### Same Couple Married Twice.

There was a trial in the Superior court Wednesday that brought out some peculiar circumstances and culminated in a couple being married the second time. George Roberson and Mrs. Susan Tripp were indicted for living together unlawfully. The evidence was such that the verdict of the jury declared the woman guilty and the man not guilty. While the woman was technically guilty, the evidence showed that it was not wilful but through ignorance. It seems that the woman some years ago married a man named Tripp. After being together a few years Tripp deserted her and went to Greene county. He also instituted divorce proceedings against his wife, but in the meantime married another woman, and never appearing to file his complaint in the divorce proceedings, the case went off the docket by non suit.

Later he deserted wife number two and went to Lenoir county, where he married the third woman. In some way wife number three found out that Tripp had another wife, number two, an indictment for bigamy followed and he got a term in the penitentiary. Wife number one, being under the impression that she was divorced, was courted by Roberson and they married, a license being obtained and a minister performing the ceremony. This was seven years ago and since then they have lived together, ignorant of the fact that their relation was contrary to law.

Not long ago a brother of the thrice married Tripp was in court on some matter and Roberson was a witness against him. This made him mad with Roberson, and knowing that the divorce case of his brother had never come to trial, for spite he had Roberson

and Mrs. Tripp number one indicted.

At the conclusion of the trial Judge Moore held that under the present law Mrs. Tripp was entitled to divorce from her first husband on the ground of abandonment, and he thought it would be best for her and Roberson and best for society that they be legally married. An agreement to this effect being made, during the recess of the court another license was obtained and the couple called on Justice of the Peace Henry Harding, who performed the second marriage ceremony for them.

Having been actively canvassing the state for twenty six years, the people know me, so I will open no headquarters and enter into no scramble for the nomination. I can campaign for my party and beg for votes for my friends, but it is a new rule to electioneer for myself, so I will submit myself into the people's hands asking them to let my candidacy be known, so that those desiring to aid me can do so, by seeing that I get in the primaries, all the votes to which I may be entitled.

To be governor of North Carolina is a high and laudable ambition, and I most earnestly desire to attain this high office, as both a token of the people's esteem, and a proof of their confidence in me.

If nominated, I will canvass the state, using every effort to insure democratic success, which means the state's safety and prosperity. If elected, knowing no man or class of men in the discharge of my duty, I will strive to advance all the interests of the State, endeavoring to procure "the greatest good to all, without detriment or injury to any." Having faith in the people, I believe I will be nominated; if, however, any of my worthy competitors are selected by the convention, I will cheerfully abide its decision, and continue in the future, as in the past, doing all I can to promote true democracy, as my party' success is to be valued more than my personal ambition. ### St. George Barnard is a Forger.

Richmond, Va., Sept. 23.—A remarkable sensation, particularly interesting to North Carolina people, came to light in this city tonight. Mr. B. E. Daniel, of Pleasant Hill, declared in a telegram received here tonight that the deed of trust on his property here purporting to be signed by him in the presence of St. George Barnard, the missing lawyer of Richmond, who married Miss Sallie Turner Smith, of Scotland Neck, is a rank forgery. It is known positively that Barnard received \$3,000 in cash borrowed from Councilman Beck, of Richmond, and secured by the deed of trust alleged to have been given by Daniel, of Pleasant Hill; another interesting fact is that for several days before he went away he was seen at Ford's hotel and other places with Mrs. G. C. Pernell, registered at the hotel as from Norfolk, but learned to be a widow from Nashville, N. C. She has not been seen since.

### Murder in a Police Station.

Durham, N. C., Sept. 23.—Harry Kelly, a white man 67 years of age, died in the police station tonight as a result of injuries received at the hands of G. J. Armstrong, a young white man. Both men were locked up yesterday on the charge of drunkenness. Soon afterwards Armstrong, who is a vicious character, attacked Kelly and knocked him down several times. In the fall his head came in contact with the steel bars of the cell and concussion of the brain is supposed to have caused death.

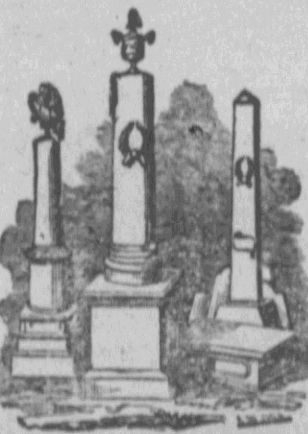

## COLONEL GLENN'S ANNOUNCEMENT.

It is with genuine pleasure that we publish today a letter from Colonel R. B. Glenn, of Winston-Salem, announcing his candidacy for the democratic nomination for governor.

Colonel Glenn is one of the strongest and most faithful of the men who have ever entered public life in North Carolina. As a champion of the state's second gospel, democracy, he has behind him a record of 25 years of faithful, tireless service to the party and the state. In Pitt county, as in every other portion of the state, he is known by his work against republicanism and for white supremacy. The people of Pitt wished him to have the senatorship last year, and we sincerely believe we speak for the entire county when we say that Pitt still holds Bob Glenn in grateful remembrance.

The state convention is several months distant, and an accurate forecast is impossible, but the friends of the Winston-Salem man may rest assured that their candidate will be in the front row.

In the next congress Senator Crumpacker is going to raise a mighty and a foolish howl for the repeal of the fifteenth amendment, and Senator Crumpacker is going to demand the reduction of Southern representation. Both of these wild-eyed statesmen will be of as much use to their constituents as a gargoyle on a red barn. If there were some way to loose them both the country would be fortunate indeed.

As long as the great transcontinental railroads have money enough to prevent the construction of an isthmian canal we suppose the project will remain in the public eye. It is doubtful if any man who lives today will see the beginning of construction.

## NOW LET US HAVE THE RAILROAD

We congratulate everybody and everything having to do with the Raleigh & Pamlico railroad election. It was the greatest step Eastern Carolina has taken in many years, and the good to result has not been half told. With few exceptions every city and township gave the proposition to subscribe bonds a good majority, and we awake to the pleasing reflection that the people of the East knew what they wanted and "arrived" with both feet.

Discussing the prospects of the road the Morning Post says:

"Just think of it! A train to leave the Sound terminal early in the morning, pass through such thriving communities as Belhaven and Washington and Snow Hill and Greenville and Wilson, reaching Raleigh on a five-hour schedule; spend several hours in the city, and return the same day, reaching tide water at supper time, and connect with the steamer from New Bern to Norfolk. And when the inland canal is completed, what an advantage it will be to shipping. And every square acre of land from the depot in Raleigh to the depot on the banks of the old Pamlico a veritable garden spot, capable of the profitable cultivation of a great variety of the necessities of good living and sources of agricultural profit. It is an inviting field, indeed, inviting from a money-making point of view specially the energies and capital of the people."

### Cotton Ginned Up To Last of August.

Washington, Sept. 22.—A census report on the quantity of cotton ginned in the United States from the growth of 1903 up to and including August 31 gives the following figures:

Total commercial bales, 17,58 including 16,991 square bales, 570 round bales of upland crop and 26 bales of sea island crop. The total gins in operation numbered 2,176.

These statistics were collected through a canvass of the 32,625 gineries of the cotton states by 631 local special agents. Only 2,176 gineries had begun operations up to September 1 and these had ginned but 17,587 commercial bales or bales as pressed at the gineries, equivalent to 17,302 bales, counting round bales as half bales. This report will be followed by four others for this season showing the quantity ginned respectively to October 18, November 18, December 13, and a final report which will give the quantity ginned from the growth of 1903.

### Table Glass.

Those who have inherited the old heavy cut glass from colonial grandmothers are fortunate indeed, but for those who have not a very desirable imitation of it is procurable at many of the best glass and china shops. Then there is the "feather" glass, one of the most beautiful of the uncolored glass. The shapes are blown with thoughtful carelessness, so that there is a slight and delightful irregularity in form and edge which, combined with the suggested "feather" in the body of the glass, gives a most artistic result.—New York Tribune.

### Cleaning Hardwood Floors.

A housekeeper who has experienced considerable difficulty in keeping a hardwood floor in good condition believes that she has solved the problem by a method which is claimed to be much superior to that of rubbing with oil, as it leaves no disagreeable sticky feeling. The floor is first swept with a soft brush, then carefully wiped with a slightly damp cloth. Afterward the entire surface is gone over with a mixture consisting of half a cup of the best furniture polish dissolved in a quart of moderately hot water. When dry the boards are said to acquire a fine polish as the result of this process.

### Silver and Copper Combined.
