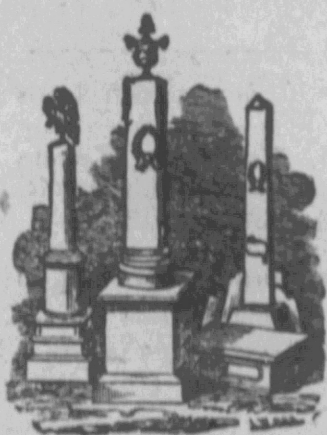

## CLOSE CALL FOR LIFE OF DOOMED MAN

Richmond, Va. Sept. 4.—Doo Bacon had two close calls today and it was by a very narrow margin that he missed death in both instances. The governor's respite came just in time to save him from hanging. The scaffold was ready and the religious services were being conducted when the telegram arrived which gave him a respite for thirty days. The second close call came later, a crowd of men from Chase City, where the crime for which he has been sentenced to hang was committed, learned that the negro had been respited and determined to lynch him. Judge Holmes saved his life by his earnest plea that the law be allowed to take its course. He assured the crowd that he believed the negro would finally be hung and upon this statement they allowed the sheriff to proceed to the train with his prisoner.

## DRUNKARD SLAYED HIS WIFE

Kinston, N. C., Sept. 5.—Emmett Boyette shot and killed his wife yesterday afternoon on the porch of her father's residence and in the presence of her mother. Mrs. Boyette's people had persuaded her to leave him and would not let him see her. He became enraged with jealousy, and while under the influence of liquor went to seek an audience with his wife. This being denied he drew a revolver and shot her twice, one ball entering just below the collar bone and the other entering the base of the brain near back of neck. The tragedy occurred about 1 o'clock, and Mrs. Boyette died at 4:30. Boyette made no effort to escape, but was by the side of his wife when the sheriff found him. He was taken to jail. He expressed sorrow that he had killed his wife and said he was willing to pay for it with his own life.

## FREIGHT WRECK ON MOUNTAIN RAILROAD

Asheville, N. C. Sept. 4.—A head on collision occurred yesterday between a north bound freight and south bound passenger train on the Transylvania railroad at a point near Toxaway. A negro brakeman on the freight was the only one receiving very serious injury. Both his legs were broken and one of them had to be amputated. Both engines were completely torn to pieces. The engineers jumped and saved themselves. The cause of the accident could not be ascertained.

## MURDERESS LEAPED TO HER DEATH.

Winston-Salem, N. C. Sept. 4.—The colored woman, Zell Taylor, who stabbed Douglas Hairston to death Monday night, leaped from one of the windows in the mayor's court room about 5:30 o'clock this afternoon, falling a distance of 30 feet. Her skull was crushed and one hip dislocated. She was unconscious when picked up and physicians say she cannot live. New evidence was presented to the mayor indicating that the woman was guilty of murder. As soon as sentence was pronounced committing her to jail to await trial at the higher court she arose and leaped out the window nearest her.

## HAMLET INCIDENT IS NOW CLOSED

Winston Salem, N. C. Sep. 4.—The North Carolina Division of the Travelers Protective Association met in called session here tonight. The Booker Washington incident at Hamlet was discussed. Gresham and Jamison, owners of the hotel at Hamlet, were present and presented their side of the question in regard to serving breakfast to Washington and his party at their hotel on August 23rd. The gentlemen expressed regret if they had done anything wrong. After hearing the statement of the hotel owners a motion was adopted to the effect that the association did not feel called upon to take any action in the matter.

## ALABAMA CONVICTS DASH FOR LIBERTY

Birmingham, Ala., Sept. 4.—Four convicts were shot at Pratt Mines prison early this morning in an attempt to escape, two of whom may die. All are white and were serving sentences from 2 to 20 years. They had secured a lot of dynamite and blew an opening in the end of the prison. They saw through this hole and hurled sticks of dynamite at the guards. The latter opened fire with Winchesters and succeeded in preventing a wholesale delivery. Only one prisoner escaped.

**PITT COUNTY DOES NOT NEED TO WHINE.**

Business in Greenville and all other towns in Pitt county has begun to look up very encouragingly. Crops of cotton, corn and peanuts are good, and there is no earthly reason why we should do any strenuous kicking about hard times. Every time you speak of hard times you make it worse. We believe firmly in independent tobacco factories, but we do not believe they can bring about such "good times" as some seem to think. We ought to manufacture in Pitt county every pound of tobacco we raise, but it should not end there. A bale of raw cotton should not leave the county. We ought to manufacture every pound of Pitt cotton seed into oil and various other products. We ought to grow every pound of hay, corn and feedstuff we need for home use. We ought to raise every pound of meat used in the county. We ought to stop spending money for whiskey and put it into something that will benefit the whole people. We condemn the methods of the tobacco monopoly, but if Pitt county would spend its money at home and live at the same place we could laugh in the face of every trust in existence.

Don't pick up a stone to throw at something. A young lady of Whitsett attempted that very thing the other day and this is what happened to her:

Greensboro, N. C., Sept. 3.—Miss Cora Dick, of Whitsett, who has been seriously ill, as a result of a bite from a copperhead snake, is reported as about well. Some time ago, Miss Dick, while playing with some children, picked up what she supposed was a stone to playfully throw. She picked up a snake instead and was bitten on the wrist.
