THE BALTIMORE FIRE

LARGEST CONFLAGRATION IN THE HISTORY OF THE COUNTRY.

Definite particulars of the great fire that started in Baltimore, Sunday, and wiped out most of the business section of the city, are simply appalling in the magnitude of destruction wrought by the flames. The fire is the greatest in magnitude that has ever occurred in this country. While the property loss is immense, it is fortunate that the fire started in the day time by which loss of life was averted.

The latest news from the fire received by THE REFLECTOR today, was that the fire was gotten under control Monday evening, after having burned furiously for about 30 hours. In this time 75 blocks were devastated, the number of buildings destroyed, being 2,450. The property loss is estimated at \$300,000,000.

There was much insurance on the property burned, but doubt is expressed as to the ability of the insurance companies to pay, as such gigantic losses may bankrupt some of them.

Greenville has felt much interest in the fire, and for two days it has been the chief topic of conversation. Many of the large wholesale houses that had much trade

with merchants through this section were burned out. The firm of Joyner, Witz & Co., of which Mr. C. G. Joyner, of this county was the head, was one of those burned.

THE CHICAGO FIRE.

People in discussing this Baltimore fire find nothing in history with which to compare it except the great Chicago fire. We find the Charlotte Observer these figures: The Chicago fire occurred in October, 1871; burned over 2,000 acres, destroying 18,000 buildings and rendering 100,000 homeless. Two hundred persons perished and the damage was estimated at \$200,000,000.

The loss of life in the Chicago fire is all that made it more appalling than the Baltimore fire. While not near the same number of buildings was burned in Baltimore as in Chicago, that the property loss in Baltimore exceeds that at Chicago by \$100,000,000 is easily accounted for in the fact city buildings today are much larger and more costly than thirty years ago, and the stocks carried by the business houses are much more extensive.

Miles in Oil Business

Guthrie, Oklahoma, Feb. 9.—General Nelson A. Miles is the head of a syndicate which has secured large tracts of oil lands in the Osage and Cherokee nations. The syndicate will carbonize crude oil, converting it into a hardened form resembling coke. In the industry he is in partnership with Boston capitalists and experts have successfully developed a plan by which the crude oil may be carbonized. In this form the oil retains all of its heating properties and is condensed for fuel purposes. The plant will be located at Gwendale.

9,500,000 Bales.

There have been different figures wired here today as to the ginners' report of the cotton crop made public at noon. One message placed it a 9,900,000 bales, another at 9,859,000. At 2:15 p. m. Vaughan & Barnes, of Norfolk, wired J. B. Cherry & Co. as follows:

"Ginners' report should be 9,500,000. Market has upward tendency. Japan and Russia fighting but seems to have been discounted."

Torches to Light the Sea.

It will be interesting to note that a new torch for mariners generating gas which ignites when it comes into contact with water has been discovered. The torch floats upright, is not extinguished by wind or water, and gives a light of 300 to 10,000 candle power for half an hour.

The value of this invention in case of shipwrecks at night or in fogs is incalculable. The torches will not only give the endangered sailors light to escape from a foundering vessel, but will attract attention from passing ships that may come to the rescue.

Terrible Storm at Weldon.

Weldon, N. C., Feb. 8.—The worst wind and rain storm in forty years struck Weldon Sunday afternoon at four o'clock, leaving wreck and ruin in its path.

The Weldon Cotton Manufacturing Company suffered most. The wind tore up the southwest corner of their knitting mill, rolled the tin up like paper, and landed it some forty or fifty feet away. The great rafter were torn from the brick, twisted and broken and scattered over the yard in front of the mill.





There are rich gold mines in Moore county. A report issued by the Lanfman Gold Mining Company, situated at Ollie, says that there are in sight on what is known as the Jackson property alone, 10,800,000 cubic feet of gold mining earth, winding down 60 feet, 15 feet wide, 1,200 feet long and in which is found 83,075 tons, assaying \$20 per ton, thus yielding a revenue of \$1,661,500. There is also an additional property known as the Shields property belonging to this company, which contains a gold vein of value.

THE RESULT IN KINSTON.

Our neighbor town, Kinston, has had a dispensary in operation a little more than a month, and the Free Press, in speaking of the change from bar rooms to the dispensary, says:

"The change to the system of management has decreased public drunkenness in our community to a very noticeable extent. During the past month it has been necessary for the police to lock up only five or six persons for this offense. The police court records show a marked diminution in the number of cases that can be traced directly to the free indulgence in the beverage.

"Taken all in all, we have made decided progress in the establishment of the dispensary, with its limitations and restrictions. The temptation to become a drunkard has been vastly lessened and moral conditions are on the improve."

The abundance of evidence from towns that have dispensaries ought to convince the people of Greenville that they are much better than open saloons. Whatever reduces drunkenness is helpful to a town.

The state of Mississippi gains notoriety with another horror. Near Doddsville, in that state, two negroes, a man and his wife, were on Sunday burned at the stake to avenge a doable murder committed by the man. In all eight lives were sacrificed in connection with the tragely. Such crimes in a civilized country are horrible.

The last issue of the North Carolina Baptist, published at Fayetteville, was a handsomely illustrated edition in celebration of its anniversary. The paper is fourteen years old and is very popular throughout the state. It is a good denominational paper, and as a temperance advocate is surpassed by none.

In the face of the great fire in Baltimore, it is in order to ask the authorities of Greenville two questions. First is the fire apparatus in good condition? Second—where is the water to fight with if a fire should occur? These are important questions and should not fall on indifference.

Diplomatic relations between Japan and Russia having been broken, the clash of arms is momentarily expected. And the ultimate result of war between these countries cannot be foretold. Most of the world may become involved before it ends.

The fire that visited Baltimore Sunday is appalling. It is the worst in loss of property that has ever occurred in this country, even exceeding the great Chicago fire of 1871. Every section sympathizes with the stricken city.

The ginners' report made by the government giving the estimate of the cotton crop for this season, places it at 9,859,000 bales. This was higher than was expected, and another slump in the market followed the report.

When brick and stone structures melt like tinder, as they did in Baltimore Sunday, it looks like fire proof buildings are such in name only.

THE REAL QUESTION.

There are sincere temperance men in Greenville who would readily and gladly use their influence in favor of absolute prohibition, who do not look with special favor upon a dispensary. Bar room men and their allies know this to be true, and they are by no means slow in taking advantage of this fact, and are endeavoring to use it in the interest of their unholy business.

That bar room men and their henchmen may not gain advantage by this muddying the water, and deluding honest voters, let it be constantly borne in mind that the question before the people of Greenville is not whether or not they look with special favor upon a dispensary, but which we prefer, a dispensary controlled by law, or grog shops ignoring law.

This being the real question before us, we cannot understand how any true friend of temperance can hesitate even for one moment as to the position he should take.

If on March the 2nd a majority of the votes of the people of Greenville are cast against the dispensary, it will be considered a defeat for temperance and a victory for bar rooms by friends and foes of temperance everywhere.

The issues before us is not prohibition or bar rooms. It is not prohibition or dispensary, but plainly and simply dispensary or bar rooms, and for one or the other of these each voter of Greenville must stand.

And every voter in Greenville is interested in the contest. You may not be lured by the open grog shop, it may have no special attraction for you, yet you are interested—deeply interested, for you have loved ones that may fall victims to their allurements.

"It is something to you; for aught you know, your boy may be next to succumb to the foe, then up and be doing, lest deeply you rue that ever you thought it was nothing to you."

By Their Fruits Shall Ye Know Them.

Nobody claims that a dispensary does away with all drunkenness, but we do claim that it greatly reduces the evils of the drink habit. The Raleigh correspondent of the Wilmington Messenger speaking of the Raleigh dispensary says:

"The question was asked the police whether the dispensary had reduced the amount of drunkenness, it having been in operation now a month. In reply it was stated that during January there were only forty arrests, against 140 for the same month last year. There were only 13 arrests for drunkenness. A veteran police officer ventured to remark that the dispensary had abated drunkenness 75 per cent."

NOTICE OF A DISPENSARY AND DISTILLERY ELECTION.

Notice is hereby given to the voters of the town of Greenville that an election will be held in said town on Wednesday, March 2nd, 1904, in accordance with an ordinance adopted by the board of aldermen of said town at two special meetings of said board one held on Friday, January 29th, and the other on Saturday, January 30th, 1904 The ordinance so adopted is in the following language:

Whereas, a petition has been filed with this board, at a special meeting held on this the 29th day of January, 1904, signed by 104 citizens of the town of Greenville, asking that an election be ordered in said town to determine whether a dispensary shall be established therein, and whether the manufacture of liquors shall be allowed in said town.

And Whereas, it has been found after a careful investigation and verification of said petition with the registration books of the town, that said petition contains the names of one third of the registered voters of the town of Greenville who were registered for the preceding municipal election.

And Whereas, the law having been complied with, it has become the duty of this board to order an election and to fix the time thereof, therefore

The board of aldermen of the town of Greenville, in the state of North Carolina, do ordain,

Section 1. That an election shall be held in the several wards of the town, at the usual places therein on Wednesday, the 2nd, day of March 1904, at which the qualified voters of said town may, if they desire, vote upon the two questions set out in said petition, to-wit: First, shall there be established in said town a dispensary, Second, shall the manufacture of liquors be allowed within the corporate limits of said town. At said election those who favor the establishing a dispensary will vote a written or printed ticket upon which shall be written or printed the words "For Dispensaries." Those who are opposed to establishing a dispensary shall vote a written or printed ticket upon which shall be written or printed the words "Against Dispensaries."

Those who are in favor of allowing the manufacture of liquors in said town shall vote a written or printed ticket upon which shall be written or printed the words "For Distilleries," and those who are opposed to allowing the manufacture of liquors in said town shall vote a written or printed ticket upon which shall be written or printed the words "Against Distilleries."

Section 2. That it shall be the duty of the registrar and judges of election at each voting place to provide a separate box for the voters on the question of dispensaries and a separate box for the voters upon the question of the manufacture of liquors, and the votes upon each shall be deposited in the appropriate box.

Section 3 That there shall be appointed for each ward in the town one registrar and two judges of election, who shall attend at their respective voting places on said 2nd day of March, 1904, and open and conduct said election according to law, and they shall make returns of said election to this board at its regular meeting on Thursday the 3rd day of March, 1904.

- Fourth Ward.—J. G. Bowling, registrar and R. W. King and Z.

V. Hooker judges of election. Fifth Ward.—C. D. Rountree, registrar and Jesse L. Sugg and R. A. Nichols, judges of election.

That the said election be held at the following places to-wit:

- First Ward—At Mrs. Nana T. Brown's residence on corner of Second and Pitt streets.
- Second Ward—At Mrs. V. H. Whichard's school house on Pitt street.
- Third Ward—At the court house.
- Fourth Ward—At W. J. Thigpen's store at Five Points.
- Fifth Ward—At the Centre Brick Warehouse on Dickinson Avenue.

Section 7. That the mayor shall cause a copy of this order to be published in one or more newspapers published in the town.
