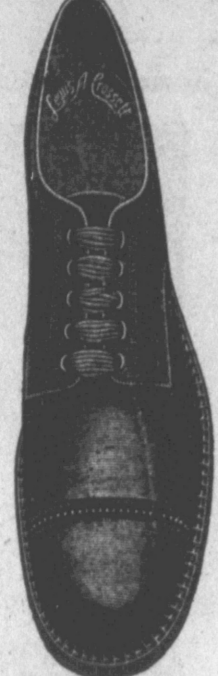
