Every Train a Mail Train.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 11.—The plans of the postoffice department for making practically every railway train in the United States a mail train depends for their success very largely on the ability of the postmaster general to secure a special appropriation from congress. The special appropriation is necessary in view of the fact that the expense of employing baggage masters and other train men to handle mail will be large. It is believed, however, that some useful experiments can be made between now and the convening of congress, the expense defrayed from the regular fund of the railway mail service.

Was the Wreck Planned?

Gastonia, N. C., Aug. 11.—Engineer Black, Fireman Earle and Mail Clerks Burchfield and Sharpe, who were hurt in the wreck near here last night, it is said will recover. It is said railroad men claim that there is indisputable evidence that the wreck was deliberately planned. It has been discovered that the switch lock was broken with a rock and the signal light extinguished. Persons who visited the scene after the accident confirm this.

The track was cleared about 7 o'clock this morning. There were a good many rotten ties taken out.

Miles Opens Up

Chicago, Ills., August 11.—The Tribune today prints an interview with Gen. Nelson A. Miles, who was asked as to the manner of his retirement from the army and who is quoted as having said. "The matter is closed for the present. Those who read the brief order and who have been cognizant of of the events of the last few years will understand the situation. I believe that any one can run and read and understand." The general denied any ambition to become a member of the G. A. R.

Storm Approaching.

Washington, Aug. 11.—The weather bureau has issued the following this morning: "A storm of great intensity is approaching Jamaica and Cuba from the eastward. It is dangerous to vessels of all classes to sail for the gulf and South Atlantic and Cuban ports.

Firemen at Durham.

Durham, N. C., Aug. 11.—The sixteenth annual session of the North Carolina Firemen's association convened here today. The tournament will begin tomorrow and last two days.

Notice.

Chapter 2, section 1, of the ordinances of the town of Greenville, provides as follows:

"Every occupant of a lot on any street shall keep the sidewalk clean and clear of weeds, grass and other rank vegetation as far as such lot extends. If any rubbish, dirt, ashes or any other thing be placed or left without lawful authority, upon such sidewalk or in the gutters or streets adjacent thereto, the occupant of such lot shall remove the same. If after written notice by the chief of police, or street commissioners, requiring him to remove the things prohibited by this ordinance, he shall fail for twenty four hours to remove the same, he shall be fined five dollars for each day thereafter it may so remain."

You are therefore notified to comply with the above ordinance or you will be dealt with as the ordinance directs.

John Temple Graves on the Race Question.

Chautauqua N. Y., Aug. 11.—John Temple Graves, of Atlanta, the Georgia philosopher, in an address today before the Chautauqua conference on "the mob spirit of the South" defended lynch law as a remedy for the crime of rape, holding that although lynching is a crime it is justified by the crime which provokes it and will never be discontinued until that crime is eliminated. The remedy for lynching must be the elimination of a serious crime and this he maintained could be done only by the separation of the two races in the United States.

Temperance and Morality.

A meeting was held in the court house this morning to discuss the temperance and moral conditions that prevail in Pitt county, with a view of inaugurating plans for awakening such interest as will bring about an improvement of these conditions and uplift the masses of the people. The meeting had not been well advertised and the attendance was small. Several talks were made discussing these conditions and it was decided to adjourn without action to another meeting to be held in the court house on Wednesday, Sept. 2nd, at 11 o'clock a. m., at which every person in the county interested in these matters is requested to be present.

Won't Boycott Trust.

Winston-Salem, N. C., Aug. 11.—The merchants association here decline to join the Kinston association in a boycott against the goods manufactured by the American Tobacco Company. The resolutions adopted by the Kinston merchants were promptly tabled after being read before the local merchants.

79 And His Fourth Venture.

Eighty Killed.

Washington, Aug. 11.—Consul Jewel cabled today that eighty were killed in the Martinique cyclone and over five thousand were homeless. The villages of Trinite Tivoti, Fondla Haye and Fournois Reculle were almost entirely destroyed.

Powder Mills Explode.

Wilmington, Del., Aug. 11.—The Dupont Powder Mills at Sarney's Point blew up this morning. No particulars have yet been received as to loss of life. Several adjoining buildings were damaged by the flying pieces of debris. The cause of the explosion is unknown.

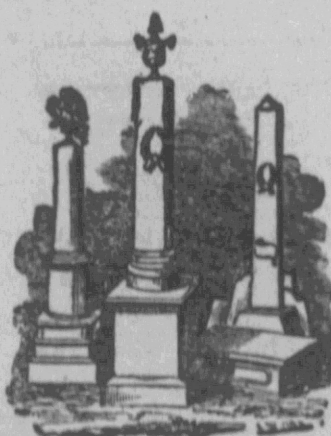

A Blow to Negro Education.

The Mississippi primary election has resulted in the choice of Varadanian for governor of the state. He made the chief issue of his platform opposition to the education of the negro. The Chronicle has not seen just how far he carried this opposition. It would be unjust to condemn his position until it is fully known, but if it is an extreme ground that he occupies, the tendency to oppose the education of the negro, which has often cropped in the South quite frequently of late years, has gained its greatest victory. The state of Mississippi will have a governor who will be opposed to the black citizens of his state making strides in knowledge. He will not sympathize with any aspirations on their part to climb higher in the scale of intelligence. The states of the South were justifiable in amending their constitutions to regulate the suffrage so that the negro could not control in the government, state or county, but it is going a step too far when the support of the white people is withdrawn from the negro schools. Mississippi is already, we believe, about the bottom of the column for illiteracy in the United States, and she is apt to remain there if she stands for governors who are opposed to the education of the black race within her borders.—Charlotte Chronicle.

The Dewey embezzlement case is the most sensational financial happening in North Carolina in a good many years. After the first excitement subsides one wonders what Mr. Dewey will do with himself—how he proposes to spend his time in the future in case he isn't captured. These days a man who takes over \$100,000—and takes it from a bank—is never safe in any civilized country, and the long arm of the law is apt to pluck him from the South Sea Islands.
