GREENVILLE GRADED SCHOOL.

More Than Two Hundred Pupils Enrolled First Day.

The Greenville graded school for the white race met this morning at the court house. The exact enrollment could not be had at the opening but there were more than 200 children present. These were temporarily assigned to grades for examination, and it will probably take all the week to get them properly classified.

Any children holding back from school the first week thinking to escape examination will find upon entering later that the examination is necessary and will be harder than if as the beginning.

- 8th and 9th Grades—Miss Iola Exum.

Until the school building is ready for occupancy the first and second grades will be taught in the public school house and the other grades in the court house.

Sunday's News and Observer says:

"If the Greenville REFLECTOR doubts the genuineness of the Dewey letter, its editor can see it in the original in this office. This paper neither publishes fakes nor allows itself to be imposed upon."

THE REFLECTOR distinctly disavowed any doubt of the News and Observer's good faith in the matter. As it came to our contemporary the Dewey letter was a perfectly legitimate piece of news, which any editor would have felt justified in placing before his readers, declining, as the News and Observer tacitly did, to assume any responsibility for its genuineness or sincerity. The smartest newspaper men in the business have been imposed upon by the unscrupulous, and no blame could possibly attach to the News and Observer should the letter prove a fraud of the first water.

The Durham Herald says:

"Of course we believe the south would support General Miles if he should receive the nomination, but it will kick like thunder to keep him from getting it."

We are emphatically of the opinion that this thing has gone far enough. The South would not support General Miles were he to receive all the nominations between this date and the final cataclysm. 

Death on Wings of the Wind.

WINONA, MINN., Oct. 3.—At least seven persons were killed and probably fifty others were injured by a terrific storm which swept across several counties in Southern Minnesota this afternoon. The greatest destruction was wrought at St. Charles, a town of 1500 people, about 25 miles west of Winona. Here seven persons were killed and thirty others were injured. Nearly every business block in Main street was demolished and two score residences were destroyed. The property loss is variously estimated at between one and two hundred thousand dollars.

A special train with provisions and nurses was sent from Winona. The storm was a straight blow, and it is estimated that the wind attained a velocity of one hundred miles an hour. Reports from Chesterfield, Spring Valley and other points tell of considerable damage in country districts, and it is feared that fatalities have occurred in remote places.

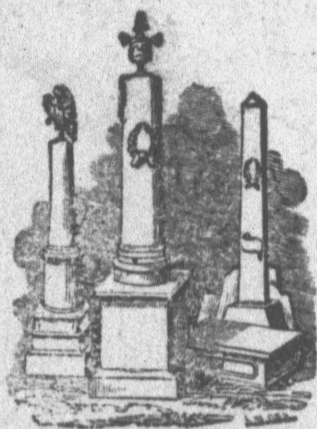
