TILLMAN GOES SCOT FREE

SLAYER OF GONZALES GETS OUT OF COURT HERE ON EARTH

BUT IT MAY NOT BE SO EASY When He Goes to the Court that Tries Men's Souls and Consciences.

Lexington, S. C., Oct. 15.—James H. Tillman is a free man. After being out nearly 21 hours the jury announced an agreement at 10:30 this morning. There were few persons in the court house when the prisoner was brought in from jail, and some of these cheered when the verdict was announced. Tillman's friends crowded around to shake his hand, at which he seemed pleased. He shook hands also with the judge and jury. When asked about his future movements Tillman said he would go to his home in Edgefield. He was accompanied by several people as he walked back to the jail where he is to remain no more. His two pistols were offered him but he declined to take them, leaving them in the hands of the court officials. He walked across the street to the jail with his arm around the old negro, George Johnston, who was a family servant and who had been a close attendant upon the trial.

The fool we have always with us. We can bear with him until he begins to think himself a jester. Then he loses the harmlessness which arouses in us the impulse to protect him. Struck with the idea that he is a wit, the fool becomes dangerous. He points and pulls the triggers of unloaded guns, he rocks boats filled with people; he drags skeletons from closets and sets their bones to rattling gruesomely to the jarring music of his iron jowl; he puts bent pins on chairs, he drapes himself in sheets and scares the timorous into hysterics; he cuts the rope and lets the circus tent down. He is everywhere.

No dog fight, conflagration or mass meeting is complete without him. But of all events, weddings appear to have the strongest attraction for the fool. (We are not making any cynical reflections anent matrimony.) Weddings appear to wake the dormant folly in many a man of whom the world might otherwise have said, "A dull man this, but kindly and harmless." The bride and groom are the natural prey of the wedding fool, of course. It appears to be impossible to suppress. He esteems himself a jester.

Verily, there is nothing so sad, so dear, so melancholy, so pathetic as a jest in hands that know not how to use it.—Atlanta Journal.

The editor of The News, as he reads the state exchanges would like to share with his readers in Charlotte the shame that he feels when such paragraphs appear:

About a year ago there was started in Charlotte a movement to establish a home for fallen women. The project was one of the most noble and worthy that ever sprang from a human heart, yet the home has not been established. Why? Because in the rich, cultured, Christian city of Charlotte there can be found no spot upon which the home may be erected, because the people living in the neighborhood object to having a shelter for sinners among them. Probably the same spirit of opposition would be encountered in any city in the state, but, good Lord, what an example of Christian charity! Christ came to the world and ate and drank with sinners, healed the sick, and cleansed the sin-streken, yet we have people here today who are so much better than Christ that they can't bear to have a home for repentant and repenting sinners among them. Call this Christianity? Call it loving one another? Never. Christ never said do such things in His name. He said, "Let him that is without sin among you cast the first stone."—Greenville REFLECTOR.

She wanted to leave her life of sin. That is evident by the fact that she did leave life altogether. 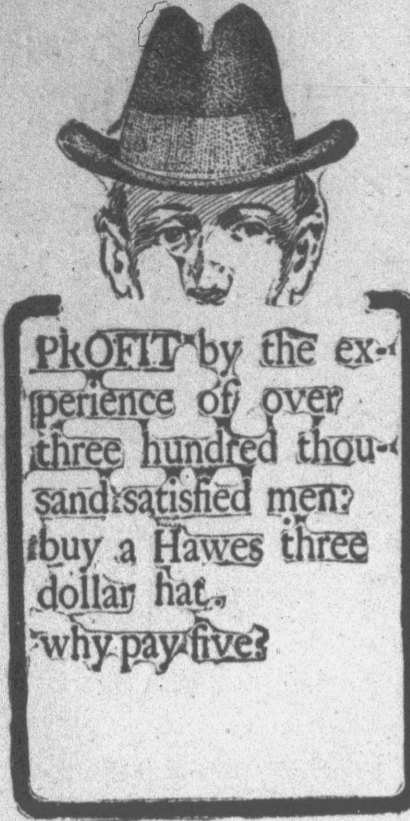
