**Jury Has Tillman Case.**  
Lexington, S. C. Oct. 14.—At 1:40 this afternoon acting Judge Gary concluded his charge to the jury in the Tillman case. At 8 o'clock tonight the jury remains locked up. Many rumors are afloat, most of them from the side of the defense and to the effect that the jury stands 10 or 11 in favor of acquittal. If the jury fails to agree it is likely that it will be discharged after about 36 or 48 hours, and a new trial ordered. In view of the methods employed by the defense giving political color to the trial, a mistrial will be regarded as a distinct victory for the prosecution. The practically unanimous opinion is that the defense will have to face a harder proposition at another term of court than this, because it is believed that with their case disclosed and additional time given to the state for investigating the record of their chief witnesses, most of which have already been sadly damaged, they would be unable even to make the showing again that they have made.

No Connection at Selma.

The Southern has changed its schedule between Goldsboro and Greensboro so that the train which formerly connected at Selma with the southbound Atlantic Coast Line train, in the afternoon, passes a half hour before the A. C. L. train arrives.

This change went into effect yesterday and much complaint will be made by the people of Wilson, Weldon, Tarboro and all other points in East Carolina. Heretofore the people along the main line of A. C. L. in that section of the state have always made connection with the Southern at Selma for Raleigh. Now passengers from the A. C. L. are obliged to wait at Selma from 3:40 p. m. until midnight on account of missing the Southern train by half an hour. The same train on the Southern gets into Greensboro the same time as formerly. Travel over the Coast Line for Raleigh connecting at Selma, is always heavy. The change will work a great hardship on the traveling public. Just why the change was made we have not heard, but it looks like a case for the corporation commission. It will at least bear investigation by that body.—Wilmington Dispatch.

He says that while the storm was very severe there no lives were lost and no boats were wrecked, but many of the inhabitants lost heavily by their nets and other fishing paraphernalia being destroyed or carried away. The island was so inundated that people could not reach the church Sunday, and no services were held.

Nothing has been heard of him since that time, nor has any boat arrived in this city from Ocracoke since the storm. The gas boat Kirk is about the size of the Nydia, belonging to the Black Star Line, but has a very low free board. **Paper From Alaska.**  
Col. I. A. Sugg has received some papers published at Rampart, Alaska, and presented us with a copy. The papers were some over a month getting here after being mailed. The copy we have is the Alaska Forum, a little four page sheet of three columns to the page. While it is published only weekly, the subscription price is \$10 a year, \$1 a month or 25 cents a copy. A few advertisements are in it, principally of saloons. In a laundry price list the charge for laundering a shirt is 30 cents, a collar 10 cents and cuffs 20 cents a pair. The principal news feature of this copy of the paper was court proceedings. One case reported was over a dog team taken from the owner. The verdict of the jury was for the plaintiff, giving him the team, \$266.25 for the retention of the dogs, \$100 damages and the costs. Dogs must be worth something in that region.

WHOSE TURN NEXT?

A jury has declared Ernest Haywood not guilty of the murder of Ludlow Skinner, but the people of the state will believe he is a murderer to the last day of his life. The trial was a farce and the verdict just what was expected, considering Haywood's wealth and professional position.

The time has come when there has got to be a change made in our jury system. At present the defense in a capital case has every opportunity to pack a jury box with its partisans, and we believe this very thing has been done time and again in this state. The defense may challenge and reject twenty-three of the jurors offered by the prosecution, while the prosecution is allowed only four challenges. This very thing has made a mockery of justice in our courts, and the next legislature should change it or confess to cowardice. That is plain language, and we mean it so. We railroad a poor ignorant negro to the gallows and turn white murderers loose, all under the wing of the law. Justice? It's a farce, a screaming burlesque, and a shame and disgrace upon the state.

The people are losing respect for our courts, and it is coming to pass that if a man has wealth and professional influence he may murder his fellowman without fear of legal retribution. Is it any wonder that lynch law and violence are taking the place of legal procedure? We think not. The wonder would be, if no condition of anarchy arose from the weakness and cowardice of courts.

This thing of shooting a man down without giving him a chance for his life is horrible—worse than some of the darkest crimes of the feudal age. It causes thoughtful men to wonder if their time will come next. This makes every man afraid of his brother, for none know the hour of assassination. The thing must end or we are all headed toward the hell of anarchy.
