### An Underground Abode.

Winston Salem, Nov. 20.—While strolling around in a field four miles southeast of the city yesterday afternoon two boys discovered a peculiar room about 14 feet under the ground. The boys reported the matter to police headquarters. Two policemen and two deputy sheriffs, piloted by the officers made a thorough investigation. They found a perpendicular entrance about ten feet deep. This went into a room about 6 by 12 and 7 feet in height. The room is lined with sheet iron. It contains about 100 cans of canned goods, a gasoline stove, cooking utensils, tools for excavating, one quilt, etc. Some metal was also found, but for what purpose it was used the officers have no idea. The officers are as much puzzled as the boys who first discovered the place. When they first arrived there last night it required some time to find a way to get in. Finally a lantern was let down by the use of a line. Policeman James Thomas, one of the bravest men on the Winston force, volunteered to risk his life by going under the ground. The other officers let him down with a rope. Seeing there was no danger, Policeman Haster and Deputy Sheriff Thompson went down and investigated for themselves. The find is being thoroughly discussed here and speculation as to what the "cave" means are numerous.

### DON'T BELIEVE IT DIPHTHERIA.

GREENVILLE, N. C. Dec. 2.

EDITOR REFLECTOR:

Permit us to make some corrections in regard to an article published in Tuesday's REFLECTOR under the head of "Diphtheria."

The article begins with the statement that the physicians attending Mr. Hines' child pronounced his case diphtheria. The physicians attending the child have at no time believed his case to be diphtheria, and but for the opinion of Dr. D. T. Taylor that such was the case, no effort would have been made to quarantine or in any way protect the public against a future outbreak of the disease.

The attending physicians of Mr. Hines' child do not believe he had diphtheria; but they realize that it is possible for them to be mistaken, hence they are not only willing but glad to give their warmest sanction and personal aid to any step that has as its object the protection of the public against a possible diphtheria outbreak.

It is entirely true that all the physicians in the town had a meeting Tuesday, and every method in preventive medicine is being worked to protect the public against the possibility of contagion.

### A Disreputable Proverb.

There are many familiar proverbs whose characters for truth and veracity would not bear inspection, but which are almost universally accepted as self-evident truths. We do not know how many decades or centuries the world has thus accepted "Honesty is the best policy," and we have no idea that our protest against it will impair its standing. But, all the same, it is an untruthful and, therefore, a disreputable proverb.

Honesty is not any kind of policy, and therefore, cannot be the best or the worst. The man who deals fairly because it is politic to do so may not have even a germ of honesty in his nature. It is a fact that a reputation for integrity is business and social capital. It is a fact that a man in almost any kind of business cannot afford to deceive or cheat. It is a fact that a man incapable of acting on any higher motive than unmitigated selfishness can adopt no shrewder plan than straightforward dealing.

But genuine honesty calls for something nobler than that. It has no relation to cunning or craftiness, and it is courageous enough to face ruin rather than be false to itself. The man whose only reason for avoiding dishonest acts is personal profit is a better citizen than a thief but he has not abt more of real honesty in his soul. Let such a man be confronted with an opportunity to get what he most ardently desires by felonious means, and let him feel assured that he runs no risk of detection, and his sham honesty goes down and out.

The really honest man is one who values his own self-respect above all other worldly attainments.—Ex.

But in contrast to the cases of the three representatives mentioned there is the case of Mr. Klutz, of the eighth district. He is serving his third term and has been promoted to the important committee on the post office and post-roads. A district which changes its representative every two or four years cannot ever expect to have one who will rise to a position of much dignity.—Charlotte Observer.
