### RALEIGH TO GREENVILLE.

#### Morning Connection Can Be Had.

THE REFLECTOR has been given a hint that if Greenville and the other town in this section on the Atlantic Coast Line will now take some concerted action, schedules can be arranged so as to make through morning connection from Greensboro, Raleigh and Goldsboro to Greenville at the schedule is at present there is just one hour's difference in the connection, the A. C. L. train leaving Kinston that much ahead of the arrival there of the train from Goldsboro.

The change suggested, and that would prove a great convenience to all this section, is to have the Southern railway train leave Raleigh half an hour earlier in the morning than at present, and the A. C. L. train leave Kinston half an hour later. This would fill the gap without disarranging schedules on either road and would largely increase the patronage of both.

We are told that this matter has already been called to the attention of the corporation commission, and it was intimated by a member of the commission that if the people interested will show by concerted action that such a schedule is desired they are ready to take the matter in hand and have the railroads put it into effect.

Now is the time for action. Let the merchants' association of Greenville take hold of it at once and also get the co-operation of business men in other neighboring towns and the thorough connection can be secured.

THE REFLECTOR made an effort in this matter a year or more ago, but at that time there was no organization here to take it up and nothing was done. Now we have a merchants' association and if they act they can get the schedule desired.

#### Negro Messengers.

### GARD FROM MR. HINES.

GREENVILLE, N. C., Dec. 3rd. EDITOR REFLECTOR:

I wish to correct some of the false statements in the card of Drs. Laughinghouse and Nobles, published in your paper of Wednesday. I don't feel like entering into this matter at present, but for the mistakes I must.

The public don't realize that I feel that my little William would be living today but for the improper treatment he received, and under this treatment suffered death by a little at a time. Now I will tell a few things, and will tell nothing but the truth, so help me God.

Dr. Nobles came to see my boy on Sunday morning, Nov. 22nd. He had fever and throat swollen, and bad throat on inside. He mopped it with something. On Monday following he came in the morning, and in the afternoon of that day he came and I insisted on his getting another doctor, although we thought he was doing all that he could. He went at once and got Dr. Laughinghouse. They came and examined him, went out, held consultation, came back and said move my wife and baby out of the room at once. I did so.

I asked if it was diphtheria. They said they were not positive either way, but they thought it best to be on the safe side. Then I at once began to weep, because I knew his condition was serious.

They said they would come back next morning. They came and examined again and I insisted they tell what it was. They said they did not know. I asked and insisted that they should get antitoxine and treat him, that if it was not diphtheria it would not hurt him. They said it looked like membranous croup, and Dr. Nobles made the remark that if there was an epidemic of diphtheria in town that this would be a good case of it.

Later on in the week he told me I could move wife and baby back in the sick room so I did not let them sleep in there. I did move them back. The little boy then seemed better and could sit up, and at this time antitoxine would no doubt saved him.

It grew worse. I went down town on Saturday, had business with a doctor, and while in his office he asked me how William was. I told him as near as possible his condition. He said to me, he has a good case of diphtheria from what you say of it.

On Saturday afternoon Dr. Nobles came and the little fellow was in bad fix, his little nose was entirely filled and bleeding a little. I told him to get some one to help him. He went down town and phoned back that he and Dr. Laughinghouse would be here before 7 o'clock. They came and examined and talked it over in my presence and then went out for a private talk, came back, told me there was no danger only that he might die from suffocation, and they said all was being done that could be done by anyone.

I insisted on their getting Dr. D. T. Tayloe, of Washington, and Dr. Laughinghouse said he would be in Greenville on Monday and he would bring him up or get Dr. Nobles to do so. On Monday they both came with Dr. Tayloe and he examined the boy's throat and told Dr. Laughinghouse to look for himself. He replied it is not necessary, and they all went out.

Dr. Nobles came back and said I will send medicine from down town and get some from Washington. He got some from Washington in 3 hours from the time they left my house and it was the antitoxine. He gave it and the little

boy died that night.

I insisted on giving the antitoxine the first of last week. I will say further that the coating on the inside of his throat was very hard to remove and bled when scratched off by a wire with cotton wrapped on it. He told me it was very hard to remove, it was very painful to him.

I am informed that in the meeting held on Dec. 1st by the doctors of the town, that two doctors said it was membranous croup. If it was, is not antitoxine just as good for this as it is for diphtheria?

These are the facts as I know them to be, and others beside myself.

#### Sentenced to 30 Years

Asheville, Dec. 1.—The verdict of the jury in the jay case this morning was "guilty of murder in the second degree." The verdict was rendered after the jury had been out since last evening. A motion for a new trial was overruled, and judge Jones remarked from the bench that he thought it would be better for the prisoner to be sent to the penitentiary, and that no appeal be taken. The judge thanked the jury and declared that a just verdict had been returned. Attorneys for the defense have given notice of an appeal over the prisoner's protest. On the way to the jail from the court house Jay told Sheriff Reed that he didn't want to appeal; that he wanted to go on to the penitentiary and begin serving his sentence, so he could get a pardon. Judge Jones gave the prisoner the maximum sentence of 30 years at hard labor.
