CONVENTION ADJOURNS.

THURSDAY—AFTERNOON.

The afternoon session began with devotional exercises by Rev. Merritt Owen.

Rev. D. H. Petree, chairman, made report for the committee on publications and literature. This report endorsed the work of the Watch Tower and recommended its support.

L. T. Rightsell, corresponding secretary, submitted his report. This showed total collections for the year amounting to \$1,057.95, and also showed what weak mission points in the state had been helped during the year.

H. E. Moseley, treasurer, made his report showing the total receipts for the year to be \$1,431.23 and disbursements \$1,032.01.

S. B. Taylor for auditing committee reported that they had examined accounts of all officers and found them to be correct.

The following were elected trustees of A. C. College: J. J. Harper, W. W. Farmer, J. B. Dean, J. B. Jones, George Hackey.

The following resolution was offered by Rev. M. S. Spear and adopted:

Whereas, we have been favored by Providence with exceptionally fine weather during the sessions of this convention, and whereas we have been generously, bountifully and pleasantly entertained in the homes of the people of Greenville, therefore,

Resolved, that we express our gratitude to our Father in Heaven for his Providence and loving care; and that we express to the people of Greenville our most sincere thanks for their hospitality which we have so much enjoyed, and wish for them the continued favor of God.

Resolved further, that we express our thanks to the newspapers for their kindness in so fully reporting the proceedings of our convention.

Rev. P. B. Hall addressed the convention on the "Pastorate," in which he pointed out the duties of a pastor.

W. J. Crumpler, chairman of the evangelizing committee, made report showing that the churches represented had pledged \$494 for state missions. The report recommended helping the following churches in the sums named: Spray \$100, Belhaven \$100, Grimesland \$15, Dover \$100, Plymouth \$100, Darden \$25. It was also recommended that all the churches be written to and asked to make pledges to carry on the work.

Dr. Coggins, president of A. C. College, made report showing the number of pupils to be males 20, females 71, total 91. He also made some explanation of the work of the school.

The nominating committee recommended the following officers for the next year, who were elected:

President—E. A. Moye, Greenville.
 Vice President—J. S. Basnight, James City.
 Recording Secretary—S. H. Bright, Kinston.
 Corresponding Secretary—L. T. Rightsell, LaGrange.

Treasurer—H. E. Moseley, Kinston.
 Washington was chosen as next place of meeting.

After making some amendments to the constitution of A. C. College

the convention adjourned.

NIGHT SESSION.

At a brief session held at night the report of the committee on temperance was received and the secretary was ordered to have printed and distributed among the churches 2500 copies of the proceedings of the convention.

Dr. J. C. Coggins, president of A. C. College, then preached an able and eloquent sermon on the Transfiguration. Beginning with the birth and infancy of Jesus, he in beautiful language followed the scene of His life to the transfiguration on the mount where He met with Moses and Elias and talked of His death. The speaker drew many practical lessons as he went along, the closing one being that we may all be with Christ on the mount of transfiguration and witness His glory even in this world if we do His will, and then it will be our privilege to meet with the great convention of the redeemed in Heaven. His word picture of the resurrection morn and Heaven was sublime.

Dr. Coggins' sermon was a splendid climax to the great convention then closing. He is an able man and an honor to both his church and the institution of which he is the head.

At the conclusion of the sermon Miss Nancye Coward sang "Visions Celestial," a song most appropriate to the occasion.

President Moye then as a parting word happily expressed the pleasure all had derived from the convention meeting in Greenville, and wishing every one a safe journey home and that God's richest blessings might rest upon them, he then declared the 59th annual session of the North Carolina Christian Missionary Convention closed. The congregation joined heartily in singing that sweet hymn "God be with you till we meet again," and the benediction was pronounced by Rev. J. L. Burns.

Fruit and Truck Growers Combine.

Norfolk, Va., Oct. 28.—A special to the Virginia-Pilot from Laurel, Del., says: A million dollar combination was formed here today after a two weeks' session of the leading fruit and truck carriers of the United States. All the parties involved claim they have combined simply to effect a saving in securing raw material and in distributing their products. They claim they will thus save the farmers thousands of dollars annually. Railways will be built and a line of steamers, tugs and barges will be run through North Carolina, Virginia, Maryland and Delaware.

Dynamite Found.

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 28.—Twelve sticks of dynamite, done up in two packages, with fuses attached, all ready to light, were found concealed in the lavatory of the Interurban depot in this city this afternoon. There was enough of the explosive to have blown up all the buildings within a radius of two blocks, and to damage property for a distance of ten blocks from the depot.

The discovery was made by a laborer named Wilson, who saw the package behind the wash stand, pulled it out and found it was dynamite. It is believed the dynamite was placed in the room today.

Acting Secretary of the Navy Darling has sent orders to the Norfolk navy yard for the cruiser Baltimore to proceed forthwith to Puerto Plata, San Domingo, to look after American interests at that blockaded port.

The yellow fever apparently has run its course at San Antonio, Tex., and all excitement has died out. People who fled are returning. No new cases were reported yesterday.

A Florida Mob.

Jacksonville, Fla., Oct. 28.—While attempting to secure her husband, who lived near Jennings, Florida, a mob of men shot to death Jennie McCall, a negro woman, last night.

The mob surrounded McCall's house and thinking he was inside fired a volley into the house, instantly killing the woman. A posse is reported to be in pursuit of the assailants.

Four Men Killed.

Charlotte, N. C., Oct. 28.—By an accident resulting in the derailment of a double-header freight train near Bessemer City on the Southern Railway, today, four lives were lost. The killed are Thomas J. Pettus, engineer; J. R. Higgins and John Thompson, firemen; a white tramp, named McCombs, of Gastonia. The injured are: C. E. Tate, engineer; P. S. Plaff, brakeman.

The train, which was a double-header, with two engines, manned by Engineers C. J. Pettus and J. E. Tate, and under the control of Conductor Patterson, was running at a fair rate of speed when it was derailed at the switch, near Bessemer City station. The track at that point was being repaired by a force of section men, and it is understood that the section foreman contends that the danger signals he had caused to be displayed were not heeded. It is also said that the negro flagman sent back to warn the train failed to signal it to stop.

Three car loads of cattle were placed under quarantine at the Southern's feeding barns at Spencer yesterday. Dr. J. M. Turner, the United States Veterinarian Inspector, who is stationed at this place, discovered that the cattle were infected with ticks and at once placed the whole shipment under quarantine. The cattle were being shipped from East Tennessee to Baltimore. It is learned that the shippers will lose about \$500 on account of quarantine regulations being enforced.

This is the season when the young sport bloweth his hard-earned dough on the girl who will gently hand him the marble heart next spring. He will take her to the theatre and buy all the candy she and her relatives can eat. For two or three short, blissful months he will be "a dear," and "just the nicest young gentleman in town." Then, when he calls around one evening she will have a frown and her little brother with her. Next day he receives about 50 cents worth of trash which he had bestowed upon her, and 718 letters. Then his young life is ruined; he goes down to the river bank and—comes back. Don't speak of violets, candy, theatre tickets or oyster suppers to him. He has troubles of his own.

Nearly all of the best papers in the state are advocating the amendment of the state's criminal laws along the line THE REFLECTOR has presented and favored for several years. The state should have the right of appeal, and should be placed upon an equal footing with the accused in the matter and manner of selecting juries. Until this is done there will be frequent miscarriages of justice. The code commission should look into this matter and present a report upon it to the next legislature.

The North Carolina Christian Missionary Convention has closed. THE REFLECTOR wants to say that Greenville is glad that it met here. Our people enjoyed having the delegates and visitors in their homes and enjoyed the sessions of the convention. The convention is an intelligent body and its deliberations were of a high order. It has cause to be proud of its rapid growth and development and the progress made in Christian work.

The News and Observer says: "The village of Old Sparta witnessed a murder yesterday in a saloon. If the London bill had passed, no whiskey could have been sold at Old Sparta. It was incorporated by the last Legislature in order to let saloons operate. This murder is the first fruit of the incorporation of country places."

And yet the man who fiercely and bitterly opposed the London bill is to run for lieutenant governor of North Carolina. The first letter of his name is George L. Morton.

Judge Brown did the sensible thing in refusing to grant a change of venue to that Wilmington manslaughter. The lawyers, judges and prisoners in such cases know very well that when a change of venue is asked it is because the defendant and his friends fear that they will get justice at home, which is not what they want.

An Indian territory bad man has married an Indian woman and says he will reform and settle down. We don't know about the reform end of it, but if that squaw ever takes it into her head to go for his scalp, he will settle down—yes, without a doubt.

William J. Bryan's present troubles forcefully illustrate the fact that none are too great to get it in the neck.

A Western editor-diplomat, upon launching his craft on the journalistic creek, remarks:

"Now as to the kind of newspaper we will run, our first aim and always will be to print the news, and in doing so we shall aim to tell the truth, as near as is consistent with good health except in wedding and funeral notices—when a couple get married, no matter how frowsy the bride may be, she will appear in these columns as a model of beauty, style and female loveliness, and a general social favorite; and the groom, who really cuts mighty little figure at a wedding, anyway, will be mentioned as a capable and promising young man, etc., although he may not have money or credit enough to buy the necessary flannels for the first baby. When a man dies, he will have always been a good father and kind husband—unless he happens to have been a bachelor—a pillar of the community, and one whose loss will be irreparable."

FLEISHMAN AND BRO.

It may be a surprise to the unlightened to learn that probably no explorer, in forcing his passage through Africa, has ever for more than a few days at a time been off some beaten track. Every village is connected with some other village, every tribe with the next tribe, every state with its neighbor and therefore with all the rest. The explorer's business is simply to select from this network of tracks, keep a general direction and hold on his way. They are veritable footpaths, never over a foot in breadth, beaten hard and netted beneath the level of the forest bed of centuries of native traffic.

Like the roads of the old Romans, these footpaths run straight on through everything, ridge and mountain and valley, never shying at obstacles, nor anywhere turning aside to breathe. Yet within this general straightforwardness are a singular eccentricity and an indirectness of detail. And the reason is not far to seek. If a stone is encountered, no native will ever think of removing it; he simply walks around it. It would never occur to him that that stone was a displaceable object and that for the general weal he might displace it.

The Whale's Appetite.

A whale's appetite is phenomenal. His chief diet consists of jellyfish. He has simply to open his mouth and paddle along leisurely in order to take in jellyfish by the wagon load. Such is the method adopted by the whalebone whale. The sperm whale, on the contrary, captures huge squids weighing often several tons. Like his brother the whalebone whale, he must be constantly on the lookout for food; otherwise he would starve. As many as fourteen seals have been taken from a thirty foot "killer." Other fishes of enormous appetites are not uncommon. The bluefish, for example, thrives on sardines and other small fish. Assuming that one bluefish eats ten small fish a day, it has been figured that it requires 10,000,000,000 sardines to feed the 1,000,000,000 bluefish on our coasts every summer. Most curious of all eaters is the hydra—a strange creature that can be turned inside out without impairing its appetite or its power to eat.—Scientific American.

Slaughter House Byproducts.

Some of the uses of byproducts of slaughtered animals: The blood is used for the production of albumen, the bones for knife handles, toothbrush handles, chessmen, etc.; the horns for combs, backs of brushes, large buttons, etc.; the hoofs for buttons, ornaments and fertilizers. Neat's foot oil, extracted from the feet, has a high commercial value. The fat is used for glycerin and butterin. Gelatin, glue, pepsin and other articles are obtained from slaughtered cattle and sheep. The value of such articles made every year represents many millions of dollars.
