LOST LANGUAGE FOR 70 YEARS.

Strange Story of Woman Who Forgot Her Native Tongue.

In England last year a case occurred in which a delirious woman recovered her mastery of a language which she had been unable to speak for seventy years. She had been born in India and the first form of speech taught her was the native Hindostani of her nurses. At the age of three she had been removed to Europe, living in turn in France and Germany before going to England to complete her education. After she had retained her proficiency in French and German, but all but a few words of Hindostani had passed from her memory. In her delirium she talked fluently in Hindostani and friends about her who knew the language were able to follow her sayings to her nurses as she recalled her conversations in India of seventy years earlier. Then the talk changed. She passed into French and from that to German, while when she was nearing recovery her utterances changed to English.

She had had in her deririum revived the scenes of her childhood and there was recognizable throughout a sequence in which appeared the scenes and friends she had known in the order in which they had come into her life. When she recovered all recollection of Hindostani had again left her.

In Wales there is a legend of Irish smugglers who arrived at Llandona many years ago in a boat without rudder or oars. They were looked upon, according to the Irish custom of sending malefactors to a sea doom in this plight as outlaws. However, they had been allowed to land, and a spring of water, bursting forth in the sand at the place, was taken as a sign of their right to a refuge. But they ill repaid the Welsh. The men lived by smuggling and the women by witchcraft. It was not possible to overcome the smugglers in a fray, for each carried about with him a black fly tied in a knot of his kerchief, and the moment the knot was undone the fly flew at the eyes of the opponents and blinded them. If the Llandona witches attended a market and bid for anything not one ventured to bid against them.

Sautelle's Show Claims to Have the Only Animal That Can Throw the Long Harpoon into the Lion.

It is stated by the press agent in advance that the only lion-slayer in captivity is now in the \$100,000 menagerie of Sig Sautelle's new big twelve combined shows, which will give two performances at Greenville Thursday, October 8. The animal is a representative of the ape family and is covered with a long growth of soft hair, grayish blue in color and greatly resembling a cap and cape of the thick, long and straight fur. The hair on the lower half of the body is extremely short and stiff. When aroused to anger, the lion-slayer emits loud, unearthly sounds from its throat which would do full credit to a large sized elephant. Fearing neither elephant or rhinoceros, it is claimed that the lion will turn and flee at the first sign of this specie of ape. Although several times larger and stronger than its most feared enemy, the king of beasts is said to be no match for this enemy, which is ever ready to do battle when the two meet. This is but one of the rare and costly animals in the Sautelle menagerie. This aggregation of wild animals is one of the most complete in existence.

NATHAN SESSOMS MURDER TRIAL.

The evidence in the case against Nathan Sessoms, on the charge of murder, was completed Wednesday afternoon in time for part of the argument to be made to the jury before court adjourned. The argument for the state was opened by Mr. F. M. Wooten and he was followed by Mr. Roy C. Flanagan for the defense. This was Mr. Flanagan's maiden speech before a jury and he acquitted himself most creditably. This morning Solicitor Moore completed the argument for the state and Mr. H. W. Whedbee closed for the defense. Judge Moore then delivered his charge and the case was given to the jury just before noon.

The jury were out on the case about an hour when they returned a verdict of guilty of manslaughter and recommend that he be given the lightest punishment permissible.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY FAILED

Currents Crossed Each Other in the Air.

Wireless telegraphy has done some wonderful things, but it has not yet been perfected, or prepared the world to dispense with wires. The wireless systems attempted to report the yacht race on Tuesday, and they seem to have interfered disastrously with each other. The Marconi station at Jamaica wired to New York: "Opposition keys continuously depressed." THE KING OF YAP ADVENTURER WAS VERY FOND OF WIVES.

William C. Hartridge, who went to Caroline Islands last May in the interest of Mrs. Catharine O'Keefe, widow of David O'Keefe, has arrived at San Francisco on the steamer Doric. O'Keefe was known as the king of Yap. He left his wife and daughter in Savannah, Ga., in the early seventies and was wrecked on this island. It is expected that the Savannah widow will claim about 50 per cent. of the estate.

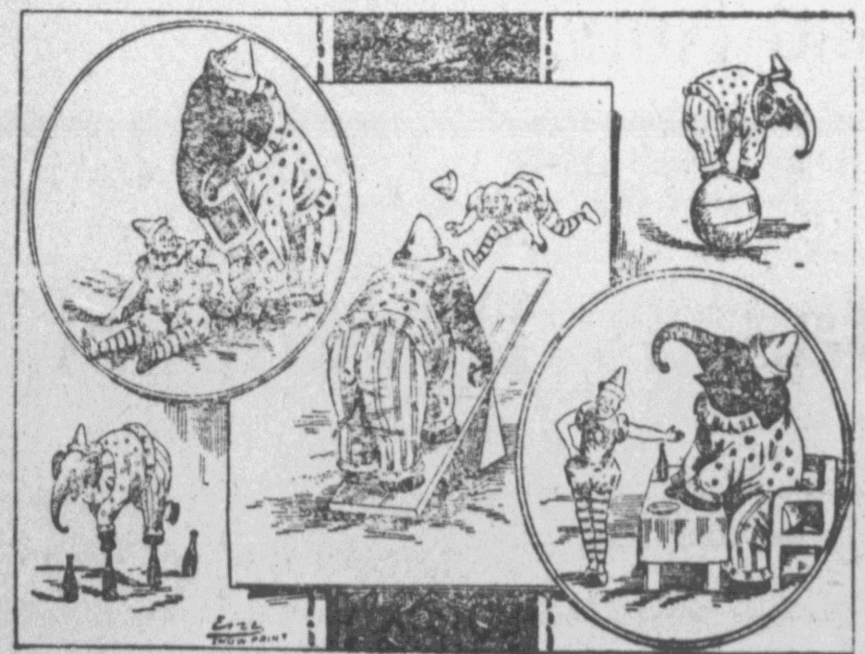

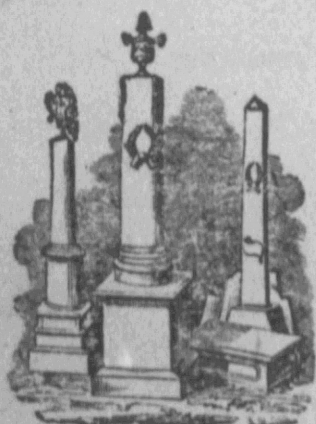
