Almost Slain by a Hog.

Marshall Broadway, a well known colored man, who lives in the rear of the Thompson Orphanage, was well-nigh slain and certainly crippled for life by the attack of an infuriated hog last evening. The hog belonged to Broadway. In the afternoon it escaped from its pen and resisted all efforts at imprisonment that were made by Broadway's wife and others in the neighborhood. The animal, which weighs nearly 500 pounds, and has two large tusks on either side of its mouth, lashed itself into a fury, and prepared a dangerous reception for Broadway when he came home at night and endeavored to drive the hog into the pen.

As soon as Broadway walked near the hog the animal charged him: ripped his left leg on the front side from the foot to the knee, and a second later had cut his leg to the bone above the knee, severing a large artery. Then the savage tusks entered the right knee powdering everything as they went. This blow cut Broadway to the ground. The hog raged again and jammed both tusks through Broadway's right foot, through all the tarsal bones, and playing more havoc than minnie balls.

Neighbors ran up in groups and frightened the maddened beast away. Before a physician arrived Broadway bled almost to fatal syncope, and he will be badly maimed for life. After two hours' work the physician stopped the bleeding and sewed up Broadway's wounds. One result of the operation was a handful of broken bones that the doctor took out of the crushed limbs and carried to his home.—Charlotte Observer.

Tyson Goes to Penitentiary.

In recent decisions handed down by the Supreme court is the following which is of interest to REFLECTOR readers:

STATE vs. TYSON, Appellant.—From Pitt. No error.

Exception to the remarks of counsel during the argument must be taken before verdict.

Defendant in an indictment for burning a barn was a former slave of the prosecutor's father, and, as the prosecutor's tenant, had continued to live on the plantation where he was reared and in sight of the old homestead, and it was in evidence that defendant received a pension as a Union soldier. In addressing the jury the counsel for defendant spoke at some length and with considerable feeling of his attachment to his old master and the members of his family, and pictured with eloquence the sacredness of the surroundings, and argued that the defendant could not and would not in sight of the old dwelling, set fire to the barn. The Solicitor for the State in reply said that it did not seem that defendant was strongly attached to his master and his family, as it appeared that when the test came he had a gun in his hand ready to shoot down his young master and was then drawing a pension for it. The remarks of the solicitor were not called to the attention of the court and no exception was taken thereto until after the verdict.

Held, that the exception came too late and cannot be sustained under the ruling in State vs. Sugg, 89 N. C., 527; State vs. Brown, 100 N. C., 519; State vs. Powell, 106 N. C., 635; State vs. Lewis, 93 N. C., 582; Knight vs. Houghtalling, 85 N. C., 17 and many other cases.

A party to an action will not be permitted to treat with indifference anything said or done during the trial that may injuriously affect him, thus taking the chance of a favorable verdict, and afterwards, when he has lost, assert, for the first time, that he has been prejudiced by what occurred. He who would save his rights must be prompt in asserting them.

This was a case tried at last April term of Pitt Superior court, when Simon Tyson was convicted of burning a pack house belonging to Mr. S. P. Erwin, of Beaver Dam township, on Sept. 30th, 1902, and sentenced to five years in the penitentiary. His counsel took an appeal to the Supreme court and there the judgment of the lower court was affirmed. Tyson has been taken to the penitentiary to serve out his sentence.

Plight of a Stowaway.

Newport News, Va., Dec. 5.—Self imprisoned in the hold of an ocean freighter 14 days without food or water, Robert Leslie, 30 years old, a stowaway, was rescued in almost a dying condition today. Leslie slipped on board the British steamer Rappahannock, Captain Buckingham, while the vessel was taking on cargo at Liverpool two weeks ago. He secreted himself among the merchandise and when the vessel was out at sea he endeavored to find his way out, but was unable to do so. For 10 days he tried to attract the attention of those on board by shouting, but no relief came and he lay down to die, despairing of rescue. When found he was in a terrible condition and presented a pitiable sight. He weighed only sixty pounds and was too weak to raise himself from a recumbent position. Leslie's weight when he secreted himself at Liverpool was 140 pounds.

In the eastern part of the state there are 15 counties with saloons; in the west, 3; in the centre, 10. There are saloons in less than 50 places in North Carolina.

In the eastern part of the state there are 18 counties for prohibition; in the west, 17; in the centre 18.

In the eastern part of the state there are 7 counties for dispensary; in the west, 4; in the centre, 3.

The counties which have prohibition are:

Those counties which either voted for saloons or have had no election:

Beaufort, Bertie, Buncombe, Burke, Camden, Carteret, Caswell, Chowan, Craven, Davie, Edgecombe, Forsyth, Greene, Guilford, Halifax, Lenoir, Martin, McDowell, Mecklenburg, Nash, New Hanover, Onslow, Person, Pitt, Richmond, Rockingham, Rowan, Stokes, Surrey.

The dispensary counties are:

Franklin, Granville, Haywood, Hertford, Johnson, Lenoir, Macon, Madison, Northampton, Jackson, Warren, Washington, Wake, Wilson.

Commenting on the above, an eminent leader in prohibition said today that an effort is being made to have the next Legislature composed entirely of men opposed to the saloon. He said that the saloon forces are strongly united, and would make a desperate effort to overthrow the temperance people, but would fail.—Raleigh Times.

The contributions for the various kinds of mission work are: State, \$26,302; foreign, \$17,500; home, \$7,762. The contributions for education are \$4,071, for the orphanage at Thomasville \$25,000, for ministerial relief \$1,700, miscellaneous \$500; total \$83,000. In the past nine years the contributions have more than doubled.

JOHN R. MORRIS

The following tribute to a noble man, in the Charlotte Observer, is so beautiful that we reproduce it:

"Now cracks a noble heart!" No more fitting comment upon the death of John R. Morris could be made than that of Horatio upon the death of the Dane. To The Observer his passing is an unaffected grief. He knew he was soon to die; he was not afraid but perhaps, he did not know he was to die so early; certainly, even his intimates did not, though it was not concealed from them that he was the victim of a fatal malady. He was a remarkable man—remarkable for his intellectual gifts and graces for his great heart, for his tender love of his family and friends, his unswerving fidelity to them, his infinite jest, his inimitable humor, his princelike liberality, his unflagging industry, even to the end. He lived for others and for others only cared to live. He knew so little of meanness that he did not recognize it when he saw it in other men, and he died without knowing what selfishness is. He was the likeness of truth, the soul of honor. Uneducated in the schools, he was an omnivorous reader and educated himself as few men are educated. He read all literature except the modern and was full of all knowledge, so that he was not only at home in any company of cultured people, but a valuable acquisition to any. It was his personal qualities, however, that made him so very lovable and companionable, for there was never a braver, gentler, sweeter spirit, and many a man upon whom a flood of sweet memories rushes as he thinks of the open grave today, of the flower covered casket and the calm face beneath its lid, can say of the spirit which has gone back to the God who gave it and in whom it believed, "He was my friend, faithful and just to me."

'Friend after friend departs;
Who has not lost a friend?
There is no union here of hearts
'That finds not here an end.'

"The business man who helps his business or his fortune by successful gambling is as rare as the man who can stick to a rule to take only three drinks a day," said the observant resident. "I know a man who runs a store on which he makes at most \$1,200 a year. Last Thursday he closed out his cotton contracts with a profit of \$1,150, and I know he is a badly hurt man, no matter how pleased he feels. Of course he has lost respect for his store, which has become to him merely a small place where he cannot make in a year what he makes in one day on the cotton market. There is not one chance in a thousand that he will stop gambling with a profit, while he has done a thing that may ruin his career as a legitimate merchant. Only the poker sharps and millionaires can gamble successfully, and poker is safer than cotton futures.—Idle Comment in Charlotte Observer.

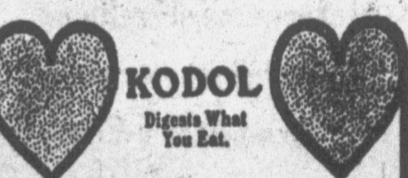

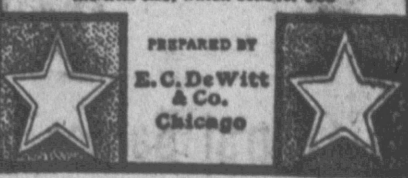
