Prominent Georgians Indicted.

Savannah, Ga., Nov. 23.—In the United States court today indictments were returned against some of the most prominent people of South Georgia, one of them a member of the Georgia legislature, charging peonage on twenty-six counts, and the selling of negroes into servitude.

Must Not Read the Bible.

A peremptory writ of mandamus was issued today from the Supreme court commanding the discontinuance of the reading of the Bible in the schools of district 21, Gage county. It was a test case. The court said that there is nothing in the law, constitution or history of the people upon which to ground the claim that it is the duty of the government to teach religion. It is immaterial whether the objections of a parent are unreasonable. The right to be unreasonable is guaranteed by the constitution.

The trustees affected say that they will refuse to obey the mandate and will subject themselves to contempt of court and its penalties before discontinuing the reading of the Bible.—Lincoln, Neb., Dispatch.

BOYETTE NOT GUILTY.

Another Miscarriage of Justice— Judge Brown Rebukes the Jury.

The jury returned a verdict of not guilty in the Boyette murder trial yesterday afternoon, at 5 o'clock, after being out with the case from 10:30 o'clock Saturday night.

With bated breath the people in the court house awaited the momentous words that were to fall from the lips of the foreman in answer to the query from the court as to the guilt of Emmett Boyette for the murder of Lena Boyette. "Not guilty" were the words uttered by the foreman and as soon as the friends of Boyette gathered the import of the words a storm of applause went up from them. His honor ordered the sheriff to stop any such demonstrations if he had to jail those guilty of it. The prisoner fell into his seat as if the continued strain on his nerves could stand no more.

Judge Brown in his quiet but impressive manner then said to the jury.

"Gentlemen of the jury, in my long periodical experience, I have never censured a jury and it is not my purpose to censure you now. I am bound to believe you have acted conscientiously. But I cannot help feeling that you have made a very grave mistake in entirely acquitting this prisoner. Your verdict will be a staggering blow to the proper administration of justice in this county, I fear, for years to come."

The burst of applause that greeted the words of the judge showed that the majority in the court house disapproved the verdict. The effort of the officer to forestall any demonstrations served to lessen the applause at his honor's words but the determined expression of those causing the applause evidenced their disapproval.

The verdict of the jury was in effect that Boyette was not responsible for his act at the time he committed the homicide and Judge Brown ordered the hitherto defendant into custody of the sheriff to await examination of a lunacy commission as to his present mental condition and he was returned to jail.

A large majority of those heard to express themselves believed that a different verdict should have been obtained, but few wanted a verdict of murder in the first degree.—Kinston Free Press, 23rd.

Ryan being a prime factor in the transaction, means its domination by the J. Pierpont Morgan interest, which already controlled the Southern Railway, and sustains such relations with the Atlantic Coast Line as to signify control of that system also. Thus railroad competition in the Southern field is a thing of the past. It has not really amounted to much for several years past, and that little is now about coming to an end.—Charlotte Observer.

Adjournment Near at Hand.

Washington, D. C. Nov. 23.—The extraordinary session of congress will come to an end tomorrow, but for the obstinacy of Speaker Cannon, who declares that he will not agree to any such program. The conferences today between house and senate leaders failed to bring about an agreement as to adjournment, but the prediction is freely made that all sides will get together tomorrow and the finish will take place Wednesday. The house cannot now muster a quorum, and with the senate fully resolved not to pass the Cuban reciprocity bill until the regular session the uselessness of further extending the extra session is apparent. Most of the members of the house have departed for their homes with the intention of remaining until December.

Engineer Killed.

In the national house of representatives there are 236 lawyers, 63 business men and 17 farmers; in the senate there are 61 lawyers, 18 business men and 3 farmers. There are only 21 foreign born legislators in both house.—Durham Sun.

In the assignment of democrats to the senate committees Senator Tillman is made chairman of the committee on revolutionary claims. Anything that relates to revolution is tasteful to the senator.—Raleigh Post.

The North Carolina youth who expresses satisfaction at being placed in a New York house of detention as a witness and paid 50 cents a day and his board, as the result of a round with alleged bunco-steerers, is one of those who might be described as "wanting little here below and not hard to please."—Charlotte Observer.

Has a suicide wave struck North Carolina? Only a few days ago the sad news of young Caldwell's death, at Charlotte, was given to the world, and this is followed by the announcement that Van P. Norwood, son of ex-Judge W. L. Norwood, of Waynesville, had taken his own life with a pistol. How shocking to think that life is esteemed of so little value by those who seem to have so much worth living for.

If the boll weevil catches the next cotton crop it will take even higher prices than 12 cents to bring the farmer out at a profit.

Raleigh can render hearty thanksgiving that the anti-saloon forces are again on top in the city. And the balance of the state will rejoice with her.

The Greensboro Telegram states that one firm in that city has announced its determination to close on Thanksgiving day. We had no idea Greensboro was so far behind. Why, bless your soul, it has been the custom in Greenville for years for nearly every business house to close, except the barrooms. And possibly the reason the barkeepers don't close is because theirs is not a business they can return thanks to God for.

What is this we hear? New England cotton mills, right in the midst of the boasted time of prosperity, making a 10 per cent reduction in the wages of operatives. In Fall River, Mass., alone, 30,000 operatives are affected by the cut in wages, 20,000 in the state of Rhode Island, to say nothing of the other New England manufacturing states. If this thing goes on Roosevelt will lose all the wind out of his sails, and Hanna's full dinner pails will be a thing of the past.

Senator Newlands, of Nevada, has introduced as joint resolution in the senate, inviting Cuba to enter the American Union as a state. It provides that Porto Rico be joined to Cuba as a county, that the president and vice-president of the republic become the governor and lieutenant governor, and that the bonds which Cuba is about to issue, shall be given out as state bonds. By becoming a state in the union Cuba would gain free trade with this country, which would increase the value of her sugar production to the extent of doubling her income; she could make her loan much easier and at three per cent instead of five, would doubtless increase her prosperity in every way. The union would not be the annexation of a subject or dependent state, but an admission upon equal terms as a sovereign state of the United States. Senator Newlands declares that we should make the offer and that the present moment, when Cuban affairs are before congress, is an opportune time.

An Iowa farmer who has had trouble securing labor, has advertised the following terms as an inducement:

"Wages will be \$6 a day. Breakfast will be served in bed. Working hours will be from 10 a. m. to 2 p. m. All heavy work is to be done by the boss. Cigars furnished free. Any hand working the entire season can have the farm."

This offer is made with an understanding of human nature, and commenting on it The New York Commercial thinks that he is in no danger of losing his farm. He knows well enough that the better the farmer treats his "hired men" the less they appreciate it and the shorter time they stay with him. They don't know when they are well off. No ambitious applicant for a job there will last "the season" out. The craft isn't built that way.—Charlotte Observer.

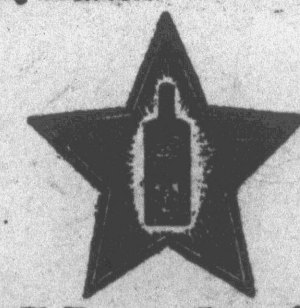
