### Long Buried Words of Christ Found.

London, Nov. 14.—Many hitherto unknown sayings of Jesus Christ have been discovered in Egypt by archaeologists who have dug up papyri, buried, since the second century, 100 miles south of Cairo. Dr. Bernard P. Grenfell, who has been engaged in Egyptian excavations since 1894, at the general meeting of the Egypt Exploration Fund here, yesterday gave the following details.

Accompanied by Dr. Hunt, Dr. Grenfell found a rich plotomatic necropolis at El Hibes. The bulk of the documents from one mound consisted of a collection of sayings of Jesus. They are all introduced with the words "Jesus saith," and for the most part are new. The ends of the lines, unfortunately, are often obliterated. Apparently all the sayings were addressed to St. Thomas. One of the most remarkable is:

"Let not him that seeketh cease from his search until he find, and when he finds he shall wonder; wondering he shall reach the Kingdom, and when he reaches the Kingdom he shall have rest."

Dr. Grenfell remarked that enormous interest would be aroused by the discoveries, on account of the variations they disclosed from accepted texts. One variant of the mystical saying, recorded in St. Luke. "The Kingdom of God is within you," was of great value as the saying in the papyrus appeared in quite different surroundings from those attributed to it by the evangelist and extended far into another region.

According to Dr. Grenfell, these sayings form the new gospel which is traditionally associated with St. Thomas.

An interesting variation of the gospel according to St. Luke, eleventh chapter and fifty-second verse, reads in the papyrus:

"Ye have hidden the key of knowledge, ye entered not yourselves and to them that were entering in ye did not open."

Another fragment contained a discourse of Christ, closely related to passages of the sermon on the Mount, and a conversation between Christ and his disciples, in which Christ answers a question as to when his Kingdom would be realized, saying:

"When ye return to the state of innocence which existed before the fall."

A valuable find was made in papyrus, written in Latin, giving the text of the epistle to the Hebrews, and an epitome of Livy's six lost books. This, with other papyri covering the period 150-137 B. C. threw much new and valuable information on the history of the world and marked the recovery of hitherto lost classical literature of Egypt.

### The Germ of Bad Manners.

"Independence is a trait I like in Americans," said a girl near me the other day. "To think that I am as good as every one else puts a strain of confidence in me."

"That same reflection, 'I am at good as every one else,' is at the bottom of a great deal of our proverbial bad manners," was the reply. ### NO HOPE FOR GOLDBRICK GANG United States Supreme Court Decides Against Them.

Washington, D. C. Nov. 16.—"If the effect of this sentence is to induce like criminals to avoid her territory, North Carolina is to be congratulated, not condemned." This was the declaration of the Supreme court of the United States today in passing upon the case of the gold brick combination that attempted to defraud Paul Garrett, of Weldon, N. C., two of whom are now serving ten year terms in the state prison. The court held that no federal question was involved and announced that the decision of the North Carolina Supreme court was conclusive upon this court. Consequently the case on writ of error from the state court was dismissed for want of jurisdiction, while the judgment in the habeas corpus case from Judge Purnell's court was affirmed. As to the motion of the Chicago attorney appearing for the prisoners, who prayed that the custody of their clients be given to the marshal of the United States court because of the fear of injury to them by a North Carolina mob, the court simply passed it by with a denial of request. This brings to an end the strenuous fight for freedom of the gold brick crowd.

### South Carolina Town Upset.

Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 17.—It was learned here late last night over the S. A. L. train dispatchers' wire, that Camden, S. C., is in a great ferment over the suicide of the president and the cashier of the Farmers' National Bank. No details could be ascertained further than that the bodies of the two men were found in a corn field, the president being shot through the heart with a shot gun. Financial troubles are believed to be the cause of the suicide and there is considerable uneasiness pending the investigation of the condition of the bank.

### Portsmouth Cashier Missing.

Portsmouth, Va. Nov. 16.—John H. Downing, cashier of the Portsmouth Dime Savings Bank, is missing and the board of directors of the institution are in possession of his confession to defalcation extending over a comparatively recent period. Some of the depositors, when they heard the news of Downing's disappearance this morning, appeared at the bank and were promptly paid. Many of the largest depositors, however, made a special point of being there at the opening with heavy deposits and this restored the confidence of the public to a large extent. Downing was bonded for \$15,000; the shortage is said to be \$12,000.

### Sheriff Didn't Have the Keys.

Durham, N. C., Nov. 16.—An attempt was made to lynch Adam Hunt, the negro who killed the young man Wilkins a few days ago, at Roxboro last evening. Soon after midnight a party of 50 men went to the sheriff's home and demanded the jail keys. The sheriff had previously let one of his deputies have the keys and was finally able to convince the crowd that he had no access to the jail.

### The French Recognize Panama.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 16.—Mr. Varilla, the minister of Panama, received a note tonight from the French ambassador, informing him that the government of France had recognized the government of the republic of Panama as an independent sovereign. This is a full recognition similar to that given by the United States when President Roosevelt received Mr. Varilla last Friday. Mr. Varilla will be formally received by the French ambassador tomorrow.

There has been a lively debate in the senate on the numerous petitions from all over the country sent to that body, protesting against the seating of Reed Smoot, the Mormon senator from Utah. Senator Hoar claimed that the petitions were out of order as the question was a judicial one for the committee on privileges and elections, and it was as wrong to petition that committee as it was to petition the Supreme court of the United States. Senator Dubois, of Idaho, took issue with this statement and declared that the petitions were entitled to the serious consideration of the senate, as they represented the moral thought of the country.

### A Fine Farm.

Travelers on the railroads say that the farm of N. B. Dawson, at Conetoe, is the most attractive they see in this section of the state. Recently a drummer was so taken with it that he announced his intention to quit the road and buy him a farm.

Persons who ride along the country roads say the same about this farm, and so do those who have been over it. It is in a high state of fertility and is cultivated much like a garden.—Tarboro Southerner.

Are we about to enter an era of unparalleled prosperity? An amateur scientist in Indiana announces that he has discovered bands of glittering gems across the sun's disc, which he takes to mean seven years of plenty, followed by seven years of famine. We are ready for the plentiful years to set in.

Colombia wants to fight and says it will exhaust the last drop of blood and spend its last cent in putting down the rebellion. And Uncle Sam says if Colombia tries to land any troops at Panama he will take a hand in it. So there you are. Colombia will likely stay home and let Panama do the same thing.

George W. Beavers, who is under indictment for connection with frauds in the postoffice department, is reported to have transferred his property to his wife. Not the first instance of the kind on record by many.

And now comes an Atlanta preacher who is trying to tell who was the wife of Cain. He could hardly rake out an older subject or one in which the people today have less interest.

Chicago seems to be a good stepping-off place, a suicide craze having struck the city. Fifty five persons adopted that means of quitting the city within a month.

A New Jersey woman has had her husband indicted for abandonment 32 years ago. It takes a long while to get even, but the opportunity comes sometime.

In Everything, a clever semi-monthly journal printed at Greensboro, Col. Al. Fairbrother is devoting a great deal of space to discussing women. In the last issue of his paper he prints a letter from a Charlotte woman, who says "Is it not a dangerous doctrine to teach that a girl can sin, graduate from a Crittenton Home, and then knock at society's door and be welcomed?" And the colonel replies by saying, among other things, that he belongs to the school that believes that a man who sins is as bad as a woman who sins; and that he contends that a woman who has done wrong may "yet live a pure life and is physically and morally capable of adorning a home." The versatile editor speaks very eloquently in defense of the most wretched class in the world; declaring that there is hope and salvation for them in the Crittenton Home when the world seems dark and drear. He protests—he so often protests—against man's brutality in shoving a woman back against a wall and then forcing her to perish. The publication was apropos of the effort to establish a Crittenton Home in this city. Papers all over the country have discussed the matter and thousands of individuals have showed concern, but the mission is not builded. Even the site of the home is not fixed. In this large and God-fearing community there can be found no man who is willing for it to be located on his property, or close to his home. You see the commentary. The home is not builded and they turn away as if from leprous touch. At the last ditch the home fights, and must struggle to be allowed to fight there. Sav more wards, Col. Fairbrother, and may you be blessed in your warfare for the right, though you must

know that you are seeking to change a sentiment that has been fixed ever since the first man was unkind to the first woman.—Idle Comment in Charlotte Observer.

Dr. Howerton on The Negro.

The Wilmington Messenger gave last week the following notes of an address delivered by Rev. J. R. Howerton, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, of Charlotte, at the Presbyterian Synod, at Wilmington, on "Colored Evangelization."

"It was one of the most lucid and forceful presentations of any subject yet given before the Synod. Dr. Howerton went right down into the race question as it is in the South now. The extracts below give in no way an idea of the value of the paper:

"The work of evangelization of the negro is for us to do. The negro is our neighbor, and we should love our neighbors as ourselves.

"There are now tremendous difficulties besetting us. Hopelessness comes from talking hopelessly. There is no reason for pessimism. Think of all the causes that exist for enmity between the whites and blacks, all of the race antagonism and prejudice. Through all the years political and social antagonism has been stirred up. It's a wonder that right now there is not war. How does it occur that the conditions between the races are as good as they are? The first condition of solution is to preserve or build up or restore good feeling.

"The talk of wholesale deportation or colonization is absurd. The great body of the negroes will remain in the South, in the relation of employee to employer. The interference with the problem has made it very difficult. That interference has been ignorant and blind and obstinate and oftentimes criminal. If other sections had left us alone, by the end of the nineteenth century the rising tide of civilization would have stamped out slavery without the loss of a drop of blood. We are now being bothered with the interference of the social problem.

"I don't care about your equality," said the speaker, "what I care about is social mixture or intermingling." There can never be intermingling on a social scale of the two races, and any attempt to force such a thing would provoke revolution.

"Let a negro man live in a palace, build the foundation of a many million-dollar fortune, educate his son at the greatest institution in the world, that's all right—but never let that boy try to enter the hut of a white man and court that man's daughter.

"We will take care of the negro. We will give him justice. The way to draw a line between the races is for there to be no mixture of a white man with any man with even one drop of negro blood in his veins. We cannot afford to have a yielding in any degree. The separation of the races must always continue.

"Just when the North is becoming sane in its treatment of the problem and a juster view taken of the matter, a Southern man crops out in The South Atlantic Quarterly with an article that should not have been written. A wave of common sense is sweeping over the country. The North is letting us alone. They are beginning to realize that the South can handle the negro.

"The only reason there has been no conflict between the races is the Christian religion, the gospel of the Lord."

Dr. Howerton concluded his excellent discourse with several special reasons why the Presbyterian church is fitted to take up the work of colored evangelization. The address was so highly satisfactory, that at once a motion was made and adopted that Dr. Howerton be requested to prepare it suitably for publication, and that it be published in pamphlet form to be widely distributed.


